20	being accepted by peers, including pressure to engage in drugs,
21	alcohol, and sex, measuring up to expectations of others, and
22	coping with family and peer conflicts;
23	(5) increased levels of victimization also lead to
24	increased levels of depression and anxiety and decreased levels of

- SECTION 3. Chapter 161, Health and Safety Code, is amended

- 20 PREVENTION. (a) The department, in coordination with the Texas
- 21 Education Agency, shall provide and annually update a list of
- 22 <u>recommended best practice-based early mental health intervention</u>
- 23 and suicide prevention programs for implementation in public
- 24 elementary, junior high, middle, and high schools within the
- 25 general education setting. Each school district may select from
- 26 the list a program or programs appropriate for implementation in
- 27 the district.

1 (b) The programs on the list must include components that 2 provide for training counselors, teachers, nurses, administrators, and other staff, as well as law enforcement officers and social 3 4 workers who regularly interact with students, to: 5 (1) recognize students at risk of committing suicide, 6 including students who are or may be the victims of or who engage in 7 bullying prohibited in accordance with Section 37.0832, Education 8 Code; 9 (2) recognize students displaying early warning signs 10 and a necessity for early mental health intervention, which warning signs may include declining academic performance, depression, 11 12 anxiety, isolation, unexplained changes in sleep or eating habits, 13 and destructive behavior toward self and others; and 14 (3) intervene effectively with students described by 15 Subdivision (1) or (2) by providing notice and referral to a parent 16 or guardian so appropriate action, such as seeking mental health 17 services, may be taken by a parent or guardian. 18 (c) In developing the list of programs, the department and 19 the Texas Education Agency shall consider: 20 (1) any existing suicide prevention method developed by a school district under Section 11.252(a)(3)(B) 21 or 22 33.006(b)(1)(A), Education Code; and (2) any Internet or online course or program developed 23 24 in this state or another state that is based on best practices recognized by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services 25

## No significant fiscal implication to the State is anticipated.

The Texas Education Agency anticipates that modifications to the Public Education Information Management System (PEIMS) would be needed in order to collect the new data elements required by the bill, but associated costs are not expected to be significant.

#### **Local Government Impact**

No significant fiscal implication to units of local government is anticipated.

The cost to update the local student information system (SIS) to collect the new data would vary by district to make modifications that were based on statutory requirements.

School districts would likely incur some administrative costs to collect and submit information on bullying. These costs would vary depending on the number of incidents requiring reporting.

School districts may experience some administrative costs to provide training regarding the prevention of harassment and discrimination, to develop policies that prohibit bullying, and to provide annual written notice of the policies. They may also experience some administrative costs related to handling requests to transfer perpetrators of bullying and to provide notices to parents and guardians of each student involved in a bullying incident.
