1 AN ACT 2 relating to conditions on the receipt of tuition and fee exemptions and waivers at public institutions of higher education. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. Subchapter D, Chapter 54, Education Code, is 5 amended by adding Sections 54.2001 and 54.2002 to read as follows: 6 Sec. 54.2001. CONTINUED RECEIPT OF EXEMPTIONS OR WAIVERS 7 CONDITIONAL. (a) Notwithstanding any other law but subject to 8 9 Subsection (f), after initially qualifying under this subchapter for a mandatory or discretionary exemption or waiver from the 10 payment of all or part of the tuition or other fees for enrollment 11 during a semester or term at an institution of higher education, a 12 person may continue to receive the exemption or waiver for a 13 14 subsequent semester or term only if the person: (1) as a graduate or undergraduate student, maintains 15 16 a grade point average that satisfies the institution's grade point average requirement for making satisfactory academic progress 17 toward a degree or certificate in accordance with the institution's 18 policy regarding eligibility for financial aid; and 19 20 (2) as an undergraduate student, has not completed as 21 of the beginning of the semester or term a number of semester credit hours that is considered to be excessive under Section 54.014, 22 23 unless permitted to complete those hours by the institution on a

24 showing of good cause.

1	(b) In determining whether a person has completed a number
2	of semester credit hours that is considered to be excessive for
3	purposes of Subsection (a)(2), semester credit hours completed
4	include transfer credit hours that count toward the person's
5	undergraduate degree or certificate program course requirements
6	but exclude:
7	(1) hours earned exclusively by examination;
8	(2) hours earned for a course for which the person
9	received credit toward the person's high school academic
10	requirements; and
11	(3) hours earned for developmental coursework that an

14	(c) If on the completion of any semester or term a person

2 (4) any provision of this code that authorizes or 3 requires the payment of tuition or fees at the rates provided for 4 residents of this state by a person who is not a resident of this 5 state for purposes of Subchapter B.

6 <u>Sec. 54.2002. EXEMPTIONS AND WAIVERS FOR STATE-FUNDED</u> 7 <u>COURSES ONLY. Notwithstanding any other law, a mandatory or</u> 8 <u>discretionary exemption or waiver from the payment of tuition or</u> 9 <u>other fees under this subchapter or another provision of this code</u> 10 <u>applies only to courses for which an institution of higher</u> 11 <u>education receives formula funding.</u>

12 SECTION 2. The change in law made by this Act applies to a 13 person's eligibility for an exemption or waiver from the payment of 14 all or part of tuition or other fees beginning with tuition and fees 15 charged for the 2014 fall semester.

16 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 17 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 18 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 19 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 20 Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
