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## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

2 relating to the continuation and functions of the Department of 3 Information Resources and certain procurement functions of the 4 comptroller of public accounts. 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 6 SECTION 1. Section 2054.005(a), Government Code, is amended 7 to read as follows:

8 (a) The Department of Information Resources is subject to 9 Chapter 325 (Texas Sunset Act). Unless continued in existence as 10 provided by that chapter, the department is abolished and this 11 chapter expires September 1, <u>2021</u> [<del>2013</del>].

SECTION 2. Section 2054.021(g), Government Code, is amended to read as follows:

14 (g) The training program must provide information to the 15 person regarding:

16 (1) <u>this chapter and the board</u> [<del>the enabling</del> 17 <del>legislation that created the department and its policymaking body</del>] 18 to which the person is appointed to serve;

(2) the programs operated by the department; 19 20 (3) the role and functions of the department; 21 (4) the rules of the department, with an emphasis on the rules that relate to disciplinary and investigatory authority; 22 23 (5) the current budget for the department; the results of the most recent formal audit of the 24 (6)

1 department; the requirements of the: 2 (7) open meetings law, Chapter 551; 3 (A) (B) open records law, Chapter 552; and 4 5 (C) administrative procedure law, Chapter 2001; 6 (8) the requirements of the conflict of interest laws and other laws relating to public officials; [and] 7 8 (9) any applicable ethics policies adopted by the 9 department or the Texas Ethics Commission; and 10 (10) contract management training. SECTION 3. Section 2054.022(c), Government Code, is amended 11 to read as follows: 12 (c) An employee of the department, other than the executive 13 14 director,[+ 15 [(1) may not participate in the department's bidding 16 process, including the proposal development related to a contract 17 and the negotiation of a contract, if: [(A) the employee receives more than five percent 18 of the employee's income from any likely bidder on the contract; or 19 20 [(B) the employee's spouse is employed by any likely bidder on the contract; and 21 22 [<del>(2)</del>] may not: (1)  $\left[\frac{(\Lambda)}{(\Lambda)}\right]$  be a person required to register as 23 а lobbyist under Chapter 305 because of the person's activities for 24 25 compensation on behalf of a business entity that has, or on behalf of a trade association of business entities that have, a 26

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substantial interest in the information resources technologies

1 industry; or

2 (2) [(B)] be employed by a state agency as a
3 consultant on information resources technologies.

4 SECTION 4. Subchapter B, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is 5 amended by adding Section 2054.0331 to read as follows:

6 <u>Sec. 2054.0331. CUSTOMER ADVISORY COMMITTEE. (a) The</u> 7 <u>board shall appoint a customer advisory committee under Section</u> 8 2054.033.

9 (b) The advisory committee is composed of representatives 10 of customers who receive services from each of the department's key 11 programs, including state agencies with fewer than 100 employees, 12 and the public.

13 (c) In making appointments to the advisory committee, the 14 board shall, to the extent practicable, ensure that the committee 15 is composed of a cross-section of the department's customers, 16 including institutions of higher education, and the public.

17 (d) The advisory committee shall report to and advise the 18 board on the status of the department's delivery of critical 19 statewide services.

20 SECTION 5. Subchapter B, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is 21 amended by adding Sections 2054.0345 and 2054.0346 to read as 22 follows:

23 <u>Sec. 2054.0345. DETERMINATION OF ADMINISTRATIVE FEES. (a)</u> 24 <u>The department shall adopt a process to determine the amount of the</u> 25 <u>administrative fee the department charges to administer any of its</u> 26 <u>programs, including fees charged for programs under Sections</u> 27 <u>2054.380 and 2170.057.</u>

1 (b) The process must require that the amount of a fee 2 directly relate to the amount necessary for the department to recover the cost of its operations, as determined by the 3 department's annual budget process. 4 5 (c) The department shall develop clear procedures directing staff for each department program and the department's financial 6 7 staff to work together to determine the amount of administrative fees. The procedures must require review and approval of all 8 administrative fees by the board, the executive director, and the 9 10 department's chief financial officer. Sec. 2054.0346. REPORTING OF ADMINISTRATIVE FEES. (a) The 11 department shall report to the Legislative Budget Board all 12 administrative fees that the department sets under Section 13 14 2054.0345 each fiscal year. The report must include: 15 (1) the underlying analysis and methodology used to determine the fee amounts; and 16 17 (2) the cost allocation charged to customers. (b) The department shall post on the department's Internet 18 website information about each administrative fee the department 19 charges, including a description of how the fee is determined. The 20 department must update this information when a contract amendment 21 or other action results in a major change to the costs incurred or 22 the price paid by the department or a customer of the department. 23 24 SECTION 6. Subchapter B, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 2054.037 to read as follows: 25 26 Sec. 2054.037. NEGOTIATED RULEMAKING; ALTERNATIVE DISPUTE 27 RESOLUTION. (a) The board shall develop and implement a policy to

