RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The life of one of professional baseball's legendary 2 players drew to a close with the passing of Ernie Banks on January 3 23, 2015, at the age of 83; and

WHEREAS, Born in Dallas on January 31, 1931, to Eddie and 4 5 Essie Banks, Ernie Banks grew up on Fairmount Street with his 11 brothers and sisters; he attended Booker T. Washington High School 6 7 and spent his summers playing for a semipro baseball team based out of Amarillo before his graduation in 1950; he subsequently began 8 9 his professional career with the Kansas City Monarchs of the Negro 10 National League, playing one season with the team before serving his country for two years as a member of the U.S. Army; he rejoined 11 12 the Monarchs after completing his military service, and in 1953 he made his major league debut with the Chicago Cubs, becoming the 13 14 first African American player to take the field for the franchise; 15 and

WHEREAS, Mr. Banks quickly proved himself an athlete of rare 16 ability, becoming the Cubs' everyday shortstop in his second year 17 with the team and setting major-league records for grand slams in a 18 season and home runs by a shortstop in 1955; he enjoyed his most 19 impressive campaign in 1958, compiling a .313 batting average, 47 20 21 home runs, and a league-leading 129 runs batted in to win the National League Most Valuable Player award; the following year, he 22 23 became the first National League player in history to capture consecutive MVP awards, hitting 45 homers and once again leading 24

- 1 the league in RBIs with 143; acknowledged for his defensive skills
- 2 as well, he led the league in fielding percentage on three occasions
- 3 from his spot at shortstop and was named a Gold Glove Award winner
- 4 in 1960; he switched to first base in 1962, logging nine successful
- 5 seasons at that position before his retirement in 1971 after 19
- 6 years with the Cubs; and
- WHEREAS, Over the course of his career, Mr. Banks tallied a
- 8 lifetime batting average of .274 to go along with 2,583 hits and
- 9 1,636 runs batted in; he was the first shortstop to join the
- 10 500-home run club, and he retired with 512 career home runs; his
- 11 myriad achievements also included 11 trips to the All-Star Game and
- 12 a selection to Major League Baseball's prestigious All-Century Team
- 13 in 1999; moreover, he was elected to the National Baseball Hall of
- 14 Fame in 1977 in his first year of eligibility, and he was awarded
- 15 the nation's highest civilian honor, the Presidential Medal of
- 16 Freedom, in 2013; and
- 17 WHEREAS, Forever known as "Mr. Cub," this esteemed
- 18 ballplayer was popular for his positive personality and his passion
- 19 for the game; in addition, his favorite saying, "It's a beautiful
- 20 day for a ballgame--let's play two!" remains one of the game's most
- 21 popular quotes; and
- 22 WHEREAS, During his two decades in Major League Baseball,
- 23 Ernie Banks captured the imagination of Cubs fans as well as
- 24 baseball enthusiasts across the nation, and his achievements will
- 25 be remembered and celebrated long into the future; now, therefore,
- 26 be it
