CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a serious and escalating
problem in the United States, particularly in Texas; and

3 WHEREAS, A multibillion-dollar business, human trafficking is second only to drug dealing in criminal profitability and is the 4 5 fastest-growing illegal enterprise, according to the Polaris Project, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that maintains the 6 7 National Human Trafficking Resource Center; it is estimated that as many as 17,500 foreign nationals are trafficked into the United 8 States each year and that the number of U.S. citizens trafficked 9 within our own borders is even higher, with more than 200,000 10 American children at high risk for trafficking into the sex 11 12 industry; and

WHEREAS, Texas is a major point of illegal entry into the United States; its large geographic size along with its demographics make the Lone Star State appealing to traffickers, who endeavor to blend into the population while exploiting their victims in forced labor and prostitution; and

18 WHEREAS, Although Texas has been recognized as a leader in 19 the effort to end the scourge of human trafficking, eradication of 20 this modern-day form of slavery is a difficult challenge, and every 21 means of combating it should be explored; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the 83rd Legislature of the State of Texas hereby request the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives to create a joint interim committee to study the

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1	problem of human trafficking in Texas; and, be it further
2	RESOLVED, That the committee submit a full report, including
3	findings and recommendations, to the 84th Texas Legislature when it
4	convenes in January 2015.
