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11		ARTICLE 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS

12 SECTION 1.01. PURPOSE. This resolution is adopted by the 13 members of the House of Representatives of the <u>84th</u> [83rd] 14 Legislature to provide for the efficient and orderly operation of 15 the house under the supervision of the speaker and the Committee on 16 House Administration.

SECTION 1.02. PRECEDENCE. 17 The provisions of this resolution take precedence over the provisions of any resolution 18 not passed in full compliance with the rules of the house and, 19 except as otherwise noted herein, shall be in effect during the full 20 21 term of the <u>84th</u> [83rd] Legislature whether in session or 22 adjournment.

ARTICLE 2. SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE SECTION 2.01. SPEAKER'S GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES. The speaker may make any expenditures or transfers and perform any function deemed necessary for the effective and efficient operation of the house of representatives.

1 SECTION 2.02. SPEAKER'S APARTMENT AND OFFICES. (a) The 2 speaker's apartment and offices shall be set aside for the use of 3 the speaker, the speaker's family, and house members, as the 4 speaker may designate, throughout the speaker's term of office.

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5 (b) The Committee on House Administration may make the 6 necessary expenditures to operate and properly equip and service 7 the speaker's apartment and offices and may employ such help as may 8 be necessary to properly maintain and care for the apartment and 9 offices.

10 (c) The speaker and the speaker's family may occupy the 11 speaker's apartment during the speaker's term of office, utilizing 12 the services of employees of the house and others on a temporary 13 basis, if and as needed.

14 (d) The speaker may obtain through the Committee on House 15 Administration the necessary supplies and services to operate the 16 speaker's office and may also have paid through that committee 17 necessary [local and long distance] telephone charges.

18 SECTION 2.03. INTERSTATE OR FEDERAL-STATE ASSOCIATIONS; 19 TRAINING SEMINARS. (a) The speaker may attend any meetings of or 20 sponsored by the Council of State Governments and any meetings on 21 problems of federal-state relations and interstate relations and 22 cooperation, and any other governmental meeting in or outside the 23 state.

(b) The speaker may appoint members of the house, staff members, and other employees of the house to accompany or represent the speaker at these meetings or to attend in-service training courses sponsored by the Council of State Governments or the

National Conference of State Legislatures or similar training
 courses, conferences, or seminars as the speaker may determine.

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3 (c) Members of the house attending meetings under this section while the legislature is in session may be reimbursed for 4 actual and necessary expenses. Members of the house attending 5 meetings under this section while the legislature is not in session 6 and staff members and other employees of the house attending 7 8 meetings at any time under this section may be reimbursed for either actual and necessary expenses or receive a per diem not to exceed 9 that provided by law for state officials or state employees. 10 In addition, members, staff, and other employees attending meetings 11 under this section may be reimbursed for mileage or other 12 transportation expenses at the same rate as provided by law for 13 14 state officials or state employees together with registration fees To receive payment under this subsection, sworn 15 and tuition. expense accounts must be filed with and approved by the chair of the 16 17 Committee on House Administration or an officer of the house designated in writing by the Committee on House Administration. 18 Prior written approval of the chair of the Committee on House 19 Administration to attend any such meetings, conferences, seminars, 20 or training courses is a prerequisite for reimbursement for travel 21 and other related expenses. 22

(d) Reimbursement for expenses incurred by a member, staff member, or employee of the house in an appointive capacity resulting from an appointment made by anyone other than the speaker shall be made only in the event that the appointment and expenses to be incurred have been previously approved in writing by the

1 Committee on House Administration.

2 (e) The speaker may expend money for memberships in 3 interstate associations of legislators considered necessary to 4 discharge properly the duties and responsibilities of the office of 5 speaker.

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ARTICLE 3. GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE

COMMITTEE ON HOUSE ADMINISTRATION

SECTION 3.01. CONTRACTS. The Committee on

9 Administration shall approve all contracts necessary for the 10 effective operation of the divisions of the house and its 11 committees.

