AN ACT

2 relating to the foundation curriculum, the establishment of the 3 instructional materials allotment, and the adoption, review, and 4 purchase of instructional materials and technological equipment 5 for public schools.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

7 SECTION 1. Chapter 5, Education Code, is amended by adding 8 Section 5.002 to read as follows:

9 <u>Sec. 5.002. REFERENCES TO TEXTBOOK.</u> In this title, a
 10 reference to a textbook means instructional material, as defined by
 11 <u>Section 31.002.</u>

SECTION 2. Section 7.055(b)(28), Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

14 (28) The commissioner shall perform duties relating to
15 the funding, adoption, and purchase of <u>instructional materials</u>
16 [textbooks] under Chapter 31.

17 SECTION 3. Section 7.056(f), Education Code, is amended to 18 read as follows:

(f) A school district or campus that is required to develop and implement a student achievement improvement plan under Section 39.102 or 39.103 may receive an exemption or waiver under this section from any law or rule other than:

(1) a prohibition on conduct that constitutes a24 criminal offense;

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1 (2) a requirement imposed by federal law or rule; 2 (3) requirement, restriction, а or prohibition 3 imposed by state law or rule relating to: 4 (A) public school accountability as provided by 5 Subchapters B, C, D, E, and J, Chapter 39; or 6 (B) educator rights and benefits under 7 Subchapters A, C, D, E, F, G, and I, Chapter 21, or under Subchapter 8 A, Chapter 22; or 9 (4) [textbook] selection of instructional materials 10 under Chapter 31. publisher of instructional materials may not, before the second
anniversary of the date on which the person last served as a member
of the State Board of Education:

8 (1) confer with a member of the board of trustees of a 9 school district concerning <u>instructional materials</u> [a textbook] 10 published by that [textbook] publisher; or

11 (2) appear at a meeting of the board of trustees on 12 behalf of the [textbook] publisher.

 2 school personnel employed in any course or educational program
 3 required for graduation;

4 (5) library <u>materials</u> [books] required to be used for
5 any educational course or program, other than fines for lost,
6 damaged, or overdue <u>materials</u> [books];

7 (6) admission to any activity the student is required8 to attend as a prerequisite to graduation;

9 (7) admission to or examination in any required 10 educational course or program; or

11 (8) lockers.

SECTION 11. Section 19.007(e), Education Code, is amended 13 14 to read as follows: 15 (e) The district may participate in the instructional materials [textbook] program under Chapter 31. 16 17 SECTION 12. Sections 26.006(a) and (c), Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 18 19 (a) A parent is entitled to: review all teaching materials, instructional 20 (1)materials [textbooks], and other teaching aids used in the 21 classroom of the parent's child; and 22 (2) review each test administered to the parent's 23 24 child after the test is administered. (c) A student's parent is entitled to request that the 25 26 school district or open-enrollment charter school the student attends allow the student to take home any instructional materials 27

Subject to the availability of the 1 instructional materials [a textbook], the district or school shall 2 A student who takes home <u>instructional</u> 3 honor the request. materials [a textbook] must return the instructional materials 4 5 [textbook] to school at the beginning of the next school day if requested to do so by the student's teacher. In this subsection, 6 "instructional material" ["textbook"] has the meaning assigned by 7 Section 31.002. 8 28.002(a), (c), (h), SECTION 13. Sections 9 and (n), Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 10 (a) Each school district that offers kindergarten through 11 grade 12 shall offer, as a required curriculum: 12 (1) a foundation curriculum that includes: 13 14 (A) English language arts; 15 (B) mathematics; 16 (C) science; and 17 (D) social studies, consisting of Texas, United States, and world history, government, economics, with emphasis on 18 the free enterprise system and its benefits, and geography; and 19 20 (2) an enrichment curriculum that includes: 21 (A) to the extent possible, languages other than English; 22 health, with emphasis on the importance of 23 (B) 24 proper nutrition and exercise; 25 (C) physical education; 26 (D) fine arts; [economics, with emphasis 27 (E) on the froo

A primary purpose of the public school curriculum is to prepare thoughtful, active citizens 22 who understand the importance of patriotism and can function 23 24 productively in a free enterprise society with appreciation for the basic democratic values of our state and national heritage. 25

26 (n) The State Board of Education may by rule develop and 27 implement a plan designed to incorporate foundation curriculum

(1) <u>"Instructional material"</u> [<u>"Electronic textbook"</u>] 6 7 means content that conveys the essential knowledge and skills of a 8 subject in the public school curriculum through a medium or a combination of media for conveying information to a student. The 9 term includes a book, supplementary materials, a combination of a 10 book, workbook, and supplementary materials, computer software, 11 12 [interactive videodisc,] magnetic media, DVD, CD-ROM, computer courseware, on-line services, or an electronic medium, or other 13 means of conveying information to the student or otherwise 14 15 contributing to the learning process through electronic means, including [an] open-source instructional material [textbook]. 16