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1	encourage the use of:
2	(1) negotiated rulemaking procedures under Chapter
3	2008 for the adoption of department rules; and
4	(2) appropriate alternative dispute resolution
5	procedures under Chapter 2009 to assist in the resolution of
6	internal and external disputes under the department's
7	jurisdiction.
8	(b) The department's procedures relating to alternative
9	dispute resolution must conform, to the extent possible, to any
10	model guidelines issued by the State Office of Administrative
11	Hearings for the use of alternative dispute resolution by state
12	agencies.
13	(c) The department shall:
14	(1) coordinate the implementation of the policy
15	adopted under Subsection (a);
16	(2) provide training as needed to implement the
17	procedures for negotiated rulemaking or alternative dispute
18	resolution; and
19	(3) collect data concerning the effectiveness of those
20	procedures.
21	SECTION 7. Subchapter B, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is
22	amended by adding Sections 2054.038, 2054.039, and 2054.040 to read
23	as follows:
24	Sec. 2054.038. INTERNAL AUDITOR; POWERS AND DUTIES. (a)
25	The board shall:
26	(1) appoint an internal auditor who reports directly
27	to the board and serves at the will of the board; and

No. 216 1 (2) provide staff and other resources to the internal 2 auditor as appropriate. 3 (b) The internal auditor shall prepare an annual audit plan using risk assessment techniques to rank high-risk functions in the 4 department. The internal auditor shall submit the annual audit 5 plan to the board for consideration and approval. The board may 6 7 change the plan as necessary or advisable. 8 (c) The internal auditor may bring before the board an issue outside of the annual audit plan that requires the immediate 9 10 attention of the board. (d) The internal auditor may not be assigned any operational 11 12 or management responsibilities that impair the ability of the internal auditor to make an independent examination of the 13 department's operations. The internal auditor may provide guidance 14 15 or other advice before an operational or management decision is made but may not make the decision, approve the decision, or 16 17 otherwise violate this subsection. (e) The department shall give the internal auditor 18 19 unrestricted access to the activities and records of the department unless restricted by other law. 20 21 Sec. 2054.039. OPEN MEETINGS EXCEPTION FOR INTERNAL AUDITOR. A meeting between the board and the department's internal 22 auditor to discuss issues related to fraud, waste, or abuse is not 23 24 required to be an open meeting under Chapter 551. 25 Sec. 2054.040. AUDIT SUBCOMMITTEE. (a) The board shall 26 maintain an audit subcommittee of the board. The subcommittee shall oversee the department's internal auditor and any other audit 27

1 issues that the board considers appropriate.

2 (b) The subcommittee shall evaluate whether the internal 3 auditor has sufficient resources to perform the auditor's duties 4 and ensure that sufficient resources are available.

5 SECTION 8. Subchapter B, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is 6 amended by adding Section 2054.041 to read as follows:

7 Sec. 2054.041. ADDITIONAL BOARD OVERSIGHT. (a) The board shall adopt a policy describing the board's role in setting a 8 strategic direction for the department. The policy must address 9 10 the board's role in developing new initiatives for and service offerings by the department, including requiring the board to 11 12 evaluate and approve new initiatives for, or categories of, services offered by the department under the department's various 13 14 programs.

15 (b) The board shall regularly evaluate the extent to which 16 the department fulfills the department's information resources 17 technology mission by providing cost-effective services and 18 meeting customer needs.

19 (c) The board shall regularly evaluate department 20 operations, including an evaluation of analytical data and 21 information regarding trends in department revenue and expenses, as 22 well as performance information.

