12	establish a speed limit. Notice of a speed limit established under
13	the program may be displayed using a stationary or portable
14	changeable message sign, as defined by Section 544.013. A speed
15	limit that is established under the program:
16	(1) must be based on an engineering and traffic
17	investigation;
18	(2) may be effective for all or a designated portion of
19	the highway and may be effective for any period of the day or night,
20	as the department determines necessary; and
21	(3) is effective only when the speed limit is posted
22	and only if a sign notifying motorists of the change in speed limit
23	is posted not less than 500 feet but not more than 1,000 feet before
24	the point at which the speed limit begins.

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to the establishment of a variable speed limit pilot 3 program by the Texas Transportation Commission. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS. In this Act: 5 6 (1) "Commission" means the Texas Transportation 7 Commission. 8 "Department" means the (2) Texas Department of 9 Transportation. 10 SECTION 2. VARIABLE SPEED LIMIT PILOT PROGRAM. (a) The 11 commission by rule shall establish and the department shall implement a variable speed limit pilot program to study the 12 effectiveness of temporarily lowering prima facie speed limits to 13 14 address inclement weather, congestion, road construction, or any 15 other condition that affects the safe and orderly movement of 16 traffic on a roadway. Notice of a speed limit established under the 17 pilot program may be displayed using a stationary or portable 18 changeable message sign, as defined by Section 544.013, 19 Transportation Code.

(b) The commission shall select up to three locations to21 test the pilot program.

(c) The commission shall inform the Department of Public Safety and any affected local law enforcement agency about the pilot program and the locations that are being used to test the

2 (d) A speed limit that is established under the pilot3 program:

4 (1) must be based on an engineering and traffic5 investigation;

6 (2) may be effective for all or a designated portion of 7 the highway and may be effective for any period of the day or night, 8 as the department determines necessary; and

9 (3) is effective only when the speed limit is posted 10 and only if a sign notifying motorists of the change in speed limit 11 is posted not less than 500 feet but not more than 1,000 feet before 12 the point at which the speed limit begins.

13 SECTION 3. REPORT. Not later than December 31, 2014, the 14 commission shall submit a report to the legislature that includes 15 information about the pilot program, the results of the pilot 16 program, and any recommendations for statutory changes based on the 17 results of the pilot program.

18 SECTION 4. EXPIRATION. This Act expires February 1, 2015. 19 SECTION 5. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Act takes effect 20 immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members 21 elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas 22 Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for 23 immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