17 (1-a) "Open-source instructional material" [textbook"] electronic instructional material 18 means [an] 19 [textbook] that is available for downloading from the Internet at no charge to a student and without requiring the purchase of an 20 unlock code, membership, or other access or use charge, except for a 21 charge to order an optional printed copy of all or part of the 22 instructional material [textbook]. The term includes 23 [a] 24 state-developed open-source <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] purchased under Subchapter B-1. 25

26 (2) "Publisher" includes an on-line service or a 27 developer or distributor of [an] electronic <u>instructional</u>

1 materials [textbook].

2 (4) "Technological equipment" means hardware, a3 device, or equipment necessary for:

4 (A) instructional use in the classroom,
5 including to gain access to or enhance the use of [an] electronic
6 instructional materials [textbook]; or

7 (B) professional use by a classroom teacher.
8 SECTION 20. Subchapter A, Chapter 31, Education Code, is
9 amended by amending Sections 31.003 and 31.004 and adding Section
10 31.005 to read as follows:

Sec. 31.003. RULES. The State Board of Education may adopt rules, consistent with this chapter, for the adoption, requisition, distribution, care, use, and disposal of <u>instructional materials</u> [<u>textbooks</u>].

Sec. 31.004. 4 (e) Not later than May 31 of each school year, a school 5 district may request that the commissioner adjust the number of students for which the district is entitled to receive an allotment 6 7 under Subsection (a) on the grounds that the number of students 8 attending school in the district will increase or decrease during the school year for which the allotment is provided. 9 The commissioner may also adjust the number of students for which a 10 district is entitled to receive an allotment, without a request by 11 12 the district, if the commissioner determines a different number of students is a more accurate reflection of students who will be 13 attending school in the district. The commissioner's determination 14 15 under this subsection is final. (f) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to 16

20	Sec. 31.0214. ADJUSTMENT FOR HIGH ENROLLMENT GROWTH
21	DISTRICTS. (a) Each year the commissioner shall adjust the
22	instructional materials allotment of school districts experiencing
23	high enrollment growth. The commissioner shall establish a
24	procedure for determining high enrollment growth districts
25	eligible to receive an adjustment under this section and the amount
26	of the instructional materials allotment those districts will
27	receive.

1 (b) The commissioner may adopt rules as necessary to
2 implement this section.

3 SECTION 24. The heading to Section 31.022, Education Code, 4 is amended to read as follows:

5 Sec. 31.022. <u>INSTRUCTIONAL MATERIALS</u> [TEXTBOOK] REVIEW AND
6 ADOPTION.

SECTION 25. Section 31.022, Education Code, is amended by amending Subsections (a), (b), (c), (e), and (f) and adding Subsection (b-1) to read as follows:

10 (a) The State Board of Education shall adopt a review and 11 adoption cycle for <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for 12 elementary grade levels, including prekindergarten, and secondary 13 grade levels, for each subject in the required curriculum under 14 Section 28.002. In adopting the cycle, the board:

15 (1) is not required to review and adopt instructional 16 materials for all grade levels in a single year; and

17 (2) shall give priority to instructional materials for
 18 subjects in the following order:

19 (A) foundation curriculum subjects for which the 20 essential knowledge and skills have been substantially revised and 21 for which assessment instruments are required under Subchapter B, 22 Chapter 39, including career and technology courses that satisfy 23 foundation curriculum requirements as provided by Section 24 <u>28.002(n);</u> 25 (B) foundation curriculum subjects for which the

26 essential knowledge and skills have been substantially revised,
27 including career and technology courses that satisfy foundation

1 curriculum requirements as provided by Section 28.002(n); 2 (C) foundation curriculum subjects not described by Paragraph (A) or (B), including career and technology courses 3 that satisfy foundation curriculum requirements as provided by 4 5 Section 28.002(n); and 6 (D) enrichment curriculum subjects. 7 (b) The board shall organize the cycle for subjects in the 8 foundation curriculum so that not more than <u>one-fourth</u> [one-sixth] of the instructional materials [textbooks] for subjects in the 9 10 foundation curriculum are reviewed each <u>biennium</u> [year]. The board shall adopt rules to provide for a full and complete investigation 11

of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for each subject in the foundation curriculum [at least] every <u>eight</u> [six] years. The adoption of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for a subject in the foundation curriculum may be extended beyond the <u>eight-year</u> [six-year] period only if the content of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for a subject is sufficiently current.