23 SECTION 9. Subchapter C, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is 24 amended by adding Section 2054.061 to read as follows:

25 <u>Sec. 2054.061. USE OF CONSULTANTS AND OUTSIDE STAFF. (a)</u> 26 <u>The department shall develop clear criteria for the appropriate use</u> 27 <u>of consultants and outside staff by the department to temporarily</u>

1	augment the department's existing staff.
2	(b) The department shall annually analyze:
3	(1) the department's staffing needs;
4	(2) the need for and cost-effectiveness of contracting
5	for consultants and outside staff;
6	(3) whether the department could use department staff
7	to accomplish tasks proposed for the consultants and outside staff;
8	and
9	(4) whether and what type of training or additional
10	resources are necessary for the department to use the department's
11	own staff to accomplish tasks proposed for the consultants or
12	outside staff.
13	(c) In conjunction with the budget process, the department
14	shall provide the analysis to the board for approval. The
15	department may not hire or train any consultants or outside staff
16	unless it has been approved during this budget process.
17	SECTION 10. Subchapter C, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is
18	amended by adding Sections 2054.062 and 2054.065 to read as
19	follows:
20	Sec. 2054.062. INFORMATION RESOURCES TECHNOLOGIES
21	CONSOLIDATION. (a) The department shall develop a consistent and
22	clear method of measuring the costs and progress of an information
23	resources technology consolidation initiative, including a
24	consolidation under Subchapter L.
25	(b) The department shall work with any entity involved in an
26	information resources technology consolidation to develop an
27	agreed on methodology for collecting and validating data to

S.B. No. 216 1 determine a baseline assessment of costs. The department shall use the data both in the department's initial cost projections and in 2 any later cost comparison. The department shall coordinate with 3 the internal auditor for guidance, subject to Section 2054.038(d), 4 5 on developing a methodology that provides an objective assessment of costs and project status. 6 7 (c) Using the methodology agreed on under Subsection (b), 8 the department shall evaluate actual costs and cost savings related to the consolidation. The department shall also evaluate the 9 progress of the department's information resources consolidation 10 projects compared to the initially projected timelines for 11 12 implementation. The evaluation results must break out the information on both statewide and individual entity levels. 13 14 (d) The department shall annually report the evaluation 15 results to: (1) the board; 16 17 (2) the Legislative Budget Board; and 18 (3) customers involved in the consolidation. 19 (e) The department shall post on the department's Internet website the report required by this section. 20 21 Sec. 2054.065. REVIEW OF CERTAIN CONTRACT SOLICITATIONS. 22 (a) In this section: 23 (1) "Major contract" means a contract that has a 24 value of at least \$1 million. 25 (2) "Team" means the Contract Advisory Team 26 established under Subchapter C, Chapter 2262. 27 (b) For any solicitation of a major contract the department

is required to submit for review by the team, the department shall: 1 (1) implement any recommendations made by the team 2 3 regarding the solicitation; or 4 (2) provide a written explanation of why the team's 5 recommendations cannot be implemented. SECTION 11. Sections 2054.260(a) and (b), Government Code, 6 are amended to read as follows: 7 8 (a) Not later than <u>November 15</u> [September 1] of each even-numbered year, the department shall report on the status, 9 10 progress, benefits, and efficiency gains of the project. The department shall provide the report to: 11 12 (1)the presiding officer of each house of the legislature; 13 14 (2)the chair of each committee in the legislature 15 that has primary jurisdiction over the department; 16 (3) the governor; and 17 (4) each state agency or local government participating in the project. 18 Not later than November 15 [September 1] of each 19 (b) even-numbered year, the department shall report on financial 20 21 matters, including project costs and revenues, and on any significant issues regarding contract performance on the project. 22 SECTION 12. Subchapter L, Chapter 2054, Government Code, is 23 24 amended by adding Section 2054.392 to read as follows: 25 Sec. 2054.392. STATEWIDE TECHNOLOGY ACCOUNT. The 26 comptroller shall establish in the state treasury the statewide technology account. The account is a revolving fund account for the 27

