12	secretary of state shall prescribe procedures to provide for a
13	process implemented under this section to require:
14	(1) the voter to print the ballot, print and sign a
15	voter signature form, and then scan the documents before submitting
16	them by e-mail; and
17	(2) secure processing of ballots, including requiring
18	the use of a voter's military e-mail address and common access card,
19	or other measures the secretary of state considers appropriate.
20	(b) The secretary of state shall select to participate in

(c) The secretary of state shall operate the program 1 2 established under Subsection (a) as a pilot program until September 1, 2015. 3 4 (d) Not later than January 1, 2015, the secretary of state shall file a report with the legislature. The report may include 5 6 the secretary of state's recommendations on the future use of e-mail ballot submission by members of the armed forces of the 7 United States and suggestions for permanent statutory authority 8 regarding e-mail ballot submission by members of the armed forces 9

10 of the United States.

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(e) This section expires September 1, 2015.

SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2013.

The bill would require the Secretary of State to prescribe procedures to allow a person who is casting an early ballot by mail to return the ballot by e-mail. The bill would also remove the requirement that the person casting the ballot be located in an area in which armed forces are eligible to receive hostile fire pay or imminent danger pay or in an area that has been designated as a combat zone by the president of the United States.