SECTION 3.02. HOUSE AND COMMITTEE OPERATING BUDGETS. 12 The Committee on House Administration shall consider and adopt 13 14 operating budgets that cover both session and interim periods for 15 the divisions of the house and all committees appointed pursuant to the resolution adopting the rules of the house or appointed by the 16 17 speaker pursuant to any other resolution. A budget adopted by the Committee on House Administration must be adopted in a public 18 19 hearing. Each requested operating budget and each operating budget proposed for adoption must be posted on the Internet website of the 20 21 committee in advance of the hearing.

22 SECTION 3.03. OPERATING POLICIES. The Committee on House 23 Administration shall effectuate policies and determine guidelines 24 for the operation of the divisions and committees of the house.

25 SECTION 3.04. HOUSE POLICY MANUAL. The Committee on House 26 Administration shall prepare and distribute to all members, within 27 60 days after the convening of the regular session, policy

statements to include, but not be limited to, policies pertaining
 to members as a class.

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3 SECTION 3.05. HOUSE PROPERTY, SUPPLIES, ACCOUNTING. The 4 Committee on House Administration shall:

5 (1) provide and maintain for the use of the speaker, 6 members, employees, divisions, and committees of the house such 7 stationery, stamps, office equipment, furniture, fixtures, 8 supplies, and telephone and other services as may be necessary;

9 (2) keep an itemized account of the quantity and cost 10 of every kind of material received, and the source from which it was 11 received;

12 (3) maintain an annual operating account for each 13 member, division, and committee authorized by the Committee on 14 House Administration to make expenditures and charge each operating 15 account with daily expenditures, withdrawals from inventory, and 16 interdepartmental services;

17 (4) furnish a monthly statement for the expenditures18 of each member, division, and committee of the house; and

19 (5) adopt any rules, regulations, and policies
 20 necessary to effectively provide and account for the
 21 above-mentioned services.

22 SECTION 3.06. USE OF HOUSE CHAMBER AND FACILITIES; 23 ASSIGNMENT OF DESKS, OFFICES, AND PARKING SPACES. (a) The 24 Committee on House Administration shall:

(1) be in charge of and provide for the protection,
maintenance, and use of the hall of the house, all committee rooms,
offices of members and house departments, the speaker's office and

1 apartment, and other space under the jurisdiction of the house;

2 (2) make permanent assignments of desks and offices to
3 members of the house;

4 (3) adopt and enforce a plan for the parking of motor
5 vehicles on the portion of the Capitol grounds under house
6 jurisdiction;

7 (4) be in charge of and provide for the protection, 8 maintenance, and use of the furniture, fixtures, equipment, and 9 records of the house;

10 (5) purchase, remodel, repair, restore, or replace any 11 furniture, fixtures, equipment, and other furnishings to maintain 12 the dignity and appearance of space occupied by the house; and

13 (6) determine the hours the hall of the house shall be14 open to visitors.

15 (b) Any member who is not a member-elect of the <u>85th</u> [84th] Legislature shall vacate the member's office space before December 16 17 1, 2016 [2014]. If the office is not vacated on that date, the Committee on House Administration shall immediately remove the 18 19 member's personal effects and store them in an appropriate place in order that the member-elect to whom the office space is assigned may 20 21 move in. The Committee on House Administration shall ensure that each member-elect of the 85th [84th] Legislature who was not a 22 23 member of the 84th [83rd] Legislature is permitted to move into and begin using the member-elect's office space at least 72 hours 24 before the time the 85th [84th] Legislature is scheduled to 25 26 convene.

27 SECTION 3.07. RECORDS OF THE HOUSE; PRINTING; JOURNALS;

1 COPIES OF LEGISLATIVE DOCUMENTS. (a) The Committee on House
2 Administration shall:

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3 (1) have completed and preserved the official records4 of the house;

5 (2) have charge of and approve the operation and maintenance of the printing and duplicating facilities of the 6 house, provided, however, that the use of the house printing and 7 8 duplicating facilities is restricted to agencies of the legislative branch and any other operation thereof is strictly prohibited 9 10 unless previously authorized in writing by the Committee on House Administration or an officer of the house designated in writing by 11 12 the speaker;

13 (3) determine the number of copies of the daily House 14 Journal to be printed and have jurisdiction over the mailing and 15 distribution of the daily journal; and

16 (4) determine the number of copies of the House 17 Journal that will be furnished to each member for distribution by 18 the member.

