1 SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

2 WHEREAS, It is the responsibility of the federal government
3 to fully maintain the security of the Texas-Mexico international
4 border; and

5 WHEREAS, The federal government has neglected its duty to
6 fully maintain the security of the Texas-Mexico international
7 border; and

8 WHEREAS, An unprotected border facilitates drug smuggling
9 and human trafficking and opens the door to spillover violence from
10 criminal cartels; moreover, the ease with which members of
11 terrorist organizations can enter the country poses a grave threat
12 to homeland security; and

13 WHEREAS, The federal government's failure to prevent illegal
14 entry has shifted much of the responsibility to the State of Texas;
15 consequently, budget writers must weigh the costs of border
16 security against the expense of other state services; during the
17 2012-2013 budget cycle, Texas appropriated \$221,600,000 for border
18 security operations; and

19 WHEREAS, The executive branch and the United States Congress
20 have consistently delayed meaningful action on border security,
21 forcing Texas to expend significant resources to keep the
22 Texas-Mexico international border secure and placing an undue
23 burden on the state's taxpayers; now, therefore, be it

24 RESOLVED, That the 83rd Legislature of the State of Texas

1 hereby express its dissatisfaction with the federal government's
2 inadequate efforts to secure the Texas-Mexico international
3 border; and, be it further

4 RESOLVED, That the 83rd Legislature of the State of Texas
5 hereby respectfully urge the Congress of the United States to
6 reimburse the State of Texas in the amount of \$221,600,000 for
7 bearing the financial burden of the federal government's
8 responsibility to secure the Texas-Mexico international border
9 during the 2012-2013 budget cycle; and, be it further

10 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward official
11 copies of this resolution to the president of the United States, to
12 the speaker of the house of representatives and to the president of
13 the senate of the United States Congress, and to all the members of
14 the Texas delegation to Congress with the request that this
15 resolution be entered in the Congressional Record as a memorial to
16 the Congress of the United States of America.
