## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

- 2 relating to the use of radio frequency identification technology to
- 3 transmit information regarding public school students.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. Subchapter Z, Chapter 25, Education Code, is
- 6 amended by adding Section 25.902 to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 25.902. CERTAIN MANDATORY STUDENT IDENTIFICATION
- 8 METHODS PROHIBITED. (a) In this section, "radio frequency
- 9 <u>identification technology" means a wireless identification system</u>
- 10 that uses an electromagnetic radio frequency signal to transmit
- 11 data without physical contact between a card, badge, or tag and
- 12 <u>another device</u>.
- 13 (b) A school district may not require a student to use an
- 14 identification device that uses radio frequency identification
- 15 technology or similar technology to identify the student, transmit
- 16 information regarding the student, or track the location of the
- 17 student.

- 18 <u>(c) A school district may allow the voluntary use of a</u>
- 19 student identification device described by Subsection (b) only if
- 20 authorized by resolution adopted by the board of trustees of the
- 21 district. A district that allows the voluntary use of a student
- 22 identification device described by Subsection (b) shall provide an
- 23 alternative method of identification for a student on the timely
- 24 written request of a student's parent or guardian.

- 1 (d) A school district may not penalize a student using an
- 2 alternative method of identification under Subsection (c),
- 3 including restricting or prohibiting the student from
- 4 participating in school or district activities.
- 5 SECTION 2. This Act applies beginning with the 2013-2014
- 6 school year.
- 7 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 8 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 9 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 10 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 11 Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
