8	other than the department, that produces for public distribution to

10	terrestrial plant species that includes a species growing in this
11	state shall provide with the list a disclaimer that states: "THIS
12	PLANT LIST IS ONLY A RECOMMENDATION AND HAS NO LEGAL EFFECT IN THE
13	STATE OF TEXAS. IT IS LAWFUL TO SELL, DISTRIBUTE, IMPORT, OR
14	POSSESS A PLANT ON THIS LIST UNLESS THE TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF
15	AGRICULTURE LABELS THE PLANT AS NOXIOUS OR INVASIVE ON THE
16	DEPARTMENT'S PLANT LIST."
17	(b) A public entity, other than the department, that
18	produces a list of noxious or invasive terrestrial plant species in
19	printed material made for public distribution to commercial or
20	residential landscapers, including a newspaper, trade publication,
21	<pre>notice, circular, or Internet website, shall post the disclaimer</pre>
22	required by Subsection (a) in at least 12-point type in a
23	conspicuous location readily visible by persons viewing the list.

- 2 manner equivalent to the manner described by Subsection (b) for
- 3 publication of the entity's list of noxious or invasive terrestrial
- 4 plant species through media not described by Subsection (b),
- 5 including billboards, radio productions, and television
- 6 productions.
- 7 SECTION 2. Section 71.154, Agriculture Code, as added by
- 8 this Act, applies only to a list that is published or distributed on
- 9 or after the effective date of this Act. A list that is published or
- 10 distributed before the effective date of this Act is governed by the
- 11 law in effect immediately before the effective date of this Act, and
- 12 the former law is continued in effect for that purpose.
- SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2011.
