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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to student success-based funding for public institutions 3 of higher education. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. Sections 61.059(a) and (c), Education Code, are amended to read as follows: 6 7 To finance a system of higher education and to secure an (a) equitable distribution of state funds deemed to be available for 8 higher education, the board shall perform the functions described 9 in this section. Funding policies shall: 10 11 (1) allocate resources efficiently and provide 12 incentives for programs of superior quality and for institutional 13 diversity; 14 (2) provide incentives for supporting the five-year master plan developed and revised under Section 61.051; [and] 15 16 (3) discourage unnecessary duplication of course offerings between institutions and unnecessary construction on any 17 campus; and 18 (4) emphasize an alignment with education goals 19 20 established by the board. 21 (c) Formulas for basic funding shall: 22 (1) reflect the role and mission of each institution; (2) [, shall] emphasize funding elements that directly 23 24 support faculty;

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1	(3) [$_{\tau}$ and shall] reflect both fixed and variable
2	elements of cost; and
3	(4) incorporate, as the board considers appropriate,
4	goals identified in the board's long-range statewide plan developed
5	under Section 61.051.
6	SECTION 2. Subchapter C, Chapter 61, Education Code, is
7	amended by adding Section 61.0593 to read as follows:
8	Sec. 61.0593. STUDENT SUCCESS-BASED FUNDING
9	RECOMMENDATIONS. (a) The legislature finds that it is in the
10	state's highest public interest to evaluate student achievement at
11	institutions of higher education and to develop higher education
12	funding policy based on that evaluation. Funding policies that
13	promote postsecondary educational success based on objective
14	indicators of relative performance, such as degree completion
15	rates, are critical to maintaining the state's competitiveness in
16	the national and global economy and supporting the general welfare
17	of this state. Therefore, the purpose of this section is to ensure
18	that institutions of higher education produce student outcomes that
19	are directly aligned with the state's education goals and economic
20	development needs.
21	(b) In this section:
22	(1) "At-risk student" means an undergraduate student
23	of an institution of higher education:
24	(A) who has been awarded a grant under the
25	federal Pell Grant program; or
26	(B) who, on the date the student initially
27	enrolled in the institution:

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1	(i) was 20 years of age or older;								
2	(ii) had a score on the Scholastic								
3	Assessment Test (SAT) or the American College Test (ACT) that was								
4	less than the national mean score for students taking that test;								
5	(iii) was enrolled as a part-time student;								
6	or								
7	(iv) had not received a high school diploma								
8	but had received a high school equivalency certificate within the								
9	last six years.								
10	(2) "Critical field" means a field of study designated								
11	as a critical field under Subsection (c).								
12	(c) Except as otherwise provided under Subdivision (2), the								
13	fields of engineering, computer science, mathematics, physical								
14	science, allied health, nursing, and teaching certification in the								
15	field of science or mathematics are critical fields. Beginning								
16	September 1, 2012, the board, based on the board's determination of								
17	those fields of study in which the support and development of								
18	postsecondary education programs at the bachelor's degree level are								
19	most critically necessary for serving the needs of this state, by								
20	rule may:								
21	(1) designate as a critical field a field of study that								
22	is not currently designated by this subsection or by the board as a								
23	critical field; or								
24	(2) remove a field of study from the list of fields								
25	currently designated by this subsection or by the board as critical								
26	fields.								
27	(d) In devising its base funding formulas and making its								

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1	recommendations to the legislature relating to institutional									
2	appropriations of base funds under Section 61.059, the board, in									
3	the manner and to the extent the board considers appropriate, shall									
4	incorporate the consideration of undergraduate student success									
5	measures achieved during the preceding state fiscal biennium by									
6	each of the institutions of higher education to which base funds									
7	will be appropriated.									
8	(e) For a general academic teaching institution other than a									
9	public state college, the success measures considered by the board									
10	under Subsection (d) must include:									
11	(1) the total number of bachelor's degrees awarded by									
12	the institution;									
13	(2) the total number of bachelor's degrees in critical									
14	fields awarded by the institution;									
15	(3) the total number of bachelor's degrees awarded by									
16	the institution to at-risk students; and									
17	(4) as determined by the board, the expected									
18	graduation rate of students of the institution who initially									
19	enrolled in the institution in the fall semester immediately									
20	following their graduation from a public high school in this state.									
21	(f) For a public junior college, public state college, or									
22	public technical institute, the success measures considered by the									
23	board under Subsection (d) must include:									
24	(1) the following academic progress measures achieved									
25	by students at the institution:									
26	(A) successful completion of:									
27	(i) developmental education in									

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1	<pre>mathematics;</pre>
2	(ii) developmental education in English;
3	(iii) the first college-level mathematics
4	course with a grade of "C" or higher;
5	(iv) the first college-level English course
6	with a grade of "C" or higher; and
7	(v) the first 30 semester credit hours at
8	the institution; and
9	(B) transfer to a four-year college or university
10	after successful completion of at least 15 semester credit hours at
11	the institution; and
12	(2) the total number of the following awarded by the
13	institution:
14	(A) associate's degrees;
15	(B) bachelor's degrees under Section 130.0012;
16	and
17	(C) certificates identified by the board for
18	purposes of this section as effective measures of student success.
19	(g) The board shall include in its findings and
20	recommendations to the legislature under Section 61.059:
21	(1) an evaluation of the effectiveness of the student
22	success measures described by this section in achieving the purpose
23	of this section during the preceeding state fiscal biennium; and
24	(2) any related recommendations the board considers
25	appropriate.
26	(h) The board shall adopt rules for the administration of
27	this section, including rules requiring each institution of higher

- 4 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2011.
