A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to disease control outreach programs to reduce the risk of 3 certain communicable diseases.

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BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

SECTION 1. The legislature finds that because drug abuse 5 has been a tragedy for many Texas families, it is imperative that 6 individuals addicted to drugs receive education and treatment for 7 Working with community-based and 8 addiction. faith-based 9 organizations creates a network of support for Texas families and the opportunity to intervene in drug addiction. 10 Members of 11 community-based and faith-based organizations have a strong desire 12 to compassionately work to preserve lives and offer help to those stricken with disease and drug addiction. 13

14 Allowing for the operation of disease control outreach programs will reduce the transmission of bloodborne diseases, such 15 as hepatitis C, hepatitis B, and HIV/AIDS, and provide clients with 16 referrals to appropriate health and social services. An outreach 17 program created under this Act shall provide necessary access to 18 primary health care, ensure safe and sterile disposal of used 19 syringes and needles, and protect the public health. In addition, 20 21 outreach program goals may include reduced rates of intravenous 22 drug use and a reduced number of injuries to innocent victims, first 23 responders, and law enforcement due to needle sticks from improperly disposed-of needles. Additionally, it is the intent of 24

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the legislature that there will be increased access to drug 1 treatment centers, an increased likelihood of successful treatment 2 3 for addiction, and increased protection of public health and safety. 4 5 SECTION 2. Chapter 81, Health and Safety Code, is amended by adding Subchapter J to read as follows: 6 SUBCHAPTER J. OUTREACH PROGRAMS TO REDUCE RISK OF CERTAIN 7 8 COMMUNICABLE DISEASES 9 Sec. 81.401. APPLICABILITY OF SUBCHAPTER. This subchapter 10 applies only to a county with a population of 300,000 or more. Sec. 81.402. DISEASE CONTROL OUTREACH PROGRAMS. (a) A 11 12 local health authority or an organization that contracts with a county, municipality, hospital district, or other local 13 governmental entity charged with protecting the public health may 14 15 establish a disease control outreach program that: 16 (1) assists outreach program participants in 17 obtaining health care and other physical and mental health-related services, including substance abuse treatment services and 18 19 bloodborne disease testing; (2) offers education on the transmission and 20 prevention of communicable diseases, including hepatitis C, 21 22 hepatitis B, and HIV; and (3) provides for the anonymous exchange of used 23 24 hypodermic needles and syringes for an equal number of new hypodermic needles and syringes. 25 26 (b) A local health authority or other organization operating a disease control outreach program authorized by this 27

No. 117 1 subchapter may charge a participant in the outreach program a fee 2 for each hypodermic needle or syringe used in the outreach program not to exceed 150 percent of the actual cost of the hypodermic 3 needle or syringe. 4 5 (c) A local health authority or other organization operating a disease control outreach program authorized by this 6 7 subchapter shall annually provide the department with information 8 on: 9 (1) the effectiveness of the disease control outreach 10 program, including: 11 (A) the number of clients served by the program; 12 and 13 (B) the methods of distribution; 14 (2) the disease control outreach program's impact on 15 reducing the spread of communicable diseases, such as hepatitis C, hepatitis B, and HIV, including: 16 (A) the number of syringes collected and the 17 number of syringes disposed of through the program; 18 19 (B) the number of referrals for testing for communicable diseases made by the program; and 20 21 (C) a list of the facilities to which individuals 22 are referred by the program to receive testing described by 23 Paragraph (B); and 24 (3) the disease control outreach program's effect on 25 injected drug use in the area served by the local health authority, 26 including: (A) the number of referrals for substance abuse 27

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1 treatment made by the program; 2 (B) a list of facilities to which individuals are 3 referred by the program to receive substance abuse treatment; and 4 (C) other information specified by the 5 department. Sec. 81.403. DISTRIBUTION OF NEEDLES AND SYRINGES TO 6 7 OUTREACH PROGRAM. A person licensed as a wholesale drug 8 distributor or device distributor under Chapter 431 may distribute hypodermic needles and syringes to a disease control outreach 9 10 program authorized by this subchapter. Sec. 81.404. HANDLING OF NEEDLES AND SYRINGES. (a) The 11 12 operator of a disease control outreach program shall store hypodermic needles and syringes in a proper and secure manner. Only 13 authorized employees or volunteers of the disease control outreach 14 program may have access to the hypodermic needles and syringes. 15 16 Outreach program clients may obtain hypodermic needles and syringes only from an authorized employee or volunteer. 17 (b) The operator of a disease control outreach program 18 19 authorized by this subchapter shall store and dispose of used hypodermic needles and syringes in accordance with department rule. 20 21 Sec. 81.405. FUNDING. (a) Except to the extent 22 specifically prohibited by law, a county, municipality, hospital district, or other local governmental entity charged with 23 protecting the public health may use public money to fund a disease 24 control outreach program under Section 81.402(a). 25 26 (b) Except to the extent specifically prohibited by law, a county, municipality, hospital district, or other local 27

No. 117 1 governmental entity charged with protecting the public health may 2 solicit or accept gifts, grants, or donations to fund a disease 3 control outreach program under Section 81.402(a). 4 SECTION 3. Section 481.125, Health and Safety Code, is 5 amended by adding Subsection (g) to read as follows: 6 (g) It is a defense to prosecution under Subsections (a) and 7 (b) that: 8 (1) the person manufactures hypodermic needles or syringes that are delivered or are to be delivered through a disease 9 10 control outreach program established under Subchapter J, Chapter 81; or 11 12 (2) the person: (A) uses, possesses, or delivers hypodermic 13 14 needles or syringes that are delivered to or are to be delivered 15 through a disease control outreach program established under Subchapter J, Chapter 81; and 16 17 (B) presents evidence showing that the person is an employee, volunteer, or participant of the disease control 18 19 outreach program. SECTION 4. (a) The change to Section 481.125, Health and 20 Safety Code, made by this Act applies only to an offense committed 21 on or after the effective date of this Act. For purposes of this 22 section, an offense is committed before the effective date of this 23 24 Act if any element of the offense occurs before the effective date. 25 (b) An offense committed before the effective date of this 26 Act is governed by the law in effect when the offense was committed,

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and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.

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1 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect September 1, 2011.
