A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT 1 relating to a human papillomavirus-associated cancer strategic 2 3 plan developed by the Department of State Health Services. 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 5 SECTION 1. (a) The Department of State Health Services shall develop a strategic plan to significantly reduce morbidity 6 7 and mortality from human papillomavirus-associated cancer. In developing the strategic plan, the Department of 8 (b) 9 State Health Services shall collaborate with the Cancer Prevention 10 and Research Institute of Texas and may convene any necessary workgroups. The members of a workgroup may include: 11 12 (1)health care providers specializing in human 13 papillomavirus-associated cancer prevention, screening, treatment, or research; 14 15 (2) physicians specializing in primary care, pediatrics, or obstetrics and gynecology; 16 mid-level health care practitioners; 17 (3) 18 (4) cancer epidemiologists; 19 (5) representatives of general academic teaching institutions as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code, medical 20 21 and dental units as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code, and medical schools as defined by Section 61.501, Education Code; 22 (6) middle school, high school, or college health 23 24 educators;

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(7) human papillomavirus-associated cancer survivors;
 (8) representatives from geographic areas or other
 population groups at higher risk of human
 papillomavirus-associated cancer;

5 (9) public advocates concerned with issues related to
6 vaccine-preventable diseases;

7 (10) representatives of community-based and 8 faith-based organizations involved in providing education, 9 awareness, or support relating to human papillomavirus-associated 10 cancer; or

11 (11) other people the department determines are 12 necessary.

13 (c) In developing the strategic plan, the Department of14 State Health Services shall:

(1) identify barriers to effective prevention, screening, and treatment for human papillomavirus-associated cancer, including specific barriers affecting providers and patients;

19 (2) identify methods, other than a mandate, to
 20 increase the number of people vaccinated against human
 21 papillomavirus;

(3) identify methods to increase use of evidence-based
screening to enhance the number of people screened regularly for
human papillomavirus-associated cancer;

(4) review current technologies and best practices for
 human papillomavirus-associated cancer screening;

27 (5) review technology available to diagnose and

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1 prevent infection by human papillomavirus;

2 (6) develop methods for creating partnerships with
3 public and private entities to increase awareness of human
4 papillomavirus-associated cancer and of the importance of
5 vaccination education and regular screening;

6 (7) review current prevention, screening, treatment, 7 and related activities in this state and identify areas in which the 8 services for those activities are lacking;

9 (8) estimate the annual direct and indirect state 10 health care costs attributable to human papillomavirus-associated 11 cancers;

identify 12 (9) actions necessary to increase vaccination and screening rates and reduce the morbidity and 13 14 mortality from human papillomavirus-associated cancer and 15 establish a schedule for implementing those actions; and

16 (10) make recommendations to the legislature on policy17 changes and funding needed to implement the strategic plan.

18 (d) Not later than December 31, 2016, the Department of 19 State Health Services shall deliver to the governor and members of 20 the legislature the strategic plan and recommendations on goal 21 implementation and schedule compliance related to the strategic 22 plan.

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(e) This section expires January 1, 2017.