S.B. No. 216 1 administration of this subchapter. The account is the depository 2 for all money received from entities served under this subchapter. Money in the account may be used only for the operation and 3 management of a statewide technology center or for any other 4 5 purpose specified by the legislature. 6 SECTION 13. Chapter 2054, Government Code, is amended by 7 adding Subchapters O and P to read as follows: 8 SUBCHAPTER O. MAJOR OUTSOURCED CONTRACTS Sec. 2054.521. MAJOR OUTSOURCED CONTRACT DEFINED; RULE. 9 The board by rule shall define what constitutes a major outsourced 10 contract with regard to contracts the department executes with 11 12 entities other than this state or a political subdivision of this state. The definition must include as a major outsourced contract: 13 (1) outsourced contracts entered into under 14 15 Subchapter I and Subchapter L of this chapter or Chapter 2170; and 16 (2) contracts that exceed a monetary threshold, other 17 than those described by Subdivision (1). Sec. 2054.522. BOARD APPROVAL AND OVERSIGHT OF MAJOR 18 19 OUTSOURCED CONTRACTS. (a) The department must receive approval from the board before: 20 21 (1) entering into a major outsourced contract; or 22 (2) amending any major outsourced contract, if the amendment has significant statewide impact. 23 24 (b) The board shall establish one or more subcommittees to monitor the department's major outsourced contracts. 25 26 Sec. 2054.523. MANAGEMENT PLANS FOR MAJOR OUTSOURCED CONTRACTS. (a) The department shall specify procedures for 27

1 administering, monitoring, and overseeing each major outsourced 2 contract by creating a management plan for each contract. In each management plan, the department shall specify the department's 3 approach to managing and mitigating the risks inherent in each 4 5 contract. 6 (b) Department staff who perform contract administration 7 and program duties shall jointly develop the management plans with 8 input from executive management and the board. Each management plan must be approved by the executive director. 9 (c) Each management plan must establish clear lines of 10 accountability and coordination of contract activities. The plan 11 12 must provide details about implementing the program that is the subject of the contract as well as procedures for monitoring 13 contractor performance, identifying and mitigating risks related 14 15 to the contract, and involving and communicating with customers who will be served by any programs implemented through the contract. As 16 17 appropriate, the plan must define an approach for transitioning from one major outsourced contract to another major outsourced 18 19 contract. The department shall revise each management plan: 20 (d) 21 (1) as necessary to keep current during the 22 contracting process; and (2) when the department renews, amends, or resolicits 23 24 a major outsourced contract to ensure the plan remains updated and 25 incorporates any changes resulting from a new contract. 26 Sec. 2054.524. CUSTOMER INVOLVEMENT IN MAJOR OUTSOURCED

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CONTRACTS. The department shall establish formal procedures to

1	ensure customer involvement in decision making regarding each of
2	the department's major outsourced contracts, including initial
3	analysis, solicitation development, and contract award and
4	implementation, that affect those customers.
5	SUBCHAPTER P. ADDITIONAL PROVISIONS ON CONTRACTING
6	Sec. 2054.551. DEFINITION. In this subchapter, "contract
7	management guide" means the guide developed under this subchapter.
8	Sec. 2054.552. CONFLICT OF INTEREST IN CONTRACTING. (a) A
9	department employee may not:
10	(1) have an interest in, or in any manner be connected
11	with, a contract or bid for a purchase of goods or services by the
12	department; or
13	(2) in any manner, including by rebate or gift,
14	directly or indirectly accept or receive from a person to whom a
15	contract may be awarded anything of value or a promise, obligation,
16	or contract for future reward or compensation.
17	(b) A department employee who violates Subsection (a)(2) is
18	subject to dismissal.
19	(c) The board shall adopt rules to implement this section.
20	(d) The department shall train staff in the requirements of
21	this section and Section 572.054 and incorporate the requirements
22	into the contract management guide and the department's internal
23	policies, including employee manuals.
24	Sec. 2054.553. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT TRAINING POLICY. (a)
25	The department shall develop a policy for training department staff
26	in contract management.
27	(b) The policy must establish contract management training

requirements for all staff involved in contract management, 1 including contract managers, program staff, and executive 2 3 management. 4 (c) The policy must specify the department's overall 5 approach to procuring and managing contracts, as well as contract-specific procedures developed in the contract management 6 quide and under Subchapter O. 7 8 Sec. 2054.554. CONTRACT MANAGEMENT GUIDE; RULES. (a) The department shall develop and periodically update a contract 9 management guide to provide an overall, consistent approach on 10 procurement and management of major outsourced contracts under 11 12 Subchapter O and other contracts. In updating the guide, the department shall make changes based on contract experiences and 13 14 account for changing conditions to guide the updates. 15 (b) The department shall coordinate with the department's internal auditor, subject to Section 2054.038(d), as needed for 16 17 assistance and guidance in developing procedures in the contract management guide for monitoring contracts and individual 18 19 contractors. 20 (c) The board may adopt rules necessary to develop or update the contract management guide. 21 22 (d) The contract management guide must provide information regarding the department's: 23 24 (1) general approach to business case analysis, procurement planning, contract solicitation, contract execution, 25 26 and contract monitoring and oversight; (2) ethics standards and policies, including those 27

