H.B. No. 3241

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT  
2 relating to the civil prosecution of racketeering related to  
3 trafficking of persons; providing penalties.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Title 6, Civil Practice and Remedies Code, is  
6 amended by adding Chapter 140 to read as follows:

7 CHAPTER 140. CIVIL RACKETEERING RELATED TO TRAFFICKING OF PERSONS

8 Sec. 140.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:

9 (1) "Acquire" means an act to:

10 (A) possess property;

11 (B) prevent another person from using that  
12 person's property or dictate the terms of use of that property;

13 (C) bring about or receive the transfer of any  
14 interest in property, whether to oneself or to another person; or

15 (D) secure performance of a service.

16 (2) "Enterprise" means a legal entity, a group of  
17 individuals associated in fact, or a combination of entities and  
18 individuals.

19 (3) "Gain" means a benefit, an interest, or property,  
20 without reduction for expenses incurred in acquiring or maintaining  
21 the benefit, interest, or property or incurred for any other  
22 reason.

23 (4) "Proceeds" means an interest in property acquired  
24 or derived from, produced or realized through, or directly or  
25 indirectly caused by an act or omission, and the fruits of the

1 interest, in any form.

2 (5) "Racketeering" means an act described by Section  
3 140.002.

4 Sec. 140.002. CIVIL RACKETEERING. A person or enterprise  
5 commits racketeering if, for financial gain, the person or  
6 enterprise commits an offense under Chapter 20A, Penal Code  
7 (trafficking of persons), and the offense or an element of the  
8 offense:

9 (1) occurs in more than one county in this state; or

10 (2) is facilitated by the use of United States mail,  
11 e-mail, telephone, facsimile, or a wireless communication from one  
12 county in this state to another.

13 Sec. 140.003. SUIT TO ABATE RACKETEERING. (a) The attorney  
14 general may bring suit in the name of the state against a person or  
15 enterprise for racketeering and may seek civil penalties, costs,  
16 reasonable attorney's fees, and appropriate injunctive relief.

17 (b) This chapter does not authorize suit by a person or  
18 enterprise that sustains injury as a result of racketeering.

19 (c) A suit under this chapter must be brought in a district  
20 court in a county in which all or part of the alleged racketeering  
21 offense giving rise to the suit occurred.

22 Sec. 140.004. INJUNCTIVE RELIEF; OTHER REMEDIES. (a) A  
23 court in which a proceeding is brought under this chapter may  
24 prevent, restrain, and remedy racketeering by issuing appropriate  
25 orders. The orders may include a temporary restraining order, a  
26 temporary or permanent injunction, the creation of a receivership,  
27 and the enforcement of a constructive trust in connection with any

1 property or other interest, prejudgment writs of attachment under  
2 Chapter 61 for the purposes of freezing, preserving, and disgorging  
3 assets, or another order for a remedy or restraint the court  
4 considers proper.

5 (b) Following a final determination of liability under this  
6 chapter, the court may issue an appropriate order, including an  
7 order that:

8 (1) requires a person to divest any direct or indirect  
9 interest in an enterprise;

10 (2) imposes reasonable restrictions on the future  
11 activities or investments of a person that affect the laws of this  
12 state, including prohibiting a person from engaging in the type of  
13 endeavor or enterprise that gave rise to the racketeering offense,  
14 to the extent permitted by the constitutions of this state and the  
15 United States;

16 (3) requires the dissolution or reorganization of an  
17 enterprise involved in the suit;

18 (4) orders the recovery of reasonable fees, expenses,  
19 and costs incurred in obtaining injunctive relief or civil remedies  
20 or in conducting investigations under this chapter, including court  
21 costs, attorney's fees, witness fees, and deposition fees;

22 (5) orders payment to the state of an amount equal to:

23 (A) the gain acquired or maintained through  
24 racketeering; or

25 (B) the amount for which a person is liable under  
26 this chapter;

27 (6) orders payment to the state of a civil penalty by a

1 person or enterprise found liable for racketeering, in an amount  
2 not to exceed \$250,000 for each separately alleged and proven act of  
3 racketeering;

4 (7) orders payment of damages to the state for  
5 racketeering shown to have materially damaged the state; or

6 (8) orders that property attached under Chapter 61 be  
7 used to satisfy an award of the court, including damages,  
8 penalties, costs, and fees.

9 (c) In determining the amount of a civil penalty ordered  
10 under Subsection (b)(6), the court shall consider:

11 (1) the seriousness of the racketeering offense and  
12 the consequent financial or personal harm to the state or to any  
13 identified victim; and

14 (2) the duration of the racketeering activity.

