H.B. No. 1351

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

- 2 relating to health education curriculum and instruction in public
- 3 schools.
- 4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 5 SECTION 1. This Act may be cited as the Texas Education
- 6 Works Act.
- 7 SECTION 2. Section 28.004, Education Code, is amended by
- 8 amending Subsection (e) and adding Subsection (o) to read as
- 9 follows:
- 10 (e) Any course materials and instruction relating to human
- 11 sexuality, sexually transmitted diseases, or human
- 12 immunodeficiency virus or acquired immune deficiency syndrome
- 13 shall be selected by the board of trustees with the advice of the
- 14 local school health advisory council and [must]:
- 15 (1) must present abstinence from sexual activity as
- 16 the preferred choice of behavior in relationship to all sexual
- 17 activity for [unmarried] persons of school age;
- 18 (2) <u>must</u> devote <u>sufficient</u> [more] attention to
- 19 abstinence from sexual activity to emphasize the importance of
- 20 <u>abstinence from sexual activity</u> [than to any other behavior];
- 21 (3) must emphasize that abstinence from sexual
- 22 activity, if used consistently and correctly, is the only method
- 23 that is 100 percent effective in preventing pregnancy, sexually
- 24 transmitted infections [diseases], sexually transmitted infection

- 1 with human immunodeficiency virus, [or] acquired immune deficiency
- 2 syndrome resulting from sexual activity, and the emotional distress
- 3 that may be [trauma] associated with adolescent sexual activity
- 4 that results in a sexually transmitted infection or an unintended
- 5 pregnancy;
- 6 (4) must present age-appropriate information [direct
- 7 adolescents to a standard of behavior in which abstinence from
- 8 sexual activity before marriage is the most effective way to
- 9 prevent pregnancy, sexually transmitted diseases, and infection
- 10 with human immunodeficiency virus or acquired immune deficiency
- 11 syndrome]; [and]
- 12 (5) <u>must be medically accurate and, to the extent</u>
- 13 possible, evidence-based;
- 14 (6) must provide information about the effectiveness,
- 15 proper use, health benefits, and side effects of methods approved
- 16 by the United States Food and Drug Administration for reducing the
- 17 risk of contracting sexually transmitted infections, including
- 18 human immunodeficiency virus, and preventing pregnancy;
- 19 <u>(7) must include strategies to promote effective</u>
- 20 communication between adolescents and their parents, legal
- 21 guardians, and other family members about sexuality and healthy
- 22 <u>relationships;</u>
- 23 (8) must encourage students to develop healthy life
- 24 skills, including goal setting, critical thinking, problem
- 25 solving, responsible decision-making regarding sexuality and
- 26 relationships, refusal and negotiation, and effective
- 27 communication;

1	(9) must teach skills for making responsible decisions
2	about sexual activity, including how to avoid unwanted verbal or
3	physical sexual advances and how to avoid making unwanted verbal or
4	physical sexual advances; and
5	(10) may not promote bias against:
6	(A) students of any race, gender, sexual
7	orientation, or ethnic or cultural background;
8	(B) sexually active students;
9	(C) children with disabilities; or
10	(D) students with children [teach contraception
11	and condom use in terms of human use reality rates instead of
12	theoretical laboratory rates, if instruction on contraception and
13	condoms is included in curriculum content].
14	(o) In this section:
15	(1) "Age-appropriate information" means information,
16	including topics, messages, and teaching methods, that is suitable
17	for the particular ages or age groups of children and adolescents to
18	whom the information is to be presented based on the developing
19	cognitive, emotional, and behavioral capacity of children or
20	adolescents of that age or age group.
21	(2) "Evidence-based" means:
22	(A) verified or supported by research that is:
23	(i) in compliance with accepted scientific
24	methods; and
25	(ii) published in peer-reviewed journals,
26	if appropriate; and
27	(B) proven through rigorous scientific

- 1 evaluation, to achieve positive outcomes concerning risky sexual
- 2 behaviors or negative health consequences from risky sexual
- 3 behaviors.
- 4 (3) "Medically accurate" means objective, complete,
- 5 and consistent with information available from mainstream
- 6 professional organizations and agencies with expertise in the
- 7 relevant field, including the Centers for Disease Control and
- 8 Prevention and the United States Department of Health and Human
- 9 Services' Office of Adolescent Health.
- 10 SECTION 3. (a) A school district that uses instructional
- 11 materials that do not reflect the requirements prescribed by
- 12 Section 28.004(e), Education Code, as amended by this Act, shall
- 13 also use appropriate supplemental instructional materials as
- 14 necessary to comply with those requirements.
- 15 (b) A school district that permits a person not employed by
- 16 the district to present one or more components of the district's
- 17 human sexuality instruction must require the person to comply with
- 18 the requirements prescribed by Section 28.004(e), Education Code,
- 19 as amended by this Act.
- 20 SECTION 4. This Act applies beginning with the 2015-2016
- 21 school year.
- 22 SECTION 5. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 23 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 24 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 25 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 26 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