1	required by Section 2054.552; and
2	(3) approach to changing a program's internal
3	structure or model for delivering services to customers.
4	(e) The contract management guide must:
5	(1) establish clear lines of accountability, staff
6	roles and responsibilities, and decision-making authority for
7	program staff, contract management staff, executive management,
8	customers, and the board;
9	(2) include the procedures established under Section
10	2054.524 regarding customer involvement; and
11	(3) establish the department's process for evaluating
12	and managing risk during each stage of contract procurement,
13	implementation, and management.
14	(f) The contract management guide must describe the
15	expectations and standards for obtaining and using customer input
16	during all contract management phases.
17	SECTION 14. Section 2151.0041(a), Government Code, is
18	amended to read as follows:
19	(a) The comptroller's authority to perform any act under
20	this title that relates to state purchasing [transfer of powers and
21	duties to the comptroller under Section 2151.004(d) and under House
22	Bill 3560, Acts of the 80th Legislature, Regular Session, 2007, ] is
23	subject to Chapter 325 (Texas Sunset Act). <u>Notwithstanding any</u>
24	other law, that authority expires September 1, 2021, unless
25	continued in existence as provided by Chapter 325.
26	SECTION 15. Chapter 2151, Government Code, is amended by
27	adding Section 2151.0042 to read as follows:

S.B. No. 216 1 Sec. 2151.0042. SUNSET EVALUATION. (a) The Sunset Advisory Commission shall evaluate the state's overall procurement 2 system, including the provisions of this subtitle and Chapter 2054. 3 The evaluation may include any provision in state law that relates 4 to procurement and contracting for goods and services. The 5 commission shall present not later than January 1, 2021, a report to 6 7 the legislature on its evaluation and recommendations in relation 8 to the report's findings. (b) In conducting the evaluation required under Subsection 9 10 (a), the commission may request the assistance of the Legislative Budget Board, the state auditor, and each standing committee of the 11 12 senate and house of representatives having primary jurisdiction over matters relating to state procurement. 13 14 SECTION 16. Subchapter A, Chapter 2155, Government Code, is 15 amended by adding Section 2155.007 to read as follows: Sec. 2155.007. PROCUREMENT COORDINATION COMMITTEE. (a) In 16 17 this section, "department" means the Department of Information 18 Resources. 19 (b) The department and the comptroller shall establish a committee composed of essential personnel of the department and the 20 21 comptroller to: 22 (1) identify: 23 (A) areas of overlap in the procurement functions 24 of the department and the comptroller and methods to avoid duplication of services; 25 (B) mutually beneficial contracting and 26 procurement methodologies, data collection and management 27

No. 216 1 techniques, and customer relations management; 2 (C) opportunities for collaboration on procurement functions that would benefit the state or other 3 4 customers; and 5 (D) opportunities for consolidation of administrative or other functions to improve customer service and 6 7 reduce operating costs; and 8 (2) develop: 9 (A) a standardized method for the department and 10 the comptroller to: (i) collect and analyze spending data 11 12 relating to procurement contracts; and (ii) benchmark and quantitatively measure 13 14 cost savings and increased administrative efficiency resulting 15 from collaboration and cooperative purchasing; and (B) strategies that encourage coordination 16 17 between the department and the comptroller relating to procurement 18 functions. (c) The committee may appoint advisory members 19 as appropriate to assist the committee. 20 21 (c-1) The committee shall report to the Sunset Advisory Commission the committee's findings under Subsection (b). The 22 committee shall file a first report on September 1, 2015, that 23 24 covers the two-year period preceding that date. The committee shall file a second report on September 1, 2017, that covers the 25 26 two-year period preceding that date. (c-2) The department and the comptroller shall publish the 27