15 (d) If any property attached under Chapter 61 is not  
16 necessary to satisfy an award of the court after a finding of  
17 liability for racketeering of the person or enterprise having an  
18 interest in the property, the court may order that the property be  
19 disgorged to the state to the extent of the person's or enterprise's  
20 interest. To be disgorged, the property must be acquired or  
21 maintained by the person or enterprise through racketeering.

22 (e) In determining the amount of damages ordered under  
23 Subsection (b)(7), the court shall consider:

24 (1) loss of tax revenue to the state;

25 (2) unpaid state unemployment taxes;

26 (3) unpaid state licensing and regulatory fees;

27 (4) medical and counseling costs incurred by the state

1 on behalf of any victim of the racketeering; and

2 (5) other material damage caused to the state by the  
3 racketeering.

4 (f) Except as otherwise provided by this chapter, remedies  
5 and awards ordered by a court under this chapter, including costs  
6 and reasonable attorney's fees, may be assessed against and paid  
7 from money or property awarded under this chapter.

8 (g) This chapter is not intended to provide the exclusive  
9 remedy for the activity addressed by this chapter. A proceeding  
10 under this chapter may be brought in addition to or in the  
11 alternative of any other civil or criminal action available under  
12 the laws of this state.

13 (h) Notwithstanding any other provision in this chapter,  
14 Articles 59.13 and 59.14, Code of Criminal Procedure, apply to a  
15 remedy under this section.

16 (i) A remedy under this section may not impair a security  
17 interest in property subject to a bona fide lien.

18 Sec. 140.005. CONSTRUCTIVE TRUST. (a) A person or  
19 enterprise that, through racketeering, acquires property or  
20 prevents another person from receiving property that by law is  
21 required to be transferred or paid to that person is an involuntary  
22 trustee. The involuntary trustee or any other person or  
23 enterprise, other than a bona fide purchaser for value as described  
24 by Subsection (b), holds the property and the proceeds of the  
25 property in constructive trust for the benefit of any person  
26 entitled to remedies under this chapter.

27 (b) A bona fide purchaser for value who was reasonably

1 without notice of unlawful conduct and who did not knowingly take  
2 part in an illegal transaction is not an involuntary trustee under  
3 Subsection (a) and is not subject to a constructive trust imposed  
4 under this chapter.

5 Sec. 140.006. EVIDENCE. (a) In a proceeding under this  
6 chapter, the state bears the burden of proof by a preponderance of  
7 the evidence.

8 (b) A person convicted in a criminal proceeding is  
9 precluded, in a proceeding under this chapter, from subsequently  
10 denying the essential allegations of the criminal offense of which  
11 the person was convicted. For purposes of this subsection, a  
12 verdict or a plea, including a plea of nolo contendere, is  
13 considered a conviction.

14 (c) An individual may not be held liable under this chapter  
15 based on the conduct of another person unless the finder of fact  
16 finds by a preponderance of the evidence that the individual  
17 authorized, requested, commanded, participated in, ratified, or  
18 recklessly tolerated the unlawful conduct of the other person.

19 (d) An enterprise may not be held liable under this chapter  
20 based on the conduct of an agent unless the finder of fact finds by a  
21 preponderance of the evidence that a director or high managerial  
22 agent performed, authorized, requested, commanded, participated  
23 in, ratified, or recklessly tolerated the unlawful conduct of the  
24 agent.

25 (e) A bank or savings and loan association insured by the  
26 Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, a credit union insured by  
27 the National Credit Union Administration, or the holder of a money

1 transmission license as defined by Chapter 151, Finance Code, may  
2 not be held liable in damages or for other relief under this  
3 chapter, unless the finder of fact finds by a preponderance of the  
4 evidence that the person or agent acquiring or maintaining an  
5 interest in or transporting, transacting, transferring, or  
6 receiving the funds on behalf of another did so knowing that the  
7 funds were the proceeds of an offense and that a director or high  
8 managerial agent performed, authorized, requested, commanded,  
9 participated in, ratified, or recklessly tolerated the unlawful  
10 conduct of the person or agent.

11 Sec. 140.007. LIMITATIONS PERIOD. A proceeding may be  
12 commenced under this chapter only if the proceeding is filed on or  
13 before the seventh anniversary of the date on which the  
14 racketeering offense was actually discovered. This section  
15 supersedes any conflicting provision establishing a shorter period  
16 of limitations for the same conduct.