(b) The employee in charge of the printing facilities must
keep at least one copy of all items printed or duplicated and a copy
of the work order authorizing such printing.

Copies of bills, resolutions, and attachments thereto 22 (c) shall be made available free of charge to members of the house who 23 24 call at the bill distribution office and request them, and the cost of these copies shall be paid from funds appropriated for that 25 26 purpose by the legislature. If the Committee on House Administration finds gross abuse of this privilege, it 27 may

1 establish a policy regarding such distribution.

SECTION 3.08. HONORARY CERTIFICATES. The Committee on 2 3 House Administration shall provide for the use of members certificates commend, 4 appropriate to congratulate, and 5 Such certificates shall be printed with a signature memorialize. line for the name of the presenting member and adequate space for 6 insertion of the name of the individual or organization to be 7 8 honored.

SECTION 3.09. COMPOSITE PHOTOGRAPH. (a) 9 The Committee on 10 House Administration shall select a suitable photographer to take individual photographs of each member. The photographer shall 11 12 prepare a composite photograph of the members of the house composed of the individual photographs of each member arranged on a panel, of 13 14 the same size as used in previous sessions, in such manner as to 15 approximate the location of each member's desk on the house floor. The member's name and the county of residence shall be printed under 16 17 the member's photograph, and the composite shall be framed and hung in the hall of the house during the regular session. 18

(b) The photographs for the composite panel shall be provided without cost to the members, and the expense of the composite panel shall be paid from the expense fund of the house.

(c) The Committee on House Administration shall establish,
with concurrence of the photographer, a price to charge members for
any prints of photographs they wish to purchase.

25 SECTION 3.10. POLICIES REGARDING TEMPORARY ACTING MEMBERS. 26 If a person is serving as a temporary acting member of the house 27 under Section 72, Article XVI, Texas Constitution, in the place of a

house member on active military duty, the Committee on House 1 Administration, with the approval of the 2 speaker and in 3 consultation with the temporary acting member and, if available, the member on military duty, may adopt policies regarding a 4 5 temporary acting member that the committee considers necessary for the efficient administration and performance of the duties of the 6 house consistent with this resolution, the rules of the house, and 7 8 the Texas Constitution.

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9 SECTION 3.11. DISPLAY OF "IN GOD WE TRUST" IN HOUSE. (a) 10 The Committee on House Administration shall display the motto "In 11 God We Trust" on the electronic message screen at the front of the 12 hall of the house.

13 (b) The motto shall be large enough to be read throughout14 the hall.

15 (c) The motto shall be displayed at all times that the 16 electronic message screen is not being used to conduct legislative 17 business during a session of the house and shall be at least as 18 prominent as any other information displayed on the electronic 19 message screen.

(d) The Committee on House Administration shall convey to the State Preservation Board the desire of the house of representatives to maintain the permanent display of the motto on the face of the portico located over the speaker's podium.

SECTION 3.12. HOUSE RECYCLING PROGRAM. The Committee on House Administration, in coordination with the State Preservation Board, shall implement a program for recycling paper, plastic, and other recyclable materials from house offices.

1 SECTION 3.13. JOINT COMMITTEE HEARING NOTICES ON WEBSITE. The Committee on House Administration shall provide for the posting 2 of all notices for hearings of joint committees of the house and 3 senate on the house website regardless of whether the notice is 4 5 posted on the senate website. SECTION 3.14. ACCESS TO HOUSE OFFICES. A house member and 6 7 the member's staff may control access by the public to the member's 8 office and may exclude visitors from the office at their discretion. If a person refuses to leave the member's office when 9 10 requested, the member may request assistance from the Department of <u>Public Safety.</u> 11 12 SECTION 3.15. DPS PANIC BUTTONS. The Committee on House Administration shall work with the Department of Public Safety to 13 ensure that each house office may request a panic button that the 14 15 house member and the member's staff may use to alert the department to an emergency in the office. The member may reimburse the 16 17 Committee on House Administration for the cost of the panic button equipment in monthly installments over the fiscal year. 18 19 ARTICLE 4. EMPLOYEES AND EMPLOYMENT POLICIES

20 SECTION 4.01. DEFINITION. Unless expressly provided 21 otherwise, in this article "employee" means any person compensated 22 from funds appropriated to the house. The term includes persons for 23 whom the employing authority is the speaker, the Committee on House 24 Administration, an individual member, or a committee.

