A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to counselors employed by school districts, including the 3 use of consistent terminology in the Education Code to refer to 4 school counselors and a license requirement for licensed 5 professional counselors employed by school districts.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

7 SECTION 1. Section 7.055(b)(18), Education Code, is amended 8 to read as follows:

9 (18) The commissioner shall adopt a recommended 10 appraisal process and criteria on which to appraise the performance 11 of teachers, a recommended appraisal process and criteria on which 12 to appraise the performance of administrators, and a job 13 description and evaluation form for use in evaluating <u>school</u> 14 counselors, as provided by Subchapter H, Chapter 21.

15 SECTION 2. Section 11.252(a), Education Code, is amended to 16 read as follows:

(a) Each school district shall have a district improvement 17 plan that is developed, evaluated, and revised annually, in 18 accordance with district policy, by the superintendent with the 19 assistance of the district-level committee established under 20 Section 11.251. The purpose of the district improvement plan is to 21 guide district and campus staff in the improvement of student 22 23 performance for all student groups in order to attain state standards in respect to the student achievement indicators adopted 24

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1 under Section 39.053. The district improvement plan must include
2 provisions for:

3 (1)а comprehensive needs assessment addressing district student performance student 4 on the achievement 5 indicators, and other appropriate measures of performance, that are disaggregated by all student groups served by the district, 6 including categories of ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sex, and 7 8 populations served by special programs, including students in special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29; 9

10 (2) measurable district performance objectives for 11 all appropriate student achievement indicators for all student 12 populations, including students in special education programs 13 under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, and other measures of student 14 performance that may be identified through the comprehensive needs 15 assessment;

16 (3) strategies for improvement of student performance 17 that include:

18 (A) instructional methods for addressing the19 needs of student groups not achieving their full potential;

(B) methods for addressing the needs of studentsfor special programs, including:

(i) suicide prevention programs, in
 accordance with Subchapter O-1, Chapter 161, Health and Safety
 Code, which includes a parental or guardian notification procedure;
 (ii) conflict resolution programs;

26 (iii) violence prevention programs; and 27 (iv) dyslexia treatment programs;

C.S.H.B. No. 3809 1 (C) dropout reduction; 2 (D) integration of technology in instructional 3 and administrative programs; 4 (E) discipline management; 5 (F) staff development for professional staff of 6 the district; (G) education to 7 career assist students in 8 developing the knowledge, skills, and competencies necessary for a broad range of career opportunities; and 9 accelerated education; 10 (H) (4) strategies for providing to middle school, junior 11 high school, and high school students, those students' teachers and 12 school counselors, and those students' parents information about: 13 14 (A) higher education admissions and financial 15 aid opportunities; 16 (B) the TEXAS grant program and the Teach for 17 Texas grant program established under Chapter 56; (C) the need for students to make informed 18 curriculum choices to be prepared for success beyond high school; 19 20 and sources of information on higher education 21 (D) 22 admissions and financial aid; (5) 23 resources needed implement identified to 24 strategies; 25 (6) staff responsible for ensuring the accomplishment 26 of each strategy; 27 (7) timelines for ongoing monitoring of the

1 implementation of each improvement strategy;

2 (8) formative evaluation criteria for determining 3 periodically whether strategies are resulting in intended 4 improvement of student performance; and

5 (9) the policy under Section 38.0041 addressing sexual6 abuse and other maltreatment of children.

7 SECTION 3. Section 12.1059, Education Code, is amended to 8 read as follows:

Sec. 12.1059. AGENCY CERTAIN 9 APPROVAL REQUIRED FOR 10 EMPLOYEES. A person may not be employed by or serve as a teacher, librarian, educational aide, administrator, or <u>school</u> counselor 11 for an open-enrollment charter school unless the person has been 12 approved by the agency following a review of the person's national 13 14 criminal history record information as provided by Section 22.0832.

SECTION 4. Sections 12.133(b), (c), (d), and (e), Education
Code, are amended to read as follows:

17 (b) Each school year, using state funds received by the charter holder for that purpose under Subsection (d), a charter 18 19 holder that participated in the program under Chapter 1579, Insurance Code, for the 2005-2006 school year shall provide 20 employees of the charter holder, other than administrators, 21 compensation in the form of annual salaries, incentives, or other 22 23 compensation determined appropriate by the charter holder that 24 results in an average compensation increase for classroom teachers, full-time librarians, full-time school counselors, and full-time 25 26 school nurses who are employed by the charter holder and who would be entitled to a minimum salary under Section 21.402 if employed by 27

1 a school district, in an amount at least equal to \$2,500.

