RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, The Center for Mexican American Studies at The 2 University of Texas at Austin is hosting El Mundo Zurdo 2015, a 3 conference honoring the legacy of internationally recognized 4 Chicana author, feminist, and cultural theorist Gloria Anzaldúa, 5 from May 27 to 30, 2015; and

6 WHEREAS, The CMAS is joined in the endeavor by the Department 7 of Mexican American and Latina/o Studies, the Society for the Study of Gloria Anzaldúa, and the Nettie Lee Benson Latin American 8 9 Collection, and the event serves to highlight the Benson Collection's archival materials on the author, 10 including correspondence, clippings, photographs, posters, and artwork 11 pertaining to her life; and 12

WHEREAS, Born on September 26, 1942, to a family of migrant 13 14 farm workers in the Rio Grande Valley, Gloria Anzaldúa worked in the fields at an early age; despite her humble upbringing and the 15 16 struggles she encountered in a segregated school system, she went on to excel in her studies, and in 1969, she graduated from Pan 17 American University with a bachelor's degree in English, art, and 18 secondary education; she later received her master's degree from 19 20 The University of Texas and enjoyed a career as an educator, teaching in public schools and eventually at universities, where 21 she led courses in feminism, Chicano studies, and creative writing; 22 23 and

WHEREAS, In the late 1960s, Gloria Anzaldúa became active in

1 the farmworkers movement and other campaigns for equality, but she felt marginalized by what she perceived as a male, heteronormative 2 3 bias in those groups; she was drawn to feminist and metaphysical studies in the mid-1970s and moved to develop her own theories 4 5 challenging social and cultural boundaries and illuminating the need for inclusion and change; in addition to her work in academia, 6 she published the semiautobiographical Borderlands/La Frontera: 7 8 The New Mestiza, her most acclaimed book, which was named one of the top 100 best books of the century by the Hungry Mind Review and Utne 9 10 Reader; she remained a prolific writer, publishing prose, poetry, and children's books, until the end of her life on May 15, 2004; and 11

12 WHEREAS, Gloria Anzaldúa brought a unique and compelling 13 perspective to Chicano, political, and feminist discourse, and 14 through her writings, she left behind a rich legacy that continues 15 to resonate today; now, therefore, be it

16 RESOLVED, That the House of Representatives of the 84th Texas 17 Legislature hereby pay tribute to the life and work of Gloria 18 Anzaldúa and extend sincere best wishes to all those participating 19 in El Mundo Zurdo 2015 for a successful and memorable event.