25 SECTION 4.02. OFFICERS AND SUPERVISORY ADMINISTRATIVE 26 EMPLOYEES OF THE HOUSE. (a) The officers of the house and the 27 employees of the house responsible for supervising the departments

1 and divisions that support the operation of the house shall be 2 appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the speaker.

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3 (b) The speaker shall have the right to discharge any 4 officer or supervisory administrative employee when the best 5 interest of the house of representatives would be served by so 6 doing.

7 (c) The authority to appoint and discharge officers and 8 supervisory administrative employees may be delegated to the 9 Committee on House Administration to the extent and for the length 10 of time the speaker determines.

(d) In the event of the absence, resignation, or death of any officer or supervisory administrative employee the speaker may designate a person to take charge of and attend to all the duties of the office affected until the officer or employee returns or until a successor is chosen.

16 SECTION 4.03. OTHER CENTRAL HOUSE PERSONNEL. (a) The 17 Committee on House Administration shall employ all personnel 18 necessary for the operation of the house other than:

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(1) those appointed under Section 4.02; or

(2) employees of an individual member or committee.

(b) For purposes of this article, the Committee on House Administration is the employing authority for all house employees other than those for whom the employing authority is the speaker, an individual member, or a committee.

25 SECTION 4.04. EMPLOYEES OF INDIVIDUAL MEMBER. A member may 26 employ, with funds from the member's operating budget, such staff 27 as the member deems necessary.

1 SECTION 4.05. COMMITTEE STAFF; AUTHORITY TO REQUEST 2 ASSISTANCE. (a) The Committee on House Administration shall 3 provide funds for the adequate staffing of all standing committees 4 of the house and all other committees appointed by the speaker.

5 (b) Select committees, interim study committees, standing committees, or subcommittees appointed pursuant to the resolution 6 adopting the rules of the house or appointed by the speaker pursuant 7 any other resolution may employ any person, 8 to firm, or corporation, subject to budget limitations. Those committees or 9 10 subcommittees may ask for the assistance of any of the employees, agencies, departments, or branches of the state government. 11

SECTION 4.06. WORK SCHEDULE; HOURS OF HOUSE OPERATIONS.
(a) An employee shall be on duty on the days and hours determined by the employing authority.

(b) All offices of the departments and divisions that support the operations of the house shall be open on days and hours determined by the Committee on House Administration or the speaker and other hours that the house or its committees are in session.

19 SECTION 4.07. COMPENSATION. (a) Officers and supervisory 20 administrative employees of the house shall receive the 21 compensation that the speaker or Committee on House Administration 22 determines.

(b) The Committee on House Administration shall fix the compensation of house personnel employed under Section 4.03. A person employed under that section who is absent without leave shall not receive compensation for the time missed.

27 (c) The salaries of employees of individual members,

1 committees, and the house shall begin when they are instructed to 2 start work by their respective employing authority.

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3 (d) Except as provided by Subsections (e) and (f) of this 4 section, an employee of an individual member, a committee 5 employee, or any person, firm, or corporation employed by a 6 committee or subcommittee may not be paid a salary in excess of 7 \$5,151 [\$5,000] for any one month.

8 (e) A member may exempt one employee of the individual member and, if the member is a chair of a standing or select 9 committee, one employee of the standing or select committee the 10 member chairs from the salary cap imposed by Subsection (d) of this 11 section. Each calendar year the member shall file with the 12 Committee on House Administration a statement designating the 13 14 exempt employee or employees, as appropriate. During a calendar 15 year after an exempt employee has been designated, the member may exempt a different employee from the salary cap only if the employee 16 17 previously designated as exempt for the calendar year is no longer employed by the member or committee, as appropriate. The exempt 18 19 employee may not receive compensation from the operating account of any other committee or member. 20

(f) The Committee on House Administration may increase the amount of the salary cap imposed by Subsection (d) of this section to account for any increase in salary provided to all state employees during the biennium that begins during the term of the legislature to which this resolution applies.

