CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

- 1 WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a serious and escalating
- 2 problem in the United States, particularly in Texas; and
- 3 WHEREAS, A multibillion-dollar business, human trafficking
- 4 is second only to drug dealing in criminal profitability and is the
- 5 fastest-growing illegal enterprise, according to the Polaris
- 6 Project, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that maintains the
- 7 National Human Trafficking Resource Center; it is estimated that as
- 8 many as 17,500 foreign nationals are trafficked into the United
- 9 States each year and that the number of U.S. citizens trafficked
- 10 within our own borders is even higher, with more than 200,000
- 11 American children at high risk for trafficking into the sex
- 12 industry; and
- 13 WHEREAS, Texas is a major point of illegal entry into the
- 14 United States; its large geographic size along with its
- 15 demographics make the Lone Star State appealing to traffickers, who
- 16 endeavor to blend into the population while exploiting their
- 17 victims in forced labor and prostitution; and
- 18 WHEREAS, Although Texas has been recognized as a leader in
- 19 the effort to end the scourge of human trafficking, eradication of
- 20 this modern-day form of slavery is a difficult challenge, and every
- 21 means of combating it should be explored; now, therefore, be it
- 22 RESOLVED, That the 83rd Legislature of the State of Texas
- 23 hereby request the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house
- 24 of representatives to create a joint interim committee to study the

- 1 problem of human trafficking in Texas; and, be it further
- 2 RESOLVED, That the committee submit a full report, including
- 3 findings and recommendations, to the 84th Texas Legislature when it
- 4 convenes in January 2015.
