A BILL TO BE ENTITLED 1 AN ACT 2 relating to a human papillomavirus-associated cancer strategic plan developed by the Department of State Health Services. 3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: 4 SECTION 1. (a) 5 The Department of State Health Services shall develop a strategic plan to significantly reduce morbidity 6 7 and mortality from human papillomavirus-associated cancer. In developing the strategic plan, the Department of 8 (b) State Health Services shall collaborate with the Cancer Prevention 9 and Research Institute of Texas and may convene any necessary 10 11 workgroups. The members of a workgroup may include: 12 (1) health care providers specializing in human papillomavirus-associated cancer prevention, 13 screening, treatment, or research; 14 (2) physicians 15 specializing in primary care, 16 pediatrics, or obstetrics and gynecology; (3) mid-level health care practitioners; 17 18 (4) cancer epidemiologists; representatives of general academic teaching 19 (5) institutions as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code, and 20 21 medical and dental units as defined by Section 61.003, Education 22 Code; (6) middle school, high school, or college health 23 24 educators;

(7) human papillomavirus-associated cancer survivors;
 (8) representatives from geographic areas or other
 population groups at higher risk of human
 papillomavirus-associated cancer;

5 (9) representatives of community-based and 6 faith-based organizations involved in providing education, 7 awareness, or support relating to human papillomavirus-associated 8 cancer; or

9 (10) other people the department determines are 10 necessary.

11 (c) In developing the strategic plan, the Department of 12 State Health Services shall:

(1) identify barriers to effective prevention, screening, and treatment for human papillomavirus-associated cancer, including specific barriers affecting providers and patients;

17 (2) identify methods to increase the number of people18 vaccinated against human papillomavirus;

19 (3) identify methods to increase use of evidence-based
20 screening to enhance the number of people screened regularly for
21 human papillomavirus-associated cancer;

(4) review current technologies and best practices for
 human papillomavirus-associated cancer screening;

24 (5) review technology available to diagnose and
 25 prevent infection by human papillomavirus;

26 (6) develop methods for creating partnerships with27 public and private entities to increase awareness of human

3 (7) review current prevention, screening, treatment, 4 and related activities in this state and identify areas in which the 5 services for those activities are lacking;

6 (8) estimate the annual direct and indirect state 7 health care costs attributable to human papillomavirus-associated 8 cancers;

9 (9) identify actions necessary to increase 10 vaccination and screening rates and reduce the morbidity and 11 mortality from human papillomavirus-associated cancer and 12 establish a schedule for implementing those actions; and

13 (10) make recommendations to the legislature on policy14 changes and funding needed to implement the strategic plan.

(d) Not later than December 31, 2016, the Department of State Health Services shall deliver to the governor and members of the legislature the strategic plan and recommendations on goal implementation and schedule compliance related to the strategic plan.

20 (e) This section expires January 1, 2017.
