CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, Human trafficking is a serious and escalating

problem in the United States, particularly in Texas; and

3 WHEREAS, A multibillion-dollar business, human trafficking

4 is second only to drug dealing in criminal profitability and is the

fastest-growing illegal enterprise, according to the Polaris

6 Project, a Washington, D.C.-based organization that maintains the

7 National Human Trafficking Resource Center; it is estimated that as

8 many as 17,500 foreign nationals are trafficked into the United

9 States each year and that the number of U.S. citizens trafficked

10 within our own borders is even higher, with nearly 250,000 American

11 children and youths at risk of sexual exploitation, including for

12 commercial purposes; and

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WHEREAS, Texas is a major point of illegal entry into the

14 United States; its large geographic size along with its

15 demographics make the Lone Star State appealing to traffickers, who

16 endeavor to blend into the population while exploiting their

17 victims in forced labor and prostitution; and

18 WHEREAS, Although Texas has been recognized as a leader in

19 the effort to end the scourge of human trafficking, eradication of

20 this modern-day form of slavery is a difficult challenge, and every

21 means of combating it should be explored; now, therefore, be it

22 RESOLVED, That the 84th Legislature of the State of Texas

23 hereby request the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house

24 of representatives to create a joint interim committee to study the

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- 1 problem of human trafficking in Texas; and, be it further
- 2 RESOLVED, That the committee submit a full report, including
- 3 findings and recommendations, to the 85th Texas Legislature before
- 4 it convenes in January 2017.
