## RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, A state that is home to iconic American legends,

2 talented residents, diverse settings, and abundant resources for

all aspects of filmmaking, Texas has long been a favorite location

4 for motion picture and television productions, and that rich and

5 ongoing tradition is being celebrated on Texas Moving Image

6 Industry Day at the State Capitol on March 9, 2011; and

WHEREAS, More than 1,800 films and television programs have

8 been made in Texas since 1910; the first movie ever to win the

9 Academy Award for Best Picture, the 1927 World War I epic Wings, was

10 shot in and around San Antonio; and

11 WHEREAS, Audiences all over the world have discovered the

12 Lone Star State through films and television programs made here;

13 Giant, filmed near Marfa, tells the sprawling story of cattle and

14 oil in West Texas; John Wayne's 1960 epic The Alamo brought that

15 essential Texas story to worldwide audiences; the film and

16 television series Friday Night Lights revolve around the

17 distinctively Texan phenomenon of high school football, and 13

18 years after its release, Hope Floats continues to draw tourists to

19 its Smithville locations; Austin City Limits, aired on PBS since

20 1976, is the only television show to receive a National Medal of

21 Arts award; no fewer than nine Texas-made films and television

22 programs, including Terms of Endearment and The Last Picture Show,

23 have been based on the works of legendary Texas writer Larry

24 McMurtry; and

- 1 WHEREAS, Great storytellers from across the nation have employed Texas locations, actors, and technicians to make their 2 3 films; Steven Spielberg shot his first feature, The Sugarland Express, here, Sam Peckinpah filmed his classic thriller The 4 Getaway in San Marcos and El Paso, Clint Eastwood made A Perfect 5 World in Huntsville and Austin, and Joel and Ethan Coen utilized 6 various locations around Texas in Blood Simple and True Grit; and 7 WHEREAS, The state's own writers and directors have produced 8 many great projects here, including Robert Benton (Bonnie and 9 Clyde, Nadine), Horton Foote (Tender Mercies, The 10 Trip to Bountiful), Bill Wittliff (Raggedy Man, Honeysuckle Rose), Wes 11 Anderson (Rushmore), Richard Linklater (Slacker, 12 Dazed and Confused), Tim McCanlies (Dancer, Texas Pop. 81, Secondhand Lions), 13 14 Robert Rodriguez (From Dusk Till Dawn), and John Lee Hancock (The 15 Alamo, The Rookie); and 16 WHEREAS, Texas has hosted a tremendous variety 17 productions, from independent films like Bottle Rocket (shot in Dallas) to classic westerns like Lonesome Dove (shot near Del Rio), 18 19 as well as war dramas like Courage Under Fire (shot in El Paso), family adventures like the four Spy Kids films (shot in Austin), and 20 21 romantic comedies like Miss Congeniality (shot in San Antonio) and Michael (shot in Austin and La Grange); the state has also been the 22 23 location for such Academy Award-winning features as No Country for 24 Old Men and There Will Be Blood (both shot in Marfa), Boys Don't Cry (shot in Greenville), Places in the Heart (shot in Waxahachie), and 25 26 Hud (shot in Claude); and
- 27 WHEREAS, The state is known for its highly skilled film

- 1 technicians, whose expertise is so well-regarded that most films
- 2 shot in Texas hire primarily local crews; the state also boasts a
- 3 strong base of acting talent, and specialized film vendors and
- 4 services have been a strong part of the state's economy for more
- 5 than two decades; and
- 6 WHEREAS, With over 130 companies, Texas is the nation's
- 7 second largest center for the development of video games, and their
- 8 products include such popular titles as *Epic Mickey* from Disney
- 9 Junction Point Studios, Ultima Online, a groundbreaking
- 10 multiplayer game from Origin Systems, and Words With Friends from
- 11 McKinney-based The Zynga With Friends Studio, as well as military
- 12 simulation training games for the U.S. Army; and
- WHEREAS, Over the past decade, the moving image industry,
- 14 including film, television, videos, commercials, animation, and
- 15 video games, has spent more than \$2.5 billion and is estimated to
- 16 have created nearly 56,000 jobs in Texas, and the contributions of
- 17 this dynamic industry to Texas, and of Texans to the industry, are
- 18 truly worthy of recognition; now, therefore, be it
- 19 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 82nd Texas
- 20 Legislature hereby recognize March 9, 2011, as Texas Moving Image
- 21 Industry Day at the State Capitol and commend the many talented and
- 22 creative individuals involved in this exciting field.
