2	relating to transferring adult education and literacy programs to
3	the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board from the Texas
4	Education Agency.
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	ARTICLE 1. HIGHER EDUCATION COORDINATING BOARD RESPONSIBILITY FOR
7	ADULT EDUCATION AND LITERACY PROGRAMS
8	SECTION 1.01. Chapter 61, Education Code, is amended by
9	adding Subchapter HH to read as follows:
10	SUBCHAPTER HH. ADULT EDUCATION AND LITERACY PROGRAMS
11	Sec. 61.9791. DEFINITIONS. In this subchapter:
12	(1) "Adult" means any individual who is over the age of
13	compulsory school attendance prescribed by Section 25.085.
14	(2) "Adult education" means services and instruction
15	provided below the college level for adults by public local
16	education agencies, public nonprofit agencies, or community-based
17	organizations.
18	(3) "Community-based organization" has the meaning
19	assigned by 20 U.S.C. Section 7801.
20	Sec. 61.9792. BOARD DUTIES. (a) The board shall:
21	(1) provide adequate staffing to develop, administer,
22	and support a comprehensive statewide adult education program and
23	coordinate related federal and state programs for the education and
24	training of adults;

- 1 (2) develop the mechanism and guidelines for the
- 2 coordination of comprehensive adult education and related skill
- 3 training services for adults with other organizations, including
- 4 public agencies and private organizations, in planning,
- 5 developing, and implementing related programs;
- 6 (3) administer all state and federal funds for adult
- 7 education and related skill training services in this state, other
- 8 than funds that another entity is specifically authorized to
- 9 administer under other law;
- 10 (4) prescribe and administer standards and
- 11 accrediting policies for adult education;
- 12 (5) prescribe and administer rules for teacher
- 13 certification for adult education;
- 14 (6) accept and administer grants, gifts, services, and
- 15 funds from available sources for use in adult education;
- 16 (7) adopt or develop and administer a standardized
- 17 assessment mechanism for assessing all adult education program
- 18 participants who need literacy instruction, adult basic education,
- 19 or secondary education leading to an adult high school diploma or
- 20 the equivalent; and
- 21 (8) monitor and evaluate educational and employment
- 22 <u>outcomes of students who participate in the board's adult education</u>
- 23 and literacy programs.
- 24 (b) The assessment mechanism prescribed by Subsection
- 25 (a)(7) must include an initial basic skills screening instrument
- 26 and must provide comprehensive information concerning baseline
- 27 student skills before and student progress after participation in

1 an adult education program. 2 Sec. 61.9793. PROVISION OF ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMS. Adult education programs must be provided by public school districts, 3 public junior colleges, public technical institutes, public state 4 5 colleges, general academic teaching institutions, public nonprofit agencies, and community-based organizations approved in accordance 6 7 with state law and with rules adopted by the board. The programs 8 must be designed to meet the education and training needs of adults to the extent possible using available public and private 9 resources. Bilingual education may be used to instruct students 10 who do not function satisfactorily in English whenever it is 11 12 appropriate for those students' optimum development. Sec. 61.9794. ADULT EDUCATION AND LITERACY ADVISORY 13 14 COMMITTEE. (a) The board shall establish an adult education and 15 literacy advisory committee composed of not more than nine members appointed by the board. Members of the advisory committee must have 16 17 expertise in the field of adult education and literacy. The advisory committee must include three representatives from public 18 19 junior or community colleges and may include adult educators, providers, advocates, and current or former adult education and 20 21 literacy program students. 22 The advisory committee shall: (1) meet at least quarterly; 23 24 (2) report to the board at least annually; and 25 (3) advise the board on: 26 (A) the development of policies and program

priorities that support the development of an educated and skilled

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- 1 workforce in this state;
- 2 (B) the development of statewide curriculum
- 3 quidelines and standards for adult education and literacy services
- 4 that ensure a balance of education and workplace skill development;
- 5 and
- 6 (C) any other issue the board considers
- 7 <u>appropriate</u>.
- 8 (c) Chapter 2110, Government Code, does not apply to the
- 9 size, composition, or duration of the advisory committee.
- Sec. 61.9795. STATE FUNDING. (a) Funds shall be
- 11 appropriated to implement statewide adult basic education, adult
- 12 bilingual education, high school equivalency, and high school
- 13 credit programs to eliminate illiteracy in this state and to
- 14 implement and support a statewide program to meet the total range of
- 15 adult needs for adult education and related skill training. The
- 16 board shall ensure that public local education agencies, public
- 17 nonprofit agencies, and community-based organizations have direct
- 18 and equitable access to those funds.
- 19 (b) In addition to any amount appropriated under Subsection
- 20 (a), the legislature may appropriate an additional amount to the
- 21 board for the purpose of skill training in direct support of
- 22 industrial expansion and new business development, and to those
- 23 locations, industries, and occupations designated by the board, if
- 24 the training supports the basic purposes of this subchapter. To
- 25 support the basic purposes of this subchapter, the legislature may
- 26 also appropriate an additional amount to the board for skill
- 27 training that is conducted to support the expansion of civilian

