A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

- 2 relating to the absence of a student from school to visit with a
- 3 parent or guardian who will be or has been deployed on military
- 4 duty.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 25.087, Education Code, is amended by
- 7 adding Subsection (b-4) and amending Subsection (d) to read as
- 8 follows:
- 9 (b-4) A school district shall excuse a student whose parent
- 10 or legal guardian is an active duty member of the uniformed services
- 11 as defined by Section 162.002 and has been called to duty for, is on
- 12 leave from, or immediately returned from continuous deployment of
- 13 at least four months outside the locality where the parent or
- 14 guardian regularly resides, to visit with the student's parent or
- 15 guardian. A school district may not excuse a student under this
- 16 subsection more than five days in a school year. An excused absence
- 17 under this subsection must be taken:
- 18 (1) not earlier than the 60th day before the date of
- 19 <u>deployment; or</u>
- 20 (2) not later than the 30th day after the date of
- 21 return from deployment.
- (d) A student whose absence is excused under Subsection (b),
- 23 (b-2), (b-4), or (c) may not be penalized for that absence and shall
- 24 be counted as if the student attended school for purposes of

- 1 calculating the average daily attendance of students in the school
- 2 district. A student whose absence is excused under Subsection (b),
- 3 (b-2), (b-4), or (c) shall be allowed a reasonable time to make up
- 4 school work missed on those days. If the student satisfactorily
- 5 completes the school work, the day of absence shall be counted as a
- 6 day of compulsory attendance.
- 7 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 8 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 9 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 10 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 11 Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
