APPOINTMENT OF MEMBERS; TERM<u>S. (a)</u> 81.404. The governor may appoint members of the task force as necessary, including members from relevant state agencies, members with expertise in infectious diseases and other issues involved in the prevention of the spread of infectious diseases, and members from institutions of higher education in this state. The governor shall appoint to the task force:

(1) at least one member who is a representative of a

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local health authority serving a rural area;
(2) at least one member who is a representative of a local health authority serving an urban area;

(3) at least one member who is a licensed nurse; and

at least one member who is emergency medical services personnel, as defined by Section 773.003.

(b) The governor shall appoint a director of the task force from among the members of the task force.

The governor may fill any vacancy that occurs on the (c) task force and may appoint additional members as needed.

Members of the task force serve at the pleasure of the (d) governor.

A state or local employee appointed to the task force (e) shall perform any duties required by the task force in addition to the regular duties of the employee.

Sec. 81.405. REPORTS. The task force may make written reports on its findings and recommendations, including legislative recommendations, to the governor and legislature.

(a) On the effective date of this Act, a member SECTION 2. serving on the Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response created by executive order of the governor continues to serve on the Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response under Subchapter J, Chapter 81, Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act.

(b) As soon as practicable after the effective date of this Act, the governor shall make any appointments to the Task Force on Infectious Disease Preparedness and Response required under Subchapter J, Chapter 81, Health and Safety Code, as added by this Act.

SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2015.

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