26 SECTION 4.08. DUTIES. An employee shall perform all duties 27 directed by the employing authority.

SECTION 4.09. APPEARANCE BEFORE COMMITTEES. An employee
 may appear before a standing or select committee on a measure when
 granted permission by majority vote of the committee.

4 SECTION 4.10. CHAMBER ACCESS. (a) An employee may not 5 enter the house chamber when the house is in session except when 6 performing official duties and specifically authorized by the 7 Committee on House Administration.

8 (b) An employee may not enter the area on the floor of the 9 house enclosed by the railing when the house is in session except 10 when specifically authorized by the Committee on House 11 Administration.

SECTION 4.11. VOTING. An employee may not cast a vote for a member on the voting machine or otherwise.

SECTION 4.12. VOTING RECORDS. An employee may not compile or release any information concerning the voting record of any member of the house for any session of the legislature except when a member requests information about that member's personal voting record or when the information is for the journal or other official records.

20 SECTION 4.13. CAMPAIGN FOR SPEAKER. An employee may not 21 campaign or assist in the campaign of any candidate for speaker.

SECTION 4.14. POLITICAL INFLUENCE. An employee may not attempt to, or aid anyone in an attempt to, influence any member of the house in favor of or against any measure pending before the legislature, either directly or indirectly, except when answering questions or giving information at the request of a member of the house.

1 SECTION 4.15. OUTSIDE EMPLOYMENT, EXTRA COMPENSATION, OR 2 GIFTS. An employee may not receive, directly or indirectly, any 3 compensation, by gift or otherwise, from any other source, unless 4 specifically authorized by the employing authority.

5 SECTION 4.16. DISCHARGE. (a) The employing authority of an 6 employee shall have primary responsibility for overseeing and 7 discharging the employee. An employee is subject to immediate 8 discharge by the employing authority for violation of any section 9 of this article or any other applicable rule.

10 (b) An individual member or chair of a committee employing 11 an employee who violates any applicable section of this article or 12 any rule shall be advised of the violation by the chair of the 13 Committee on House Administration, and the employing authority 14 shall take appropriate action with regard to the employee in 15 question.

16 (c) In addition to being subject to immediate discharge by 17 the employing authority under Subsection (a) of this section, an 18 employee is subject to discharge by the chair of the Committee on 19 House Administration, with the approval of the committee, if:

(1) the employee is not needed and, if the employee is employed in an individual member's office or by a committee, the member or committee chair has resigned, is deceased, or is incapacitated; or

(2) the employee is guilty of gross misconduct.
(d) The Committee on House Administration may authorize the
chair of the Committee on House Administration to conduct an
investigation into allegations of gross misconduct. The chair may,

with the approval of the committee, discharge or otherwise
 discipline an employee of an individual member or committee if the
 Committee on House Administration finds that the employee has
 engaged in gross misconduct.

5 SECTION 4.17. DURATION OF EMPLOYMENT. The period of employment of all employees shall be determined by the employing 6 except that employees of all committees 7 authority, and of 8 individual members who are not members-elect of the next legislature shall be terminated not later than noon on the day of 9 10 the convening of the next regular session.

SECTION 4.18. EMPLOYMENT BY MORE THAN ONE 11 MEMBER OR 12 COMMITTEE. (a) Members may join in the employment of a research assistant or assistants to be paid jointly from their operating 13 14 budgets. Unless expressly authorized by the provisions of this 15 resolution, the members who join together to sponsor such research shall not constitute a committee, task force, or group to operate in 16 17 any official or quasi-official manner not specifically authorized under the Rules of the House of Representatives. 18

(b) No person, firm, or corporation may be employed by morethan two committees or subcommittees.

