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A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to health education curriculum and instruction in public 3 schools to reduce the demand for abortion. BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 5 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that: 6 (1)Texas led the nation in 2010 in the rate of teenage 7 girls who had second children, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; 8 9 (2) approximately 22 percent of births in Texas and 18.3 percent of births in the United States by girls age 15 to 19 10 were repeat births in 2010, compared to 19.5 percent in the United 11 12 States in 2007; 13 an estimated 80 percent of teen births (3) are 14 unintended and cost American taxpayers approximately \$11 billion a year and cost Texas taxpayers \$1.2 billion in 2008, according to the 15 16 National Campaign to Prevent Teen and Unplanned Pregnancy; (4) the only certain way to avoid the termination of an 17 unwanted pregnancy is to prevent the unwanted pregnancy; 18 (5) the state has a compelling state interest 19 in ensuring that there is appropriate knowledge of how a pregnancy 20 21 occurs and how a pregnancy can be avoided; and 22 (6) according to the Centers for Disease Control and 23 Prevention, effective strategies to reduce teen pregnancy include evidence-based sex education that provides accurate information 24

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1 and supports the needs of teens throughout their development.

2 SECTION 2. Section 28.004, Education Code, is amended by 3 amending Subsection (e) and adding Subsection (o) to read as 4 follows:

(e) Any course materials and instruction relating to human
sexuality, sexually transmitted diseases, or human
immunodeficiency virus or acquired immune deficiency syndrome
shall be selected by the board of trustees with the advice of the
local school health advisory council and must:

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(1) <u>be evidence-based;</u>

11 (2) present abstinence from sexual activity as the 12 preferred choice of behavior in relationship to all sexual activity 13 for unmarried persons of school age;

14 <u>(3)</u> [(2)] devote more attention to abstinence from 15 sexual activity than to any other behavior;

16 <u>(4)</u> [(3)] emphasize that abstinence from sexual 17 activity, if used consistently and correctly, is the only method 18 that is 100 percent effective in preventing pregnancy, sexually 19 transmitted diseases, infection with human immunodeficiency virus, 20 [or] acquired immune deficiency syndrome, and the emotional trauma 21 associated with adolescent sexual activity;

22 (5) [(4)] direct adolescents to a standard of behavior 23 in which abstinence from sexual activity before marriage is the 24 most effective way to prevent pregnancy, sexually transmitted 25 diseases, [and] infection with human immunodeficiency virus, and 26 [or] acquired immune deficiency syndrome; and

27 (6) [(5)] teach contraception and condom use in terms

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1 of human use reality rates instead of theoretical laboratory rates, 2 if instruction on contraception and condoms is included in 3 curriculum content.

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4 (o) In this section, "evidence-based" means information
5 verified or supported by research that is:

6 (1) conducted in compliance with accepted scientific
7 methods;

8 (2) published in peer-reviewed journals, if 9 appropriate;

10 <u>(3) recognized as medically accurate, objective, and</u> 11 <u>complete by mainstream professional organizations and agencies</u> 12 <u>with expertise in the relevant field, including the federal Centers</u> 13 <u>for Disease Control and Prevention and the United States Department</u> 14 <u>of Health and Human Services; and</u>

15 (4) proven through rigorous, scientific evaluation to 16 achieve positive outcomes on measures of sexual risk behavior or 17 its health consequences.

SECTION 3. This Act applies beginning with the 2013-2014 school year.

20 SECTION 4. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 21 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 22 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 23 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 24 Act takes effect on the 91st day after the last day of the 25 legislative session.

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