- 1 employment opportunities on United States military reservations.
- 2 (c) Notwithstanding any other provision of this subchapter,
- 3 the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall allocate state
- 4 and federal adult education program funds, other than federal funds
- 5 set aside for state administration, special projects, and staff
- 6 development, to each county based on need, performance, and
- 7 <u>efficiency.</u>
- 8 Sec. 61.97951. SERVICE PROVIDER CONTRACTS: COMPETITIVE
- 9 PROCUREMENT REQUIREMENT. (a) The Texas Higher Education
- 10 Coordinating Board shall use a competitive procurement process to
- 11 <u>award a contract to a service provider of an adult education</u>
- 12 program.
- 13 (b) The board shall adopt rules to administer this section.
- 14 Sec. 61.9796. BIENNIAL REPORT TO THE LEGISLATURE. Not
- 15 later than December 1 of each even-numbered year, the board shall
- 16 report to the legislature regarding the educational and employment
- 17 outcomes of students who participate in the adult education and
- 18 literacy programs under this subchapter.
- 19 Sec. 61.9797. RULES. The board may adopt rules as necessary
- 20 to administer this subchapter.
- 21 ARTICLE 2. TEXAS EDUCATION AGENCY RESPONSIBILITY FOR COMMUNITY
- 22 EDUCATION PROGRAMS; CONFORMING CHANGES
- SECTION 2.01. The heading to Subchapter H, Chapter 29,
- 24 Education Code, is amended to read as follows:
- 25 SUBCHAPTER H. [ADULT AND] COMMUNITY EDUCATION PROGRAMS
- SECTION 2.02. Section 29.251(4), Education Code, is amended
- 27 to read as follows:

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- 1 (4) "Community education" means the process by which
- 2 the citizens in a school district, using the resources and
- 3 facilities of the district, organize to support each other and to
- 4 solve their mutual educational problems and meet their mutual
- 5 lifelong needs. Community education may include:
- 6 (A) educational programs, including programs
- 7 relating to [for occupational and technological skills training,
- 8 retraining of displaced workers, cultural awareness, parenting
- 9 skills education and parental involvement in school programs, and
- 10 multilevel [adult education and] personal growth;
- 11 (B) community involvement programs, including
- 12 programs for community economic development, school volunteers,
- 13 partnerships between schools and businesses, coordination with
- 14 community agencies, school-age child care, family [and workplace]
- 15 literacy, and community use of facilities; and
- 16 (C) programs for youth enrolled in schools,
- 17 including programs for dropout prevention and recovery programs,
- 18 drug-free school programs, school-age parenting programs, and
- 19 academic enhancement.
- SECTION 2.03. Section 29.252, Education Code, is amended to
- 21 read as follows:
- Sec. 29.252. <u>AGENCY</u> [STATE] ROLE IN [ADULT AND] COMMUNITY
- 23 EDUCATION. (a) The agency shall:
- 24 (1) [provide adequate staffing to develop,
- 25 administer, and support a comprehensive statewide adult education
- 26 program and coordinate related federal and state programs for
- 27 education and training of adults;

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 $\left[\frac{(2)}{(2)}\right]$ develop, implement, 1 and regulate comprehensive statewide program for community [level] education 2 services [to meet the special needs of adults]; 3 4 (2) [(3) develop the mechanism and quidelines for 5 coordination of comprehensive adult education and related skill training services for adults with other agencies, both public and 6 private, in planning, developing, and implementing related 7 8 programs, including community education programs; 9 $\left[\frac{(4)}{(4)}\right]$ administer all state and federal funds for 10 community [adult] education [and related skill training] in this state, other than funds that [except in programs for which] another 11 entity is specifically authorized to administer [do-so] under other 12 13 law; and (3) [(5) prescribe and administer standards 14 15 accrediting policies for adult education; 16 [(6) prescribe and administer rules for teacher 17 certification for adult education; $\left[\frac{(7)}{1}\right]$ accept and administer grants, gifts, services, 18 19 and funds from available sources for use in community [adult] education[+ 20 21 [(8) adopt or develop and administer a standardized assessment mechanism for assessing all adult education program 22 participants who need literacy instruction, adult basic education, 23

to improve the coordination and implementation of adult education

or secondary education leading to an adult high school diploma or

[(9) collaborate with the Texas Workforce Commission

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the equivalent;