Each school year, using state funds received by the 2 (c) 3 charter holder for that purpose under Subsection (e), a charter holder that did not participate in the program under Chapter 1579, 4 Insurance Code, for the 2005-2006 school year shall provide 5 employees of the charter holder, other than administrators, 6 compensation in the form of annual salaries, incentives, or other 7 8 compensation determined appropriate by the charter holder that results in an average compensation increase for classroom teachers, 9 full-time librarians, full-time <u>school</u> counselors, and full-time 10 school nurses who are employed by the charter holder and who would 11 12 be entitled to a minimum salary under Section 21.402 if employed by a school district, in an amount at least equal to \$2,000. 13

14 Each school year, in addition to any amounts to which a (d) 15 charter holder is entitled under this chapter, a charter holder that participated in the program under Chapter 1579, Insurance 16 17 Code, for the 2005-2006 school year is entitled to state aid in an amount, as determined by the commissioner, equal to the product of 18 19 \$2,500 multiplied by the number of classroom teachers, full-time librarians, full-time school counselors, and full-time school 20 nurses employed by the charter holder at an open-enrollment charter 21 22 school.

(e) Each school year, in addition to any amounts to which a charter holder is entitled under this chapter, a charter holder that did not participate in the program under Chapter 1579, Insurance Code, for the 2005-2006 school year is entitled to state aid in an amount, as determined by the commissioner, equal to the

1 product of \$2,000 multiplied by the number of classroom teachers, 2 full-time librarians, full-time <u>school</u> counselors, and full-time 3 school nurses employed by the charter holder at an open-enrollment 4 charter school.

5 SECTION 5. Section 19.007(f), Education Code, is amended to 6 read as follows:

In addition to other amounts received by the district 7 (f) under this section, the district is entitled to state aid in an 8 amount equal to the product of \$2,000 multiplied by the number of 9 10 classroom teachers, full-time librarians, full-time school counselors certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, and full-time 11 12 school nurses who are employed by the district and who would be entitled to a minimum salary under Section 21.402 if employed by a 13 14 school district operating under Chapter 11.

15 SECTION 6. Sections 19.009(d-1) and (d-2), Education Code, 16 are amended to read as follows:

17 (d-1) Each school year, the district shall pay an amount at least equal to \$2,000 to each classroom teacher, full-time 18 19 librarian, full-time school counselor certified under Subchapter B, Chapter 21, and full-time school nurse who is employed by the 20 district and who would be entitled to a minimum salary under Section 21 21.402 if employed by a school district operating under Chapter 22 A payment under this section is in addition to wages the 23 11. 24 district would otherwise pay the employee during the school year.

22 SECTION 8. Section 21.003, Education Code, is amended to 23 read as follows:

Sec. 21.003. CERTIFICATION REQUIRED. (a) A person may not be employed as a teacher, teacher intern or teacher trainee, librarian, educational aide, administrator, educational diagnostician, or <u>school</u> counselor by a school district unless the

1 person holds an appropriate certificate or permit issued as 2 provided by Subchapter B.

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3 (b) Except as otherwise provided by this subsection, a person may not be employed by a school district as an audiologist, 4 5 occupational therapist, physical therapist, physician, nurse, school psychologist, associate school psychologist, licensed 6 professional counselor, marriage and family therapist, social 7 8 worker, or speech language pathologist unless the person is licensed by the state agency that licenses that profession and may 9 10 perform specific services within those professions for a school district only if the person holds the appropriate credential from 11 12 the appropriate state agency. As long as a person employed by a district before September 1, 2011, to perform marriage and family 13 14 therapy, as defined by Section 502.002, Occupations Code, is 15 employed by the same district, the person is not required to hold a license as a marriage and family therapist to perform marriage and 16 17 family therapy with that district.

The information must

1 include information regarding: the importance of higher education; 2 (1)3 (2) the advantages of completing the recommended or advanced high school program adopted under Section 28.025(a); 4 5 the disadvantages of taking courses to prepare for (3) a high school equivalency examination relative to the benefits of 6 taking courses leading to a high school diploma; 7 8 (4) financial aid eligibility; instruction on how to apply for federal financial 9 (5) 10 aid; (6) for 11 the center financial aid information established under Section 61.0776; 12 (7) the automatic admission of certain students to 13 14 general academic teaching institutions as provided by Section 15 51.803; academic 16 (8) the eligibility and performance 17 requirements for the TEXAS Grant as provided by Subchapter M, Chapter 56; and 18 the availability of programs in the district under 19 (9) which a student may earn college credit, including advanced 20 placement programs, dual credit programs, joint high school and 21 college credit programs, and international baccalaureate programs. 22 SECTION 33. Section 37.306(a), Education Code, is amended 23 24 to read as follows: (a) At the end of the first semester of a student's 25