17 Sec. 140.008. SPECIAL DOCKETING PROCEDURES. The attorney  
18 general may file with the clerk of the district court in which a  
19 proceeding is brought under this chapter a certificate stating that  
20 the case is of special public importance. The clerk must  
21 immediately furnish a copy of the certificate to the administrative  
22 judge of the district court of the county in which the proceeding is  
23 pending. On receiving the copy of the certificate, the  
24 administrative judge shall immediately designate a judge to hear  
25 and determine the proceeding. The designated judge shall promptly  
26 assign the proceeding for hearing, participate in hearings, make  
27 determinations, and cause the action to be expedited.

1       Sec. 140.009. NOTICE TO LOCAL PROSECUTOR. (a) In a  
2 reasonable time before initiating suit or on initiating an  
3 investigation on racketeering, the attorney general shall provide  
4 notice to the district attorney, criminal district attorney, or  
5 county attorney with felony criminal jurisdiction that appears to  
6 have primary jurisdiction over the criminal prosecution of any  
7 target of an investigation under this chapter at the time of the  
8 notice concerning the attorney general's intent to file suit under  
9 this chapter or investigate racketeering, as applicable.

10       (b) The notices described by Subsection (a) must describe or  
11 otherwise identify the defendant to the suit or the suspect, as  
12 applicable.

13       Sec. 140.010. COOPERATION WITH LOCAL PROSECUTOR. (a) A  
14 district attorney, criminal district attorney, or county attorney  
15 with felony criminal jurisdiction that receives notice under  
16 Section 140.009 may notify the attorney general of a related  
17 pending criminal investigation or prosecution.

18       (b) On receipt of notice described by Subsection (a), the  
19 attorney general shall coordinate and cooperate with the district  
20 attorney, criminal district attorney, or county attorney with  
21 felony criminal jurisdiction to ensure that the filing of a suit  
22 under this chapter does not interfere with an ongoing criminal  
23 investigation or prosecution. The attorney general shall update  
24 the district attorney, criminal district attorney, or county  
25 attorney with felony criminal jurisdiction on matters affecting the  
26 suit or the investigation.

27       Sec. 140.011. ABATEMENT OF SUIT. If the district attorney,



1 criminal district attorney, or county attorney with felony criminal  
2 jurisdiction determines that a suit brought under this chapter  
3 would interfere with an ongoing criminal investigation or  
4 prosecution after notifying the attorney general of the  
5 investigation or prosecution under Section 140.010, the district  
6 attorney, criminal district attorney, or county attorney with  
7 felony criminal jurisdiction may request, in writing, that the  
8 attorney general abate the suit. On receipt of this request, the  
9 attorney general shall abate the suit.

10 Sec. 140.012. DISPOSITION OF ASSETS. (a) An award issued  
11 in an action brought under this chapter must be paid in accordance  
12 with this section.

13 (b) After a deduction of any costs of suit, including  
14 reasonable attorney's fees and court costs, 80 percent of the  
15 amount of the award remaining must be paid to the state, and the  
16 remaining 20 percent must be paid, on a pro rata basis, to each law  
17 enforcement agency, district attorney's office, criminal district  
18 attorney's office, and office of a county attorney with felony  
19 criminal jurisdiction found by the court to have assisted in the  
20 suit.

21 (c) The first \$10 million, after any costs of suit described  
22 by Subsection (b), that is paid to the state under this chapter in a  
23 fiscal year shall be dedicated to the compensation to victims of  
24 crime fund described by Article 56.54, Code of Criminal Procedure.

25 Sec. 140.013. PREVIOUSLY SEIZED ASSETS. Notwithstanding  
26 another provision of this chapter, no remedies provided by this  
27 chapter may be assessed against proceeds, contraband, or other

1 property over which a law enforcement agency has previously  
2 asserted jurisdiction under Chapter 59, Code of Criminal Procedure,  
3 at the time a suit under this chapter was filed.

4         SECTION 2. Chapter 140, Civil Practice and Remedies Code,  
5 as added by this Act, applies only to a civil action based on an  
6 offense under Chapter 20A, Penal Code, committed on or after the  
7 effective date of this Act. A civil action based on an offense  
8 committed before the effective date of this Act is governed by the  
9 law in effect when the offense was committed, and that law continues  
10 in effect for that purpose. For the purposes of this section, an  
11 offense was committed before the effective date of this Act if any  
12 element of the offense occurred before that date.

13         SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives  
14 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as  
15 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this  
16 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this  
17 Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