reports required under Subsection (c-1) on the department's and the 1 comptroller's Internet websites. 2 3 (c-3) In addition to the reports required under Subsection (c-1), the department and the comptroller shall include the 4 analysis prescribed by Subsection (b) in a report filed under 5 Section 325.007. For purposes of this subsection, the comptroller 6 7 shall file a report as required by Section 325.007, but only to the 8 extent required by Section 2151.0041(a). 9 (c-4) This subsection and Subsections (c-1), (c-2), and 10 (c-3) expire October 1, 2019. SECTION 17. Section 2157.068(b), Government Code, 11 is amended to read as follows: 12 The department shall negotiate with vendors to obtain 13 (b) 14 the best value for the state in the purchase of commodity items. 15 When negotiating with a vendor, the department shall use information related to the state's historical spending levels on 16 17 particular commodity items to secure the best value for the state. department may consider strategic sourcing and 18 The other 19 methodologies to select the vendor offering the best value on commodity items. The terms and conditions of a license agreement 20 21 between a vendor and the department under this section may not be less favorable to the state than the terms of similar license 22 agreements between the vendor and retail distributors. 23 The 24 department shall, to the greatest extent practicable, negotiate a specific price for commonly purchased commodity items. If the 25 26 department selects a vendor based on the vendor's offer of a percentage discount from the list price of commodity items, the 27

Subchapter B, Chapter 2157, Government Code, is amended by adding Section 2157.069 to read as follows: 4 5 Sec. 2157.069. CLEARING FUND ACCOUNT. The comptroller shall establish in the state treasury the clearing fund account. 6 7 The account is a revolving fund account for the administration of Section 2157.068. The account is the depository for all money 8 received from entities served under that section. Money in the 9 account may be used only to administer that section or for any other 10 purpose specified by the legislature. 11 12 SECTION 19. Section 2161.121(d), Government Code, is amended to read as follows: 13 The commission shall send to the presiding officer of 14 (d) 15 each house of the legislature: 16 (1) on May [April] 15 of each year, a report on the 17 previous six-month period; and (2) on November 15 of each year, a report on the 18 preceding fiscal year [to the joint committee charged with 19 monitoring the implementation of the historically underutilized 20 business goals]. 21 SECTION 20. Section 2161.126, Government Code, is amended 22 23 to read as follows: 24 Sec. 2161.126. EDUCATION AND OUTREACH ΒY COMMISSION. Before October 15 [September 1] of each year, the commission shall 25 26 report to the governor, the lieutenant governor, and the speaker of the house of representatives on the education and training efforts 27

The report must include the following as related to 2 3 historically underutilized businesses: 4 (1) the commission's vision, mission, and philosophy; 5 (2) marketing materials and other educational materials distributed by the commission; 6 7 (3) the commission's policy regarding education, 8 outreach, and dissemination of information; 9 (4) goals that the commission has attained during the 10 fiscal year; (5) the commission's goals, objectives, and expected 11 outcome measures for each outreach and education event; and 12 (6) the commission's planned future initiatives on 13 14 education and outreach. 15 SECTION 21. Chapter 122, Human Resources Code, is amended by adding Section 122.0012 to read as follows: 16 17 Sec. 122.0012. SUNSET PROVISION. The comptroller's authority to perform any act under this chapter that relates to 18 19 state purchasing is subject to Chapter 325, Government Code (Texas Sunset Act). Notwithstanding any other law, that authority expires 20 September 1, 2021, unless continued in existence as provided by 21 22 Chapter 325, Government Code. 23 SECTION 22. The following provisions of the Government Code 24 are repealed: (1) Section 497.030; 25 26 (2) Section 2054.005(b); 27 Sections 2151.0041(b) and (c); and (3)

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## (4) Section 2161.121(e).

2 SECTION 23. Sections 2054.260 and 2161.121, Government 3 Code, as amended by this Act, apply only to a report due under those 4 sections on or after September 1, 2013. A report due before 5 September 1, 2013, is governed by the law in effect on the date the 6 report was due, and the former law is continued in effect for that 7 purpose.

8 SECTION 24. Not later than March 1, 2014, the Department of 9 Information Resources and the comptroller of public accounts shall 10 enter into a memorandum of understanding to facilitate the 11 implementation of Section 2155.007, Government Code, as added by 12 this Act.

SECTION 25. Sections 2054.522 and 2054.552, Government 13 Code, as added by this Act, and Section 2157.068(b), Government 14 15 Code, as amended by this Act, apply only to a contract for which a solicitation of bids or proposals or similar expressions of 16 17 interest is published on or after September 1, 2013. A contract for which a solicitation of bids or proposals or similar expressions of 18 interest is published before September 1, 2013, is governed by the 19 law in effect on the date the state agency first publishes the 20 solicitation of bids or proposals or similar expressions of 21 interest, and the former law is continued in effect for that 22 23 purpose.

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SECTION 26. This Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