- 1 and literacy services in this state; and
- [(10) monitor and evaluate educational and employment

 outcomes of students who participate in the agency's adult

 education and literacy programs].
- 5 (b) The agency may adopt rules for the administration of
 6 this subchapter [assessment mechanism prescribed under Subsection
 7 (a)(8) must include an initial basic skills screening instrument
 8 and must provide comprehensive information concerning baseline
 9 student skills before and student progress after participation in
 10 an adult education program].
- 11 SECTION 2.04. Section 29.255, Education Code, is amended to 12 read as follows:
- Sec. 29.255. STATE FUNDING. [(a)] 13 Funds 14 appropriated to implement statewide community [adult basic] 15 education[, adult bilingual education, high school equivalency, and high school credit] programs, including [to eliminate 16 illiteracy in this state and to implement and support a statewide 17 program to meet the total range of adult needs for adult education, 18 related skill training, and] pilot programs to demonstrate the 19 effectiveness of the community education concept. The agency shall 20 ensure that public local education agencies, public nonprofit 21 agencies, and community-based organizations have direct and 22 equitable access to those funds. [An additional sum of money may be 23 24 appropriated to the Texas Department of Commerce for the purpose of skill training in direct support of industrial expansion and 25 start-up, and those locations, industries, and occupations 26 designated by the Texas Department of Commerce, when such training 27

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- 1 is also in support of the basic purposes of this subchapter. To
 2 fulfill the basic purposes of this subchapter, an additional sum of
- 3 money may be appropriated for skill training that is conducted to
- 4 support the expansion of civilian employment opportunities on
- 5 United States military reservations.
- [(b) The agency, in conjunction with the Texas Department of
 Commerce, may adopt rules to administer skill training programs for
 which the agency is responsible, and the Texas Department of
 Commerce may adopt rules to administer skill training programs for
 which it is responsible.
- 11 SECTION 2.05. The following provisions of the Education 12 Code are repealed:
- 13 (1) Section 7.102(16);
- 14 (2) Sections 29.251(1), (2), and (3);
- 15 (3) Section 29.253; and
- 16 (4) Section 29.254.
- 17 ARTICLE 3. TRANSITION PROVISIONS; EFFECTIVE DATE
- 18 SECTION 3.01. (a) On January 1, 2012:
- (1) the administration of adult education and literacy programs shall be transferred from the Texas Education Agency to
- 21 the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board;
- 22 (2) all rules, policies, procedures, and decisions of
- 23 the Texas Education Agency relating to the administration of adult
- 24 education and literacy programs are continued in effect as rules,
- 25 policies, procedures, and decisions of the Texas Higher Education
- 26 Coordinating Board until superseded by a rule or other appropriate
- 27 action by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board; and

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- 1 (3) a reference in law or administrative rule to the
- 2 Texas Education Agency relating to the administration of adult
- 3 education and literacy programs means the Texas Higher Education
- 4 Coordinating Board.
- 5 (b) Not later than October 1, 2011, the Texas Education
- 6 Agency and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall
- 7 enter into a memorandum of understanding relating to the transfer
- 8 of the administration of adult education and literacy programs from
- 9 the Texas Education Agency to the Texas Higher Education
- 10 Coordinating Board as provided by this Act. The memorandum must
- 11 include:
- 12 (1) a timetable and specific steps and methods for the
- 13 transfer on January 1, 2012, of all powers, duties, obligations,
- 14 rights, contracts, leases, records, real or personal property, and
- 15 unspent and unobligated appropriations and other funds relating to
- 16 the administration of adult education and literacy programs from
- 17 the Texas Education Agency to the Texas Higher Education
- 18 Coordinating Board; and
- 19 (2) measures to ensure against any unnecessary
- 20 disruption to adult education and literacy services provided at the
- 21 local level.
- 22 SECTION 3.02. (a) The change in law made by Section
- 23 61.97951(a), Education Code, as added by this Act, applies only to a
- 24 contract entered into on or after September 1, 2012.
- 25 (b) Not later than August 31, 2012, the Texas Higher
- 26 Education Coordinating Board shall adopt rules to provide for a
- 27 competitive procurement process to award contracts to service

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- 1 providers of adult education programs as provided by Section
- 2 61.97951, Education Code, as added by this Act.
- 3 SECTION 3.03. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b) of
- 4 this section, this Act takes effect September 1, 2011.
- 5 (b) Sections 61.9795(c) and 61.97951(a), Education Code, as
- 6 added by this Act, take effect September 1, 2012.
