#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

1 proposing a constitutional amendment to allow an officer or

4 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Section 40(a), Article XVI, Texas Constitution,

6 is amended to read as follows:

7 (a) No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more

8 than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the

Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer

10 of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers

11 Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National

12 Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of

13 the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army,

14 Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant

15 officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air

16 Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers and

17 enlisted members of the Texas State Guard and any other active

18 militia or military force organized under state law, and the

19 officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts,

20 unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing

21 in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or

No. 127 (senate committee printing) as 2 follows: 3 (1) Add the following appropriately numbered SECTION to the joint resolution and renumber subsequent SECTIONS of the joint 4 5 resolution as appropriate: SECTION . Article III, Texas Constitution, is amended 6 7 by adding Section 49-b-1 to read as follows: Sec. 49-b-1. BENEFITS FOR SURVIVORS OF TEXAS NATIONAL 8 GUARD MEMBERS. (a) In this section: 9 10 (1) "Heirs" means those persons, including the 11 surviving spouse, who are entitled under the statutes of descent 12 and distribution to the estate of a decedent who dies intestate. 13 (2) "Eligible survivor" means a person designated as a beneficiary on the deceased individual's group life insurance 14 program under 38 U.S.C. Section 1965 et seq. 15 (b) This section applies only to a member of the Texas 16 17 National Guard who died after September 11, 2001, while: 18 (1) on federal active duty under Title 10, United 19 States Code; or 20 (2) serving in a named military operation on active duty under state authority in accordance with Title 32, United 21 22 States Code. (c) The adjutant general's department or another agency 23 designated by the legislature may pay \$250,000 to: 24 (1) the eligible survivor of an individual described 25 by Subsection (b) or the appropriate pro rata portion of that 26 amount to the eligible survivors of the individual; or 27 (2) the heirs of an individual described by Subsection 28 (b) if there are no eligible survivors of that individual. 29

- 1 (d) An eligible survivor or heir must apply for benefits
- 2 <u>in accordance with rules adopted under this section.</u>
- 3 (e) The benefit provided under this section is in addition
- 4 to any other benefit provided under state or federal law.
- 5 (f) The state agency administering the benefits provided by

- 7 including rules and procedures for making and proving a claim,
- 8 appealing decisions, and receiving benefits under this section.

#### **Fiscal Analysis**

The proposed resolution would amend the Texas Constitution by allowing an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state military force to hold other civil offices. Additionally, the bill would amend the Government Code by allowing that an eligible survivor of a member of the Texas National Guard who has died after September 11, 2001, while serving on federal active duty or serving in a named military operation on active duty under state authority could be paid death benefits. The bill would allow that \$250,000 be paid to the eligible survivor of an individual or the appropriate pro rata portion of that amount to the eligible survivors of the individual. According to the Adjutant General's Department (AGD), members on federal active duty include those members who are deployed to a hostile fire zone/combat zone and those members performing weekend drills. The bill would allow the AGD to certify to the Comptroller of Public Accounts the name of the eligible survivor who could be paid the benefit as specified in the bill and also the amount of the benefit being paid.

### Methodology

According to the AGD, since September 11, 2001, nine Texas National Guard members have died on duty in a hostile fire zone/combat zone and therefore the estimated cost would be \$2.25 million (9 members multiplied by \$250,000) for fiscal year 2010. At this time, the number of members who have died in places other than in a hostile fire zone/combat zone is unknown. The AGD estimates that the number could be three to five members per year. The estimated cost for each of the subsequent years is \$750,000 (3 members multiplied by \$250,000).

The cost to the state for publication of the resolution is \$90,882 in fiscal year 2010.

### **Local Government Impact**
