A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the transfer of adult education and literacy programs
3	from the Texas Education Agency to the Texas Higher Education
4	Coordinating Board
5	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
6	ARTICLE 1. CHANGES TO Education Code 61
7	by adding Subchapter EE. to read as follows:
8	Sec. 61.9801. ADULT EDUCATION AND LITERACY PROGRAMS
9	DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
10	(1) "Adult" means any individual who is over the age of
11	compulsory school attendance prescribed by Section 25.085,
12	Education Code.
13	(2) "Adult education" means services and instruction
14	provided below the college level for adults by public local
15	education agencies, public nonprofit agencies, or community-based
16	organizations.
17	Sec. 61.9802. BOARD DUTIES. (a) The board shall:
18	(1) provide adequate staffing to develop, administer,
19	and support a comprehensive statewide adult education program and
20	coordinate related federal and state programs for the education and
21	training of adults;
22	(2) develop the mechanism and guidelines for the
23	coordination of comprehensive adult education and related skill
24	training services for adults with other agencies, both public and

1	private, in planning, developing, and implementing related
2	programs;
3	(3) administer all state and federal funds for adult
4	education and related skill training services in this state, other
5	than funds that another entity is specifically authorized to
6	administer under other law;
7	(4) prescribe and administer standards and accrediting
8	policies for adult education;
9	(5) prescribe and administer rules for teacher
10	certification for adult education;
11	(6) accept and administer grants, gifts, services, and
12	funds from available sources for use in adult education;
13	(7) adopt or develop and administer a standardized
14	assessment mechanism for assessing all adult education program
15	participants who need literacy instruction, adult basic education,
16	or secondary education leading to an adult high school diploma or
17	the equivalent; and
18	(8) monitor and evaluate educational and employment
19	outcomes of students who participate in the board's adult education
20	and literacy programs.
21	(b) The assessment mechanism prescribed by Subsection
22	(a)(7) must include an initial basic skills screening instrument
23	and must provide comprehensive information concerning baseline
24	student skills before and student progress after participation in
25	an adult education program.
26	(c) Not later than December 1 of each even-numbered year,
27	the commission shall report to the legislature regarding the

educational and employment outcomes of students who participate in 1 2 the commission's adult education and literacy programs. (d) 3 The commission may adopt rules for the administration of 4 this chapter. 5 Sec. 61.9803. PROVISION OF ADULT EDUCATION PROGRAMS. Adult education programs must be provided by public school districts, 6 7 public junior colleges, public universities, public nonprofit 8 agencies, and community-based organizations approved in accordance 9 with state statutes and rules adopted by the board. The programs must be designed to meet the education and training needs of adults 10 11 to the extent possible using available public and private resources. Bilingual education may be used to instruct students 12 13 who do not function satisfactorily in English whenever it is 14 appropriate for those students' optimum development. 15 Sec. 61.9804. ADULT EDUCATION AND LITERACY ADVISORY

16 <u>COMMITTEE. (a) In this section, "advisory committee" means the</u> 17 <u>adult education and literacy advisory committee created under this</u> 18 <u>section.</u>

The board shall establish an adult education and 19 (b) 20 literacy advisory committee composed of not more than nine members appointed by the board. Members of the advisory committee must have 21 expertise in the field of adult education and literacy. 22 The advisory must include three representatives from public junior or 23 community colleges and may include adult educators, providers, 24 advocates, and current or former adult education and literacy 25 26 program students.

27 (c) The advisory committee shall:

1	(1) meet at least quarterly;
2	(2) report to the board at least annually; and
3	(3) advise the board on:
4	(A) the development of policies and program
5	priorities that support the development of an educated and skilled
6	workforce in this state;
7	(B) the development of statewide curriculum
8	guidelines and standards for adult education and literacy services
9	that ensure a balance of education and workplace skill development;
10	and
11	(C) any other issue the board considers
12	appropriate.
13	(d) Chapter 2110, Government Code, does not apply to the
14	size, composition, or duration of the advisory committee.
15	Sec. 61.9805. STATE FUNDING. (a) Funds shall be
16	appropriated to implement statewide adult basic education, adult
17	bilingual education, high school equivalency, and high school
18	credit programs to eliminate illiteracy in this state and to
19	implement and support a statewide program to meet the total range of
20	adult needs for adult education and related skill training. The
21	board shall ensure that public local education agencies, public
22	nonprofit agencies, and community-based organizations have direct
23	and equitable access to those funds.
24	(b) In addition to any amount appropriated under Subsection
25	(a), the legislature may appropriate an additional amount to the
26	board for the purpose of skill training in direct support of
27	industrial expansion and start-up, and those locations,

industries, and occupations designated by the board, if the 1 2 training supports the basic purposes of this chapter. To support 3 the basic purposes of this chapter, the legislature may also appropriate an additional amount to the board for skill training 4 that is conducted to support the expansion of civilian employment 5 opportunities on United States military reservations. 6 7 ARTICLE 2. CHANGES TO EDUCATION CODE SECTION 2.01. The heading to Subchapter H, Chapter 29, 8 Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 9 10 SUBCHAPTER H. [ADULT AND] COMMUNITY 11 EDUCATION PROGRAMS SECTION 2.02. Section 29.251(4), Education Code, is amended 12 13 to read as follows: (4) "Community education" means the process by which 14 15 the citizens in a school district, using the resources and facilities of the district, organize to support each other and to 16 solve their mutual educational problems and meet their mutual 17 lifelong needs. Community education may include: 18 educational programs, 19 (A) including programs 20 relating to [for occupational and technological skills training, retraining of displaced workers, cultural awareness, parenting 21 skills education and parental involvement in school programs, and 22 multilevel adult education and personal growth; 23 24 (B) community involvement programs, including programs for community economic development, school volunteers, 25 partnerships between schools and businesses, coordination with 26 27 community agencies, school-age child care, family [and workplace]

1 literacy, and community use of facilities; and

(C) programs for youth enrolled in schools,
including programs for dropout prevention and recovery programs,
drug-free school programs, school-age parenting programs, and
academic enhancement.