SECTION 4.19. POSITION TITLES AND CLASSIFICATIONS. The job title for each position shall be determined by the employing authority. The employing authority and the house business office shall classify each job title for accounting purposes according to the following position classifications, unless otherwise determined by the Committee on House Administration:

24	SECTION 5.02	2.	OPERATING ACCOUNTS. (a) Each member who

6 (b) Each member who did not serve in the <u>83rd</u> [82nd] 7 Legislature shall have the same operating accounts for the <u>84th</u> 8 [83rd] Legislature as a returning member under Subsection (a) of 9 this section except that the duration of the Fiscal Year <u>15</u> [13] 10 Operating Account is from January <u>13, 2015</u> [8, 2013], through 11 August 31, <u>2015</u> [2013].

12 (c) For each member who served in the <u>83rd</u> [82nd] 13 Legislature, it shall not be necessary to close the member's Fiscal 14 Year <u>15</u> [13] Operating Account when the <u>84th</u> [83rd] Legislature 15 convenes.

16 SECTION 5.03. CREDIT FOR NEWLY ELECTED MEMBERS. Each 17 member who did not serve in the <u>83rd</u> [82nd] Legislature may have 18 credited to the member's Fiscal Year <u>15</u> [13] Operating Account the 19 amount of \$2,000.

SECTION 5.04. MONTHLY CREDIT. (a) Each member's operating account shall be credited with <u>\$14,250</u> [\$13,250] for each month that falls wholly or partly during the regular legislative session or a special legislative session. In any other month, each member's operating account shall be credited with <u>\$13,500</u> [\$11,925].

(b) The Committee on House Administration may provide to the dean and the speaker pro tempore of the house additional funds as may be determined to be necessary for the duties of those offices to

1 be fulfilled.

2 (c) The Committee on House Administration may increase the 3 amount credited each month to each member's operating account in an 4 amount to allow for an increase in:

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(1) the salary cap as provided by Section 4.07(f); or

(2) longevity pay as authorized by legislation.

DETERMINATION OF OPERATING ACCOUNT BALANCE. 7 SECTION 5.045. 8 (a) On the third business day of each calendar month, the House Business Office shall determine the available, unobligated balance 9 10 at the end of the preceding calendar month for each member's operating account and each committee operating account. If the 11 House Business Office determines that a member's operating account 12 has a negative balance at the end of the preceding calendar month, 13 14 the office shall provide notice to the member and the member shall 15 deposit funds in the account equal to the negative balance not later than the 10th business day after the date the member receives notice 16 17 of the deficit from the House Business Office; provided, however, that if a member deposits funds in the member's operating account to 18 cover a negative balance under this subsection and the member later 19 has a positive balance in the member's operating account at the end 20 21 of a calendar month in the same fiscal year in which the member deposited the funds to cover the negative balance, the member may 22 23 use the excess money in the member's operating account at that time 24 to reimburse the member in an amount not to exceed the amount the member earlier deposited to cover the negative balance. 25

26 (b) A committee operating account may not operate at a 27 deficit.

(c) If a member is not a member-elect of the <u>85th</u> [84th]
 Legislature, the member's operating account may not operate at a
 deficit after November 30, <u>2016</u> [2014].

SECTION 5.05. ACCOUNT CLOSING. (a) Each member's Fiscal
Year <u>15</u> [13] Operating Account shall be closed as of August 31, <u>2015</u>
[2013].

7 (b) Each member may carry forward and have credited to the 8 member's Fiscal Year 16 [14] Operating Account the unexpended balance of the member's Fiscal Year 15 [13] Operating Account, not 9 to exceed \$20,000. If the member is the chair of a committee, the 10 member may transfer and have credited to that committee's operating 11 account all or part of that unexpended balance, not to exceed 12 \$20,000, and may have the remainder of that amount credited to the 13 14 member's Fiscal Year 16 [14] Operating Account.

15 (c) Each member's Fiscal Year <u>16</u> [14] Operating Account
16 shall be closed as of August 31, <u>2016</u> [2014].

17 (d) Each member may carry forward and have credited to the member's Fiscal Year 17 [15] Operating Account the unexpended 18 balance of the member's Fiscal Year 16 [14] Operating Account, not 19 to exceed \$20,000. If the member is the chair of a committee, the 20 member may transfer and have credited to that committee's operating 21 account all or part of that unexpended balance, not to exceed 22 23 \$20,000, and may have the remainder of that amount credited to the 24 member's Fiscal Year 17 [15] Operating Account.

