## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

## AN ACT

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relating to the disposition of certain seized weapons.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

4 SECTION 1. Article 18.19, Code of Criminal Procedure, is 5 amended by amending Subsections (c), (d), and (e) and adding 6 Subsection (d-1) to read as follows:

If there is no prosecution or conviction for an offense 7 (c) involving the weapon seized, the magistrate to whom the seizure was 8 9 reported shall, before the 61st day after the date the magistrate determines that there will be no prosecution or conviction, notify 10 11 in writing the person found in possession of the weapon that the 12 person is entitled to the weapon upon written request to the magistrate. The magistrate shall order the weapon returned to the 13 14 person found in possession before the 61st day after the date the magistrate receives a request from the person. If the weapon is not 15 requested before the 61st day after the date of notification, the 16 magistrate shall, before the 121st day after the date of 17 notification, order the weapon destroyed, sold at public sale by 18 the law enforcement agency holding the weapon or by an auctioneer 19 licensed under Chapter 1802, Occupations Code, or forfeited to the 20 21 state for use by the law enforcement agency holding the weapon or by a county forensic laboratory designated by the magistrate. If the 22 23 magistrate does not order the return, destruction, sale, or forfeiture of the weapon within the applicable period prescribed by 24

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1 this subsection, the law enforcement agency holding the weapon may request an order of destruction, sale, or forfeiture of the weapon 2 3 from the magistrate. Only a firearms dealer licensed under 18 U.S.C. Section 923 may purchase a weapon at public sale under this 4 subsection. Proceeds from the sale of a seized weapon under this 5 subsection shall be transferred, after the deduction of court costs 6 to which a district court clerk is entitled under Article 59.05(f), 7 followed by the deduction of auction costs, to the law enforcement 8 agency holding the weapon. 9

A person either convicted or receiving deferred 10 (d) adjudication under Chapter 46, Penal Code, is entitled to the 11 12 weapon seized upon request to the court in which the person was convicted or placed on deferred adjudication. However, the court 13 14 entering the judgment shall order the weapon destroyed, sold at 15 public sale by the law enforcement agency holding the weapon or by an auctioneer licensed under Chapter 1802, Occupations Code, 16 or 17 forfeited to the state for use by the law enforcement agency holding the weapon or by a county forensic laboratory designated by the 18 court if: 19

(1) the person does not request the weapon before the
61st day after the date of the judgment of conviction or the order
placing the person on deferred adjudication;

(2) the person has been previously convicted under
24 Chapter 46, Penal Code;

(3) the weapon is one defined as a prohibited weaponunder Chapter 46, Penal Code;

27 (4) the offense for which the person is convicted or

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receives deferred adjudication was committed in or on the premises
 of a playground, school, video arcade facility, or youth center, as
 those terms are defined by Section 481.134, Health and Safety Code;
 or

5 (5) the court determines based on the prior criminal 6 history of the defendant or based on the circumstances surrounding 7 the commission of the offense that possession of the seized weapon 8 would pose a threat to the community or one or more individuals.

9 <u>(d-1) Only a firearms dealer licensed under 18 U.S.C.</u> 10 <u>Section 923 may purchase a weapon at public sale under Subsection</u> 11 <u>(d). Proceeds from the sale of a seized weapon under Subsection (d)</u> 12 <u>shall be transferred, after the deduction of court costs to which a</u> 13 <u>district court clerk is entitled under Article 59.05(f), followed</u> 14 <u>by the deduction of auction costs, to the law enforcement agency</u> 15 <u>holding the weapon.</u>

(e) If the person found in possession of a weapon is 16 convicted of an offense involving the use of the weapon, before the 17 61st day after the date of conviction the court entering judgment of 18 19 conviction shall order destruction of the weapon, sale at public sale by the law enforcement agency holding the weapon or by an 20 auctioneer licensed under Chapter 1802, Occupations Code, 21 or forfeiture to the state for use by the law enforcement agency 22 holding the weapon or by a county forensic laboratory designated by 23 the court. If the court entering judgment of conviction does not 24 order the destruction, sale, or forfeiture of the weapon within the 25 26 period prescribed by this subsection, the law enforcement agency holding the weapon may request an order of destruction, sale, or 27

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1	forfeiture of the weapon from a magistrate. Only a firearms dealer
2	licensed under 18 U.S.C. Section 923 may purchase a weapon at public
3	sale under this subsection. Proceeds from the sale of a seized
4	weapon under this subsection shall be transferred, after the
5	deduction of court costs to which a district court clerk is entitled
6	under Article 59.05(f), followed by the deduction of auction costs,
7	to the law enforcement agency holding the weapon.
8	SECTION 2. This Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
