2	relating to physician shortage residency training programs.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by adding
5	Subchapter I-1 to read as follows:
6	SUBCHAPTER I-1. CONTRACTS FOR PHYSICIAN SHORTAGE RESIDENCY
7	TRAINING PROGRAMS
8	Sec. 61.511. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:
9	(1) "Approved physician shortage residency training
10	program" means a graduate medical education program that:
11	(A) is operated by a medical school, licensed
12	hospital, or nonprofit corporation; and
13	(B) has been approved for training physicians in
14	a physician shortage area identified by the Physician Shortage
15	Residency Advisory Committee.
16	(2) "Medical school" means:
17	(A) a medical school that is part of The
18	University of Texas System, the Texas Tech University System, The
19	Texas A&M University System, or the University of North Texas
20	System; or
21	(B) the Baylor College of Medicine.
22	Sec. 61.512. CONTRACTS. The board may contract with a
23	medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation for the
24	purpose of establishing and operating an approved physician

- 1 shortage residency training program and may compensate the medical
- 2 school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation using a formula
- 3 that is approved by the board and based on the number of resident
- 4 physicians in the training program.
- 5 Sec. 61.513. RULES. The board shall adopt rules to
- 6 implement this subchapter.
- 7 Sec. 61.514. DISBURSEMENTS. (a) Pursuant to a contract,
- 8 the board may disburse through the designated project director to a
- 9 medical school, licensed hospital, or nonprofit corporation funds
- 10 for the purpose of the graduate training of physicians in an
- 11 approved physician shortage residency training program. The
- 12 project director of the residency training program shall, in
- 13 accordance with board rules, make timely reports directly to the
- 14 board concerning the development and progress of the residency
- 15 <u>training program.</u>
- 16 (b) The board by contract may establish the method or manner
- 17 of the disbursement to the project director.
- Sec. 61.515. ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) The Physician
- 19 Shortage Residency Advisory Committee consists of nine members as
- 20 follows:
- 21 (1) one member, appointed by the Texas Osteopathic
- 22 Medical Association, who must be a licensed physician;
- 23 (2) two members, appointed by the Texas Hospital
- 24 Association, who must be hospital administrators;
- 25 (3) two members, appointed by the Texas Medical
- 26 Association, who must be licensed physicians;
- 27 (4) one member representing the statewide health

- 1 coordinating council appointed by the presiding officer of the
- 2 council; and
- 3 (5) three members of the public appointed by the
- 4 governor.
- 5 (b) Each member serves a three-year term. Each member may
- 6 continue to serve after the expiration of the member's term until a
- 7 replacement for the member is appointed to the committee.
- 8 (c) The members of the committee serve without
- 9 compensation, but are entitled to be reimbursed by the board for
- 10 actual expenses incurred in the performance of duties as members of
- 11 the committee.
- 12 (d) The committee shall meet at least annually and as
- 13 otherwise requested by the board or called into meeting by the
- 14 presiding officer of the committee.
- 15 <u>(e)</u> The presiding officer of the committee is elected
- 16 annually by the members of the committee.
- 17 (f) The committee shall:
- 18 (1) review data from the statewide health coordinating
- 19 council and other resources to identify physician shortage areas in
- 20 this state;
- 21 (2) to assist the board, review applications for
- 22 approval and funding of physician shortage residency training
- 23 programs and related support programs;
- 24 (3) make recommendations to the board that relate to
- 25 the disbursement of funds under this subchapter and that are based
- 26 on the following criteria:
- (A) whether a program would expand training

- 1 opportunities in medical specialty areas in which there is a
- 2 physician shortage in this state;
- 3 (B) whether a program would be located in a
- 4 medically underserved community in this state;
- 5 (C) whether a program is in a specialty area in
- 6 which a substantial number of graduates of medical schools have
- 7 <u>left this state to pursue training in that specialty area; or</u>
- 8 (D) whether a program would undertake innovative
- 9 approaches to residency training, such as extensive use of
- 10 ambulatory facilities or the creation of medical homes for
- 11 patients; and
- 12 (4) perform any other duties as may be directed by the
- 13 board.
- 14 Sec. 61.516. FUNDING. The board may:
- 15 (1) receive and expend appropriations for purposes of
- 16 this subchapter, including funds generated by fees charged under
- 17 Chapter 153, Occupations Code, in excess of the amount needed for
- 18 the purposes authorized by Section 153.052(b), Occupations Code;
- 19 and
- 20 (2) accept gifts, grants, and donations of real or
- 21 personal property from any entity, subject to limitations or
- 22 conditions set by law, for the purposes of this subchapter.
- SECTION 2. The heading to Subchapter I, Chapter 61,
- 24 Education Code, is amended to read as follows:
- 25 SUBCHAPTER I. CONTRACTS FOR FAMILY PRACTICE [MEDICAL] RESIDENCY
- 26 PROGRAMS
- 27 SECTION 3. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board

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- 1 shall adopt rules to implement Subchapter I-1, Chapter 61,
- 2 Education Code, as added by this Act, not later than January 1,
- 3 2012.
- 4 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 5 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 6 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 7 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 8 Act takes effect September 1, 2011.