(e) A member who is the chair of a committee may not transfer and have credited to that member's operating account any portion of the unexpended balance of the committee's operating account.

SECTION 5.06. EXPENDITURES CHARGED WHEN ENCUMBERED. All
 expenditures shall be charged to the period in which they are
 encumbered.

4 SECTION 5.07. TRAVEL TO AUSTIN DURING SESSION NOT CHARGED 5 TO OPERATING ACCOUNT. While the legislature is in session, the 6 travel expenses of members for one trip each week between Austin and 7 their districts and return shall not be charged against the 8 members' operating accounts but shall be paid from funds 9 appropriated for that purpose by the legislature.

TRAVEL OUTSIDE TEXAS. A member is entitled to 10 SECTION 5.08. be reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses incurred while 11 traveling outside Texas in the performance of legislative duties 12 and responsibilities. If the reimbursement is for travel inside 13 14 the conterminous United States, reimbursement is limited to twice 15 the amount that would be reimbursed to state employees for the same travel under the comptroller's guidelines and rates governing 16 17 travel by state employees.

18 SECTION 5.09. APPROVAL OF EXPENDITURES. (a) No allowance 19 included in this resolution shall be expended except for actual 20 salaries or actual expenses of the house, its members, departments, 21 committees, and employees and for such other expenses as are 22 authorized by the Committee on House Administration.

(b) The Committee on House Administration may not authorize any expenditures of funds for personal or political campaign reasons.

26 (c) All expenditures authorized by this resolution shall be27 paid from funds appropriated for the use of the house of

representatives by vouchers or other forms approved by the speaker
 of the house and the Committee on House Administration.

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SECTION 5.10. USE OF FUNDS FOR 3 INFORMAL SETTLEMENTS PROHIBITED. No public funds appropriated to the house or expended 4 5 by any house member, committee, or office may be spent or promised to settle in whole or part a legal claim brought or threatened to be 6 brought against the house or a member, committee, office, or 7 8 employee of the house unless the settlement is made with the participation and approval of the attorney general and notice of 9 10 any settlement is promptly given to the public.

ARTICLE 6. CAUCUSES

SECTION 6.01. DEFINITION. In this article, "caucus" means 12 an organization that is composed exclusively of members of the 13 14 legislature, that elects or appoints officers and recognizes 15 identified legislators as members of the organization, and that exists for research and other support of policy development and 16 17 interests that the membership holds in common. An organization whose only nonlegislator members are the lieutenant governor or the 18 19 governor remains a "caucus" for purposes of this section.

SECTION 6.02. USE OF HOUSE FUNDS, EMPLOYEES, EQUIPMENT, AND FACILITIES. (a) Except as expressly authorized by this section, funds appropriated to the house may not be expended in support of a caucus, employees compensated from funds appropriated to the house may not perform caucus activities, and state-owned equipment may not be used in the performance of caucus activities.

26 (b) An individual member of the house may authorize the use 27 of state equipment assigned to the member's office and the

1 performance of caucus activities by an employee of the member only
2 if:

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3 (1) the member determines that the activities support
4 the member's official duties;

5 (2) the caucus does not endorse or support a candidate6 for public office; and

7 (3) the caucus does not accept contributions from
8 nonmembers that are in violation of Section 253.0341, Election
9 Code.

10 (c) A caucus may use the meeting rooms of the Capitol and 11 Capitol extension to conduct meetings of the caucus membership, to 12 host public forums on matters of interest to the caucus, or to 13 facilitate the work of the caucus or a caucus employee.

(d) An individual member may house, in the state office space assigned to the member, caucus employees or equipment owned by a caucus. A member may retain in the member's office a telephone, facsimile machine, or computer owned by the caucus for purposes of the member's communication with the caucus or caucus employees.

(e) From space under the jurisdiction of the house, theCommittee on House Administration may assign:

(1) one office space and one parking space for use bythe Texas Republican Legislative Caucus; and

24 (2) one office space and one parking space for use by25 the House Democratic Caucus.

