RESOLUTION

- 1 WHEREAS, Sam Houston, one of the most imposing figures ever
- 2 to lead the Lone Star State, was born on March 2, 1793, near
- 3 Lexington, Virginia; and
- WHEREAS, After moving at a young age to eastern Tennessee
- 5 with his widowed mother and eight brothers and sisters, Sam Houston
- 6 ran away from home and lived for three years among the Cherokee,
- 7 with whom he developed close bonds of friendship; and
- 8 WHEREAS, His military valor during the War of 1812 brought
- 9 him to the attention of his commanding general, Andrew Jackson, who
- 10 subsequently helped to advance his career; Sam Houston remained in
- 11 the army until 1818, when he resigned and began the study of law; in
- 12 rapid succession, he was elected prosecuting attorney for the
- 13 District of Nashville, congressman, and, in 1827, governor of
- 14 Tennessee; two years later, however, while campaigning for
- 15 reelection, he separated from his wife; in deep distress, he
- 16 resigned his office and rejoined the Cherokee; and
- WHEREAS, By 1833, Sam Houston had moved to Texas, which he saw
- 18 as a field of vast opportunity; quickly immersing himself in
- 19 politics, he favored breaking away from Mexico and served as a
- 20 delegate to several conventions, including the one that proclaimed
- 21 Texas independence on March 2, 1836; two days later, he was
- 22 commissioned major general of the Texas Army and put in charge of
- 23 the troops at Gonzales; and
- 24 WHEREAS, Commanding inexperienced soldiers and confronting a

- 1 much larger Mexican force, Sam Houston began a more than monthlong
- 2 withdrawal from Gonzales toward the northeast; though severely
- 3 criticized by many, his strategy was vindicated on April 21, 1836,
- 4 when he vanquished the troops under General Antonio Lopez de Santa
- 5 Anna at San Jacinto; and
- 6 WHEREAS, The following September, Sam Houston became the
- 7 first regularly elected president of the Republic of Texas; he
- 8 served until 1838 and again from 1841 to 1844, during which time he
- 9 supported annexation to the United States and worked to maintain
- 10 peace with both Mexico and the Indians; and
- 11 WHEREAS, Greatly admired by many fellow citizens, Sam Houston
- 12 then served as a U.S. senator from 1846 to 1859, when he was elected
- 13 governor; a staunch Unionist, he opposed the extension of slavery
- 14 and argued strenuously against secession; when, in 1861, Texas
- 15 followed a number of other southern states out of the union, he
- 16 refused to take the oath of allegiance to the Confederacy and was
- 17 deposed from office; in the fall of 1862, he moved with his wife,
- 18 Margaret, and their children to Huntsville, where he died on July
- 19 26, 1863; and
- 20 WHEREAS, Huntsville is now home to Sam Houston State
- 21 University, which has been educating Texans for more than 130
- 22 years; Sam Houston's legacy lives on through the school and its
- 23 alumni association, and the celebrated Bob Bullock Texas State
- 24 History Museum continues to tell his story; and
- WHEREAS, A man of exceptional ability, ambition, and force of
- 26 character, Sam Houston shaped the State of Texas and captured the
- 27 imagination of its people as few other individuals have ever done,

- 1 and it is indeed fitting that his life be honored; now, therefore,
- 2 be it
