SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION

1-9 urging the Congress of the United States to propose and submit to 1-10 the states for ratification a federal balanced budget amendment to 1-11 the Constitution of the United States and, in the event that Congress does not submit such an amendment on or before December 31, 1-12 2011, applying to Congress to call a convention to propose an amendment to that constitution to provide, in the absence of a national emergency and on a two-thirds vote of Congress, for a federal balanced budget and requesting that the legislatures of 1-13 1**-**14 1**-**15 1-16 1-17 each of the several states that compose the United States apply to 1-18 Congress to call a convention to propose such an amendment.

1-19 WHEREAS, The gravity of federal debt and federal obligations 1-20 was established early in American history, with deficits occurring 1-21 only in relation to extraordinary circumstances such as war; yet 1-22 for much of the 20th century and into the 21st, the United States 1-23 has operated on a budget deficit, including the 2010 budget year, 1-24 which surpassed an astounding \$1,300,000,000,000, an annual 1-25 deficit that exceeded the entire gross state product of Texas; and

1-26 WHEREAS, Congress has been unwilling or unable to address the 1-27 persistent problem of overspending and has recently increased the 1-28 statutory limit on the public debt with the passage of H.R.J. 1-29 Res. 45, 111th Congress (2010), and enacted a variety of 1-30 legislation that will ultimately cause the federal government to 1-31 incur additional debt; and

1-32 WHEREAS, The consequences of current spending policies are 1-33 far-reaching; United States indebtedness to governments of foreign 1-34 nations continues to rise; costly federal programs that are 1-35 essentially unfunded or underfunded mandates to states threaten the 1-36 ability of state and local governments to continue to balance their 1-37 budgets; moreover, future generations of Americans inevitably face 1-38 increased taxation and a weakened economy as a direct result of the 1-39 bloated debt; and

1-40 WHEREAS, Many states have previously requested that Congress 1-41 propose a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget, but 1-42 Congress has proven to be unresponsive; anticipating situations in 1-43 which Congress at times could fail to act, the drafters of the 1-44 United States Constitution had the foresight to adopt the language 1-45 in Article V that establishes that on application of the 1-46 legislatures of two-thirds of the several states, Congress shall 1-47 call a convention for proposing amendments; and

1-48 WHEREAS, In both 1977 and 1978, the Texas Legislature made 1-49 application to Congress to call a convention under Article V, and 1-50 through the years, many other states have done the same, all to no 1-51 avail; and

1-52 WHEREAS, A balanced budget amendment would require the 1-53 government not to spend more than it receives in revenue and compel 1-54 lawmakers to carefully consider choices about spending and taxes; 1-55 by encouraging spending control and discouraging deficit spending, 1-56 a balanced budget amendment will help put the nation on the path to 1-57 lasting prosperity; now, therefore, be it

1-58 RESOLVED, That the 82nd Legislature of the State of Texas 1-59 hereby respectfully urge the Congress of the United States to 1-60 propose and submit to the states for ratification a federal 1-61 balanced budget amendment to the United States Constitution; and, 1-62 be it further

1-63 RESOLVED, That, in the event that Congress does not submit a

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balanced budget amendment to the states for ratification on or before December 31, 2011, the 82nd Texas Legislature hereby make application to the United States Congress to call a convention 2-1 2-2 2-3 under Article V of the United States Constitution to propose an 2-4 amendment to that constitution requiring that, in the absence of a national emergency, and as determined by the positive vote of at least two-thirds of the members of each house of Congress, the total 2-5 2-6 2-7 of all federal appropriations made by Congress for any fiscal year 2-8 not exceed the total of all estimated federal revenue for that 2-9 2**-**10 2**-**11 fiscal year; and, be it further

2-11 RESOLVED, That, unless rescinded by a succeeding 2-12 legislature, this application by the 82nd Texas Legislature 2-13 constitutes a continuing application in accordance with Article V 2-14 of the United States Constitution until at least two-thirds of the 2-15 legislatures of the several states have made application for a 2-16 convention to provide for a balanced budget; and, be it further

2-17 RESOLVED, That, in the event that Congress does not submit a 2-18 balanced budget amendment to the states for ratification on or 2-19 before December 31, 2011, the 82nd Texas Legislature hereby request 2-20 that the legislatures of each of the several states that compose the 2-21 United States apply to Congress requesting Congress to call a 2-22 convention to propose such an amendment to the United States 2-23 Constitution; and, be it further

2-24 RESOLVED, That this application is rescinded in the event 2-25 that a convention to propose amendments to the United States 2-26 Constitution includes purposes other than providing for a balanced 2-27 federal budget; and, be it further

2-28 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official copies of this resolution to the president of the United States, to the speaker of the House of Representatives and the president of the Senate of the United States Congress, and to all members of the 2-29 2-30 2-31 2-32 Texas delegation to Congress with the request that this resolution 2-33 be officially entered in the Congressional Record as an application 2-34 to the Congress of the United States of America for a convention to propose an amendment to provide for a federal balanced budget in the event that Congress does not submit such an amendment to the states 2-35 2-36 2-37 for ratification on or before December 31, 2011; and, be it further

2-38 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official 2-39 copies of this resolution to the secretaries of state and to the 2-40 presiding officers of the legislatures of the other states.

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