18 (b-1) For purposes of the cycle described by Subsection (b), 19 the State Board of Education is considered to have adopted 20 instructional materials for English language arts, English as a 21 second language, and prekindergarten, as included in Proclamation 22 2011, for the biennium beginning September 1, 2011. This 23 subsection expires September 1, 2013.

(c) The board shall adopt rules to provide for a full and
complete investigation of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] for
each subject in the enrichment curriculum on a cycle the board
considers appropriate.

1 (e) The board shall designate a request for production of 2 <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] in a subject area and grade 3 level by the school year in which the <u>instructional materials</u> 4 [textbooks] are intended to be made available in classrooms and not 5 by the school year in which the board makes the request for 6 production.

(f) The board shall amend any request for production issued
for the purchase of <u>instructional materials</u> [textbooks] to conform
to the <u>instructional materials</u> [textbook] funding levels provided
by the General Appropriations Act for the year of implementation.

SECTION 26. Section 31.0221, Education Code, is amended to read as follows:

Sec. 31.0221. MIDCYCLE REVIEW AND ADOPTION OF <u>INSTRUCTIONAL</u> <u>MATERIALS</u> [TEXTBOOKS]. (a) The State Board of Education shall adopt rules for the midcycle review and adoption of <u>instructional</u> <u>material</u> [a textbook] for a subject for which <u>instructional</u> <u>materials</u> [textbooks] are not currently under review by the board under Section 31.022. The rules must require:

19 (1) the publisher of the <u>instructional material</u> 20 [textbook] to pay a fee to the board to cover the cost of the 21 midcycle review and adoption of the <u>instructional material</u> 22 [textbook];

(2) the publisher of the <u>instructional material</u>
[textbook] to enter into a contract with the board concerning the

(d) A school district or open-enrollment charter school that selects [an] open-source <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] shall requisition a sufficient number of printed copies for use by students unable to access the <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] electronically unless the district or school provides to each

Each student, or the student's parent or guardian, is 7 (d) 8 responsible for all instructional materials [each textbook, including an electronic textbook, and [all] technological 9 10 equipment not returned in an acceptable condition by the student. Except as provided by Subsection (d-1), a [A] student who fails to 11 return in an acceptable condition all instructional materials 12 [textbooks, including electronic textbooks,] and technological 13 14 equipment forfeits the right to free instructional materials 15 [textbooks, including electronic textbooks,] and technological equipment until all instructional materials [each textbook, 16 including an electronic textbook,] and 17 [all] technological equipment previously issued but not returned in an acceptable 18 19 condition are [is] paid for by the student, parent, or guardian. As provided by policy of the board of trustees or governing body, a 20 21 school district or open-enrollment charter school may waive or reduce the payment requirement if the student is from a low-income 22 family. The district or school shall allow the student to use 23 24 instructional materials [textbooks, including electronic textbooks, and technological equipment at school during each 25 26 school day. If instructional materials [a textbook, including an electronic textbook,] or technological equipment is not returned in 27

an acceptable condition or paid for, the district or school may 1 withhold the student's records. A district or school may not, 2 3 under this subsection, prevent a student from graduating, participating in a graduation ceremony, or receiving a diploma. 4 5 The commissioner by rule shall adopt criteria for determining instructional materials [a textbook, including an 6 whether electronic textbook,] and technological equipment are returned in 7 8 an acceptable condition.

9 (d-1) A school district may require the payment of a fee by a student in the district to cover the cost of insuring technological 10 equipment issued to the student. The fee may not exceed the amount 11 12 necessary to cover the cost of insurance on lost, damaged, or stolen technological equipment. A district charging a fee under this 13 14 subsection shall adopt a policy to waive or reduce the fee of a 15 student who is from a low-income family. An employee may not be required to agree to such an agreement as a condition of employment. 9

10 (g) At the end of the school year for which [an] open-source 11 <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] that a school district or 12 open-enrollment charter school does not intend to use for another 13 student is distributed, the printed copy of the open-source 14 <u>instructional material</u> [textbook] becomes the property of the 15 student to whom it is distributed.

8 [(A) maintain a depository in this state or 9 arrange with a depository in this state to receive and fill orders 10 for textbooks, other than open-source textbooks, on-line 11 textbooks, or on-line textbook components, consistent with State 12 Board of Education rules; or

13[(B)]deliverinstructionalmaterials14[textbooks]to a school district or open-enrollment charter school15without a delivery charge to the school district, open-enrollment16charter school, or state [, if:

SECTION 67. The change in law made by this Act to Section 14 15 7.108, Education Code, applies only to an offense committed on or after the effective date of this Act. An offense committed before 16 17 the effective date of this Act is governed by the law in effect when the offense was committed, and the former law is continued in effect 18 for that purpose. For purposes of this section, an offense was 19 20 committed before the effective date of this Act if any element of the offense occurred before that date. 21
