## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the vaccination against bacterial meningitis of

- entering students at public and private or independent institutions
- 4 of higher education.

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- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 51.9192, Education Code, is amended by
- 7 amending Subsections (b), (d), and (d-1) and adding Subsections
- 8 (d-2), (d-3), (d-4), (d-5), (d-6), and (f) to read as follows:
- 9 (b) This section applies only to an entering student at an
- 10 institution of higher education or private or independent
- 11 institution of higher education. This section does not apply to a
- 12 student of an institution who is enrolled only in online or other
- 13 distance education courses or who is 22 [30] years of age or older.
- 14 For purposes of this subsection, "entering student" includes:
- 15 (1) a new student, as defined by Section 51.9191; and
- 16 (2) a student who previously attended an institution
- 17 of higher education or private or independent institution of higher
- 18 education before January 1, 2012, and who is enrolling in the same
- 19 or another institution of higher education or private or
- 20 independent institution of higher education following a break in
- 21 enrollment of at least one fall or spring semester.
- 22 (d) A student to whom this section applies or a parent or
- 23 guardian of the student is not required to comply with Subsection
- 24 (c) if the student or a parent or guardian of the student submits to

- 1 the institution:
- 2 (1) an affidavit or a certificate signed by a
- 3 physician who is duly registered and licensed to practice medicine
- 4 in the United States in which it is stated that, in the physician's
- 5 opinion, the vaccination required would be injurious to the health
- 6 and well-being of the student; or
- 7 (2) an affidavit signed by the student stating that
- 8 the student declines the vaccination for bacterial meningitis for
- 9 reasons of conscience, including a religious belief, or
- 10 confirmation that the student has completed the Internet-based
- 11 process described by Subsection (d-3) for declining the vaccination
- on that basis, if applicable to the student.
- 13 (d-1) The [except that the] exemption provided by
- 14 <u>Subsection (d)(2)</u> [this subdivision] does not apply during a
- 15 disaster or public health emergency, terrorist attack, hostile
- 16 military or paramilitary action, or extraordinary law enforcement
- 17 emergency declared by an appropriate official or other authority
- 18 and in effect for the location of the institution the student
- 19 attends.
- 20 (d-2) An affidavit submitted under Subsection (d)(2) must
- 21 be:
- 22 (1) on a form described by Section 161.0041, Health
- 23 and Safety Code; and
- 24 (2) submitted to the appropriate admitting official
- 25 not later than the 90th day after the date the affidavit is
- 26 notarized.
- 27 (d-3) The Department of State Health Services shall develop

- and implement a secure, Internet-based process to be used 1 2 exclusively at those public junior colleges that elect to use the 3 process to allow an entering student to apply online for an 4 exemption from the vaccination requirement under this section for reasons of conscience. The online process portal must be designed 5 to ensure that duplicate exemption requests are avoided to the 6 7 greatest extent possible. The exemption form used by a student to claim an exemption under the process must contain a statement 8 9 indicating that the student understands the benefits and risks of the immunization and the benefits and risks of not receiving the 10 11 immunization.
- 12 <u>(d-4) A public junior college may require an entering</u>
  13 student to use the Internet-based process under Subsection (d-3) as
  14 the exclusive method to apply for an exemption from the vaccination
  15 required under this section for reasons of conscience.
- 16 (d-5) The Department of State Health Services shall report

  17 to the legislature annually the number of exemptions applied for in

  18 the preceding academic year using the Internet-based process under

  19 Subsection (d-3).
- 20 (d-6)  $[\frac{(d-1)}{2}]$  An institution of higher education or private or independent institution of higher education shall provide, with 21 the registration materials that the institution provides to a 22 student to whom this section applies before the student's initial 23 enrollment in the institution, written notice of the right of the 24 25 student or of a parent or guardian of the student to claim an exemption from the vaccination requirement in the manner prescribed 26 27 by Subsection (d) and of the importance of consulting a physician

- 1 about the need for immunization to prevent the disease.
- 2 (f) In this section, "public junior college" has the meaning
- 3 assigned by Section 61.003.
- 4 SECTION 2. Subsection (a), Section 161.0041, Health and
- 5 Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:
- 6 (a) A person claiming an exemption from a required
- 7 immunization based on reasons of conscience, including a religious
- 8 belief, under Section 161.004 of this code, Section 38.001,
- 9 51.9192, or 51.933, Education Code, or Section 42.043, Human
- 10 Resources Code, must complete an affidavit on a form provided by the
- 11 department stating the reason for the exemption. This subsection
- 12 does not apply to a person claiming the exemption using the
- 13 <u>Internet-based process under Section 51.9192(d-3)</u>, Education Code.
- 14 SECTION 3. The changes in law made by this Act apply
- 15 beginning with entering students enrolling in public or private or
- 16 independent institutions of higher education in this state on or
- 17 after January 1, 2014.
- SECTION 4. This Act takes effect October 1, 2013.
