IN RE: SB187 by Nelson (Relating to human body and anatomical specimen donation.), As Introduced

No significant fiscal implication to the State is anticipated.

The bill relates to human body and anatomical specimen donation. It requires the Anatomical Board of the States of Texas (Board) to develop an informed consent document to inform a potential living donor or a person making a gift of a decedent's body or anatomical specimen of the risks and benefits associated with donation. It also requires the Board to make the document available on the its Internet website. The Board shall adopt rules to ensure that each person who has control or possession of a body or anatomical specimen completes the chain-of-custody form and maintains the copy of the form for the person's record.

Most of The University of Texas Institutions current have similar processes in place.

The bill takes effect September 1, 2011.