26 SECTION 6.03. CONTRIBUTIONS. (a) A person acting on behalf 27 of a caucus may not knowingly accept a contribution in violation of

1 Section 253.0341, Election Code.

2 (b) A person acting on behalf of a caucus may not knowingly 3 accept a contribution, and shall refuse a contribution that is 4 received, in the Capitol.

5 SECTION 6.04. MEMBERSHIP AND OFFICER LISTS. Each caucus 6 shall provide to the chief clerk, on a regular basis, a list of its 7 current membership and officers.

8 SECTION 6.05. REPORT TO ETHICS COMMISSION. Each caucus 9 shall file a report of contributions and expenditures with the 10 Texas Ethics Commission as required by Section 254.0311, Election 11 Code.

12 ARTICLE 7. HOUSE RESEARCH ORGANIZATION

13 SECTION 7.01. ESTABLISHMENT. The Committee on House 14 Administration shall provide operating funds for a house research 15 organization that will be an administrative department of the house 16 and may for that purpose adopt policies and procedures relating to 17 the administrative operation of that organization.

18 SECTION 7.02. STEERING COMMITTEE. The functions and duties 19 performed by the house research organization shall be governed by a 20 15-member steering committee composed of house members serving 21 staggered four-year terms, who are subject to approval of the house 22 membership.

23 SECTION 7.03. BUDGET. The house research organization 24 shall have an operating account and in compliance with the terms of 25 its establishment shall operate under a budget approved by the 26 steering committee and the Committee on House Administration.

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ARTICLE 8. SPECIAL PROVISIONS FOR INTERIM

2 SECTION 8.01. INTERIM COMMITTEE ACTIVITIES. (a) Pursuant 3 to the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1961 (Subchapter B, 4 Chapter 301, Government Code), standing committees of the house 5 established by the rules of the house may hold meetings while the 6 legislature is not in session.

7 The speaker may grant authority to select committees, (b) 8 interim study committees, subcommittees, or standing committees of the house to hold meetings while the legislature is not in session 9 10 as the speaker considers necessary and desirable to conduct the business of the house and to assist the speaker in conducting the 11 business of the 12 house, under a pattern of operation and restrictions determined by the rules of the house. 13

14 (c) The committee members and employees may either be 15 reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses or receive a per diem 16 not to exceed that provided by law for state officials or state 17 employees, along with mileage or other transportation expenses at 18 the same rate as provided by law for state officials or state 19 employees when conducting such business and attending those 20 meetings when approved by the Committee on House Administration.

21 SECTION 8.02. POWERS AND DUTIES OF COMMITTEE ON HOUSE 22 ADMINISTRATION DURING INTERIM. (a) When the legislature is not in 23 session, the Committee on House Administration may act as provided 24 by this section.

(b) The committee may call meetings for the transaction of necessary business, and the committee members shall be reimbursed for expenses incurred by them when attending such meetings or when

1 in performance of their duties as members of the Committee on House 2 Administration, the reimbursement to be either actual and necessary 3 expenses or a per diem not to exceed that provided by law for state 4 officials or state employees, along with mileage or other 5 transportation expenses at the same rate as provided by law for 6 state officials or state employees.

7 The committee may reimburse authorized members (c) and 8 employees for expenses incurred by them when traveling in the performance of their legislative duties and responsibilities 9 within their respective districts or within any county in which any 10 part of their districts lie or from their districts to the State 11 Capitol, the reimbursement to be either actual and necessary 12 expenses or a per diem not to exceed that provided by law for state 13 14 officials or state employees, along with mileage or other 15 transportation expenses at the same rate as provided by law for state officials or state employees. 16

17 (d) The committee may pay for all other reasonable and necessary expenses, including operation of each member's district 18 19 office, incurred by the members of the house of representatives. The expenses shall be paid from funds appropriated for that 20 purpose, or any other funds appropriated for the use of the house of 21 representatives, on vouchers or other forms approved by the chair 22 of the Committee on House Administration, in accordance with 23 24 regulations governing such expenditures.

1 (e) The committee may assign or reassign parking places in 2 the best interest of the house under such terms and conditions as 3 the committee deems necessary.
