## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the evaluation and instruction of public school
3	students with visual impairments.
4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subsections (b), (c), and (e), Section 30.002,
6	Education Code, are amended to read as follows:
7	(b) The agency shall:
8	(1) develop standards and guidelines for all special
9	education services for children with visual impairments that it is
10	authorized to provide or support under this code;
11	(2) supervise regional education service centers and
12	other entities in assisting school districts in serving children
13	with visual impairments more effectively;
14	(3) develop and administer special education services
15	for students with both serious visual and auditory impairments;
16	(4) evaluate special education services provided for
17	children with visual impairments by school districts and approve or
18	disapprove state funding of those services; and
19	(5) maintain an effective liaison between special
20	education programs provided for children with visual impairments by
21	school districts and related initiatives of the Department of
22	Assistive and Rehabilitative Services Division [Texas Commission]
23	for [ <del>the</del> ] Blind <u>Services</u> , the [ <del>Texas</del> ] Department of <u>State</u> [ <del>Mental</del> ]
24	Health <u>Services Mental Health and Substance Abuse Division</u> [ <del>and</del>

Mental Retardation], the Texas School for the Blind and Visually
 Impaired, and other related programs, agencies, or facilities as
 appropriate.

4 (c) The comprehensive statewide plan for the education of5 children with visual impairments must:

6 (1) adequately provide for comprehensive diagnosis 7 and evaluation of each school-age child with a serious visual 8 impairment;

9 (2) include the procedures, format, and content of the 10 individualized education program for each child with a visual 11 impairment;

12 (3) emphasize providing educational services to 13 children with visual impairments in their home communities whenever 14 possible;

(4) include methods to ensure that children with visual impairments receiving special education services in school districts receive, before being placed in a classroom setting or within a reasonable time after placement:

(A) evaluation of the impairment; and 19 20 (B) instruction in an expanded core curriculum, which is required for students with visual impairments to succeed 21 in classroom settings and to derive lasting, practical benefits 22 from the education provided by school districts, including 23 24 instruction in: 25 (i) [<del>, the training in</del>] compensatory skills, such as braille and concept development, and other skills 26

27 needed to access the rest of the curriculum;

1 (ii) orientation [communicative skills,] 2 and mobility; social 3 (iii) [<del>,</del> <u>and</u>] interaction 4 [adjustment] skills; 5 (iv) vocational <u>-or</u>] career [and the 6 planning; 7 (v) assistive technology, including optical devices; 8 9 (vi) independent living skills; (vii) recreation and leisure enjoyment; 10 (viii) self-determination; and 11 12 (ix) sensory efficiency [<del>counseling,</del> required for those students to succeed in classroom settings and to 13 derive lasting, practical benefits from the education in the school 14 15 district]; 16 (5) provide for flexibility on the part of school 17 districts to meet the special needs of children with visual 18 impairments through: 19 specialty staff and resources provided by the (A) district; 20 (B) contractual arrangements 21 with other qualified public or private agencies; 22 (C) supportive assistance from 23 regional 24 education service centers or adjacent school districts; 25 (D) short-term or long-term services through the 26 Texas School for the Blind and Visually Impaired or related 27 facilities or programs; or

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(E) other instructional and service arrangements
 approved by the agency;

3 (6) include a statewide admission, review, and 4 dismissal process;

5 provide for effective interaction between the (7) visually impaired child's classroom setting and the child's home 6 7 environment, including providing for parental training and counseling either by school district staff or by representatives of 8 9 other organizations directly involved in the development and 10 implementation of the individualized education program for the 11 child;

12 (8) require the continuing education and professional
13 development of school district staff providing special education
14 services to children with visual impairments;

(9) provide for adequate monitoring and precise evaluation of special education services provided to children with visual impairments through school districts; and

18 (10) require that school districts providing special 19 education services to children with visual impairments develop 20 procedures for assuring that staff assigned to work with the 21 children have prompt and effective access directly to resources 22 available through:

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(A) cooperating agencies in the area;

(B) the Texas School for the Blind and VisuallyImpaired;

(C) the Central Media Depository for specialized27 instructional materials and aids made specifically for use by

1 students with visual impairments;

2 (D) sheltered workshops participating in the
3 state program of purchases of blind-made goods and services; and
4 (E) related sources.

5 (e) Each eligible blind or visually impaired student is 6 entitled to receive educational programs according to an 7 individualized education program that:

8 (1) is developed in accordance with federal and state9 requirements for providing special education services;

10 (2) is developed by a committee composed as required11 by federal law;

12 (3) reflects that the student has been provided a 13 detailed explanation of the various service resources available to 14 the student in the community and throughout the state;

15 (4) provides а detailed description the of 16 arrangements made to provide the student with the evaluation and instruction required under Subsection (c)(4) [orientation and 17 mobility training, instruction in braille or use of large print, 18 other training to compensate for serious visual loss, access to 19 special media and special tools, appliances, aids, or devices 20 commonly used by individuals with serious visual impairments]; and 21

(5) sets forth the plans and arrangements made for contacts with and continuing services to the student beyond regular school hours to ensure the student learns the skills and receives the <u>instruction</u> [training] required under Subsection (c)(4)(B)[(c)(4)].

27 SECTION 2. Subsection (e), Section 30.002, Education Code,

as amended by this Act, applies beginning with the 2013-2014 school
 year.

3 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 4 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 5 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 6 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 7 Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