26 placement in an alternative education program under Section 37.304 27 or 37.305, the school district board of trustees shall convene a

1 committee to review the student's placement in the alternative 2 education program. The committee must be composed of:

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3 (1) a classroom teacher from the campus to which the
4 student would be assigned were the student not placed in an

14 (5) a <u>school</u> counselor employed by the school 15 district.

orientation, to new school district and open-enrollment charter
school educators, including <u>school</u> counselors and coaches, and
other district and charter school professional staff members;

1 charter school staff member; and (3) must include training concerning: 2 3 (A) factors indicating a child is at risk for sexual abuse or other maltreatment; 4 5 (B) likely warning signs indicating a child may be a victim of sexual abuse or other maltreatment; 6 internal procedures for seeking assistance 7 (C) 8 for a child who is at risk for sexual abuse or other maltreatment, including referral to a school counselor, a social worker, or 9 another mental health professional; 10 (D) techniques for reducing a child's risk of 11 sexual abuse or other maltreatment; and 12 community organizations that have relevant 13 (E) 14 existing research-based programs that are able to provide training 15 or other education for school district or open-enrollment charter school staff members, students, and parents. 16 17 SECTION 35. Section 51.9355(a), Education Code, is amended to read as follows: 18 The governing board of each general academic teaching 19 (a) institution shall establish an office at the institution to assist 20 applicants, potential applicants, [high] school [guidance] 21 counselors at the high school level, and other interested persons 22 23 requesting assistance relating to: 24 applying for admission to a bachelor's degree (1)program at the institution; 25 applying for financial aid offered by or through 26 (2) 27 the institution or by an office or agency of this state or the

 25 schedule to complete:

(A) the recommended or advanced high school
 curriculum required for grant eligibility under Section 28.002 or

2 (B) for a school district covered by Section 3 56.304(f)(1), the required portion of the recommended or advanced 4 high school curriculum in the manner described by Section 5 56.304(f)(2).

6 SECTION 37. Section 56.460(b), Education Code, is amended 7 to read as follows:

8 (b) Each school district shall notify its middle school 9 students, junior high school students, and high school students, 10 those students' teachers and <u>school</u> counselors, and those students' 11 parents or guardians of the Texas B-On-time loan program and the 12 eligibility requirements of the program.

(d) If financial assistance is awarded to an eligible entity that is not a school district, the application must include a description of the frequency and manner of involvement of the public schools and school personnel, especially teachers and <u>school</u> counselors, with the partnership program.

 learning, as appropriate, to involve each consortium participant

(A) is designed to train vocational and technical
teachers to effectively implement tech-prep programs;
(B) provides for joint training for teachers in

C.S.H.B. No. 3809 the tech-prep consortium; 1 2 (C) is designed to ensure that teachers and 3 administrators stay current with the needs, expectations, and methods of business and of all aspects of an industry; 4 5 focuses on training postsecondary education (D) faculty in the use of contextual and applied curricula and 6 instruction; and 7 8 (E) provides training in the use and application of technology; 9 include training programs for <u>school</u> counselors 10 (6) designed to enable <u>school</u> counselors to more effectively: 11 12 (A) provide information to students regarding 13 tech-prep programs; 14 (B) support student progress in completing 15 tech-prep programs; 16 provide information on related employment (C) 17 opportunities; (D) ensure that tech-prep students are placed in 18 19 appropriate employment; and 20 stay current with the needs, expectations, (E) 21 and methods of business and of all aspects of an industry; (7) provide equal access to the full range 22 of 23 tech-prep programs for individuals who are members of special populations, including by the development of tech-prep program 24 services appropriate to the needs of special populations; and 25 26 (8) provide for preparatory services that assist 27 participants in tech-prep programs.

SECTION 40. Section 503.051, Occupations Code, is amended
to read as follows:

Sec. 503.051. COUNSELING FOR GOVERNMENT OR EDUCATIONAL 3 4 INSTITUTION. This chapter does not apply to an activity, service, or use of an official title by a person employed as a counselor by a 5 federal, state, county, or municipal agency or, except as provided 6 by Section 21.003(b), Education Code, by a public or private 7 8 educational institution if the person is performing counseling or counseling-related activities within the scope of the person's 9 employment. 10

11 SECTION 41. This Act takes effect immediately if it 12 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each 13 house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. 14 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate 15 effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
