BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Section 191.034, Health and Safety Code, is 6 amended to read as follows:

Sec. 191.034. NOTATION OF DEATH ON BIRTH CERTIFICATE. (a) On receipt of the death certificate of a person [younger than 55 years of age] whose birth is registered in this state, the state registrar shall <u>conspicuously note the person's date of death</u> [make a conspicuous notation] on the <u>person's</u> [decedent's] birth certificate [that the person is dead].

13 (b) The state registrar shall notify [provide 14 computer-generated abstracts, transcripts, or copies of the death 15 certificate to] the county clerk of the county in which the person 16 [decedent] was born and [to] the local registrar of the registration district in which the <u>person</u> [decedent] was born <u>of</u> 17 the person's death. On receipt of the notification of death, the 18 county clerk or local registrar shall conspicuously note the 19 person's date of death [make a conspicuous notation] on the person's 20 [decedent's] birth certificate [that the person is dead]. 21

(b) The section of the birth certificate entitled "For

Medical and Health Use Only" is not part of the legal birth 1 certificate. Information held by the department under that section 2 of the certificate is confidential. That information may not be 3 released or made public on subpoena or otherwise, except that 4 release may be made for statistical purposes only so that no person, 5 patient, or facility is identified, or to medical personnel of a 6 health care entity, as that term is defined in Subtitle B, Title 3, 7 Occupations Code, or to a faculty member at a medical school, as 8 that term is defined in Section 61.501, Education Code, for 9 statistical or medical research, or to appropriate state or federal 10 agencies for statistical research. The board may adopt rules to 11 implement this subsection. 12

13 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives 14 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as 15 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this 16 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this 17 Act takes effect September 1, 2013.
