## CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, During the past four decades, as Americans have 2 increased their consumption of highly processed foods, obesity rates have soared among all age groups and have increased more than 3 fourfold among children ages 6 to 11; today, nearly a third of 4 5 children and adolescents are overweight or obese, which places them at higher risk for a host of serious illnesses; obese children are 6 being diagnosed with health problems previously considered to be 7 adult illnesses, including heart disease, stroke, asthma, and 8 9 certain types of cancer; childhood obesity alone costs the United States an estimated \$14 billion in health care expenses, and it is 10 estimated that the obesity epidemic overall costs the nation \$117 11 12 billion per year in direct medical expenses and indirect costs; and 13 WHEREAS, Low-income individuals are particularly at risk for 14 obesity-related diseases; accordingly, the United States Department of Agriculture has initiated an incentives-based 15 16 program to promote healthier eating among participants in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, formerly known as the 17 food stamp program; and 18 WHEREAS, The 2008 federal Farm Bill authorized \$20 million 19 20 for USDA to test whether incentives to buy fresh produce can 21 increase the purchase of healthy foods; the Healthy Incentives Pilot is being conducted in Hampden County, Massachusetts, where 22 23 7,500 randomly selected SNAP households will receive a 30-cent bonus for every dollar they spend on fruits and vegetables using 24

- 1 their SNAP Electronic Benefit Transfer cards; and
- 2 WHEREAS, Processed foods high in fat and sugar are less
- 3 expensive than fresh produce, and this pilot program represents a
- 4 significant step toward reducing the financial barriers that
- 5 prevent low-income residents from adopting healthier eating
- 6 habits; and
- WHEREAS, Over the course of a year, more than one in seven
- 8 Americans participate in SNAP, half of them being children, and it
- 9 is vital that this program promote healthy eating as well as food
- 10 security; in a 2008 report, the U.S. Government Accountability
- 11 Office found encouraging results from studies examining the
- 12 effectiveness of financial incentives to increase fruit and
- 13 vegetable consumption among SNAP households; and
- 14 WHEREAS, The Healthy Incentives Pilot has the potential to
- 15 positively influence the diets of low-income individuals, thereby
- 16 reducing obesity and its attendant health care costs, and with such
- 17 critical outcomes at stake, the program should not be limited to
- 18 just one community; now, therefore, be it
- 19 RESOLVED, That the 82nd Legislature of the State of Texas
- 20 hereby respectfully urge the United States Congress to expand the
- 21 Healthy Incentives Pilot to communities across the country; and, be
- 22 it further
- 23 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official
- 24 copies of this resolution to the president of the United States, to
- 25 the president of the Senate and the speaker of the House of
- 26 Representatives of the United States Congress, to the secretary of
- 27 agriculture, and to all the members of the Texas delegation to

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- 1 Congress with the request that this resolution be entered in the
- 2 Congressional Record as a memorial to the Congress of the United
- 3 States of America.
