9	commission in order to engage in an activity that is part of a state	
10	or federal disease control or eradication program for animals.	
11	(b) The commission shall adopt rules for the authorization	
12	of a person described by Subsection (a).	
13	(c) The commission may, after reasonable notice, suspend or	
14	revoke a person's authorization under Subsection (a) if the	
15	commission determines that the person has substantially failed to	
16	comply with this chapter or rules adopted under this chapter.	
17	(d) A person is entitled to a hearing before the commission	
18	or a hearing examiner appointed by the commission before the	
19	commission may revoke the person's authorization under Subsection	
20	(a). The commission shall make all final decisions to suspend or	
21	revoke an authorization.	
22	(e) This section does not affect the requirement for a	
23	license or an exemption under Chapter 801, Occupations Code, to	
24	practice veterinary medicine.

No. 3569 (senate committee report) by adding the 2 following appropriately numbered SECTIONS to the bill 3 renumbering the SECTIONS of the bill accordingly: 4 SECTION \_\_\_\_. Section 161.041(c), Agriculture Code, is 5 amended to read as follows: (c) A person commits an offense if the person knowingly 6 fails to handle, in accordance with rules adopted by the 7 commission, livestock, exotic livestock, domestic fowl, or exotic 8 9 fowl: (1) infected with a disease listed in Subsection (a); 10 (2) exposed, as defined by commission rule, to a 11 12 disease listed in Subsection (a) if the commission has notified the 13 person that the animal was exposed to the disease; or 14 (3) subject to a testing requirement due to a risk of exposure, as defined by commission rule, to a specific disease if 15 the commission has notified the person of the testing requirement. 16 SECTION \_\_\_. The change in law made by this Act by the 17 1.8 amendment of Section 161.041(c), Agriculture Code, applies only to 19 an offense committed on or after the effective date of this Act. An 20 offense committed before the effective date of this Act is governed 21 by the law in effect on the date the offense was committed, and the former law is continued in effect for that purpose. For purposes of 22 23 this section, an offense was committed before the effective date of 24 this Act if any element of the offense occurred before that date.