6 SECTION 2.03. Section 29.252, Education Code, is amended to 7 read as follows:

8 Sec. 29.252. <u>AGENCY</u> [STATE] ROLE IN [ADULT AND] COMMUNITY 9 EDUCATION. (a) The agency shall:

10 (1) [provide adequate staffing to develop, 11 administer, and support a comprehensive statewide adult education 12 program and coordinate related federal and state programs for 13 education and training of adults;

14 [(2)] develop, implement, and regulate a 15 comprehensive statewide program for community [level] education 16 services [to meet the special needs of adults];

17 (2) [(3) develop the mechanism and guidelines for 18 coordination of comprehensive adult education and related skill 19 training services for adults with other agencies, both public and 20 private, in planning, developing, and implementing related 21 programs, including community education programs;

[(4)] administer all state and federal funds for community [adult] education [and related skill training] in this state, other than funds that [except in programs for which] another entity is specifically authorized to <u>administer</u> [do so] under other law; <u>and</u>

27 (3) [(5) prescribe and administer standards and

accrediting policies for adult education; 1 [(6) prescribe and administer rules for teacher 2 certification for adult education; 3 [(7)] accept and administer grants, gifts services, 4 and funds from available sources for use in community [adult] 5 education[+ 6 7 [(8) adopt or develop and administer a standardized assessment mechanism for assessing all adult education program 8 participants who need literacy instruction, adult basic education, 9 or secondary education leading to an adult high school diploma or 10 11 the equivalent; [(9) collaborate with the Texas Workforce Commission 12 13 to improve the coordination and implementation of adult education and literacy services in this state; and 14 15 [(10) monitor and evaluate educational and employment 16 outcomes of students who participate in the agency's adult education and literacy programs]. 17 (b) The agency may adopt rules for the administration of 18 this subchapter [assessment mechanism prescribed under Subsection 19 (a) (8) must include an initial basic skills screening instrument 20 and must provide comprehensive information concerning baseline 21 student skills before and student progress after participation in 22 an adult education program]. 23 SECTION 2.04. Section 29.255, Education Code, is amended to 24 25 read as follows: Sec. 29.255. STATE FUNDING. [(a)] Funds 26 shall be 27 appropriated to implement statewide community [adult basic]

education [, adult bilingual education, high school equivalency, 1 and high school credit] programs, including [to eliminate 2 illiteracy in this state and to implement and support a statewide 3 program to meet the total range of adult needs for adult education, 4 related skill training, and] pilot programs to demonstrate the 5 effectiveness of the community education concept. The agency shall 6 7 ensure that public local education agencies, public nonprofit agencies, and community-based organizations have direct 8 and equitable access to those funds. [An additional sum of money may be 9 appropriated to the Texas Department of Commerce for the purpose of 10 11 skill training in direct support of industrial expansion and start up, and those locations, industries, and occupations designated by 12 the Texas Department of Commerce, when such training is also in 13 support of the basic purposes of this subchapter. To fulfill the 14 basic purposes of this subchapter, an additional sum of money may be 15 16 appropriated for skill training that is conducted to support the expansion of civilian employment opportunities on United States 17 military reservations. 18

19 [(b) The agency, in conjunction with the Texas Department of 20 Commerce, may adopt rules to administer skill training programs for 21 which the agency is responsible, and the Texas Department of 22 Commerce may adopt rules to administer skill training programs for 23 which it is responsible.]

24 SECTION 2.05. Sections 29.251(1), (2), and (3), 29.253, and 25 29.254, Education Code, are repealed.

26 ARTICLE 3. TRANSITION PROVISIONS; EFFECTIVE DATE
27 SECTION 3.01. (a) On January 1, 2012:

(1) the administration of adult education and literacy
 programs shall be transferred from the Texas Education Agency to
 the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board;

4 (2) all rules, policies, procedures, and decisions of
5 the Texas Education Agency relating to the administration of adult
6 education and literacy programs are continued in effect as rules,
7 policies, procedures, and decisions of the Texas Higher Education
8 Coordinating Board until superseded by a rule or other appropriate
9 action by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board; and

10 (3) a reference in law or administrative rule to the 11 Texas Education Agency relating to the administration of adult 12 education and literacy programs means the Texas Higher Education 13 Coordinating Board.

Not later than October 1, 2011, the Texas Education 14 (b) 15 Agency and the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board shall 16 enter into a memorandum of understanding relating to the transfer of the administration of adult education and literacy programs from 17 the Texas Education Agency to the Texas Higher Education 18 Coordinating Board as provided by this Act. The memorandum must 19 20 include:

(1) a timetable and specific steps and methods for the transfer on January 1, 2012, of all powers, duties, obligations, rights, contracts, leases, records, real or personal property, and unspent and unobligated appropriations and other funds relating to the administration of adult education and literacy programs from the Texas Education Agency to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board; and

1 (2) measures to ensure against any unnecessary 2 disruption to adult education and literacy services provided at the 3 local level.

4 SECTION 3.02. This Act takes effect September 1, 2011.
