A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

- 2 relating to the inclusion of mental health in the public services
- 3 endorsement on a public school diploma and in information about
- 4 health science career pathways.

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- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Subchapter B, Chapter 28, Education Code, is
- 7 amended by adding Section 28.02122 to read as follows:
- 8 Sec. 28.02122. INCLUSION OF MENTAL HEALTH PROFESSIONS IN
- 9 HEALTH SCIENCE CAREER INFORMATION. The agency shall ensure that
- 10 any information provided to students relating to health science
- 11 careers includes information regarding mental health professions.
- 12 To the extent that the public services endorsement includes
- 13 <u>information on health science career pathways</u>, the information must
- 14 include mental health careers as a possible pathway.
- SECTION 2. Section 28.025(c-1), Education Code, is amended
- 16 to read as follows:
- 17 (c-1) A student may earn an endorsement on the student's
- 18 diploma and transcript by successfully completing curriculum
- 19 requirements for that endorsement adopted by the State Board of
- 20 Education by rule. The State Board of Education by rule shall
- 21 provide students with multiple options for earning each
- 22 endorsement, including, to the greatest extent possible, coherent
- 23 sequences of courses. The State Board of Education by rule must
- 24 permit a student to enroll in courses under more than one

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- 1 endorsement curriculum before the student's junior year. An
- 2 endorsement under this subsection may be earned in any of the
- 3 following categories:
- 4 (1) science, technology, engineering, and mathematics
- 5 (STEM), which includes courses directly related to science,
- 6 including environmental science, technology, including computer
- 7 science, engineering, and advanced mathematics;
- 8 (2) business and industry, which includes courses
- 9 directly related to database management, information technology,
- 10 communications, accounting, finance, marketing, graphic design,
- 11 architecture, construction, welding, logistics, automotive
- 12 technology, agricultural science, and heating, ventilation, and
- 13 air conditioning;
- 14 (3) public services, which includes courses directly
- 15 related to health sciences and occupations, mental health,
- 16 education and training, law enforcement, and culinary arts and
- 17 hospitality;
- 18 (4) arts and humanities, which includes courses
- 19 directly related to political science, world languages, cultural
- 20 studies, English literature, history, and fine arts; and
- 21 (5) multidisciplinary studies, which allows a student
- 22 to:
- 23 (A) select courses from the curriculum of each
- 24 endorsement area described by Subdivisions (1) through (4); and
- 25 (B) earn credits in a variety of advanced courses
- 26 from multiple content areas sufficient to complete the
- 27 distinguished level of achievement under the foundation high school

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- 1 program.
- 2 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 3 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 4 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 5 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 6 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
