4	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
5	SECTION 1. Subtitle E, Title 4, Government Code, is amended
6	by adding Chapter 470 to read as follows:
7	CHAPTER 470. ADVISORY COUNCIL ON CULTURAL AFFAIRS
8	Sec. 470.001. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter:
9	(1) "Council" means the Advisory Council on Cultural
10	Affairs.
11	(2) "State agency" includes an institution of higher
12	education as defined by Section 61.003, Education Code.
13	Sec. 470.002. ESTABLISHMENT. The Advisory Council on
14	Cultural Affairs is established in the office of the governor to
15	advise the office on furthering the economic, social, legal, and

- this state. Sec. 470.003. COMPOSITION; TERMS. (a) The council is 18
- composed of nine members appointed as follows: 19
- 20 (1) one ex officio member of the legislature appointed

- 1 (b) Members appointed by the speaker of the house and the
- 2 lieutenant governor serve two-year terms. Members appointed by the
- 3 governor serve four-year staggered terms, with either three or four
- 4 members' terms expiring February 1 of each odd-numbered year.
- 5 (c) In making appointments to the council, the appointing
- 6 officials shall attempt to achieve geographic representation of the
- 7 Hispanic population from all areas of the state.
- 8 (d) The governor shall designate the chair and vice chair of
- 9 the council from among the members of the council.
- Sec. 470.004. MEETINGS. The council shall meet at least
- 11 quarterly each fiscal year. The council may hold meetings by
- 12 <u>conference call.</u>
- Sec. 470.005. COMPENSATION. A member of the council is not
- 14 entitled to compensation or reimbursement of expenses incurred in
- 15 performing council duties.
- Sec. 470.006. DUTIES. The council shall:
- 17 (1) monitor existing programs and legislation
- 18 designed to meet the needs of the Hispanic population;
- 19 (2) serve as a liaison between the Hispanic community
- 20 and the office of the governor and other governmental entities;
- 21 (3) facilitate meetings with the Hispanic Caucus of
- 22 the senate, the Mexican American Legislative Caucus of the house of
- 23 representatives, and the office of the governor to address the
- 24 <u>legislative needs of the Hispanic population;</u>
- 25 (4) assist the secretary of state in inviting public
- 26 and business leaders from Spanish-speaking countries to the state;
- 27 (5) recommend Hispanics to serve on appointed state

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   boards and commissions;
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               (6) work with the state demographer to assess the
   demographic indicators and milestones of the Hispanic population;
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               (7) collaborate with business organizations,
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   stakeholders, and the Texas Workforce Commission to review state
   and local policies that affect business creation and expansion in
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   order to develop policy recommendations for:
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                    (A) streamlining or eliminating unnecessary
   barriers to business creation, retention, and expansion in order to
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   develop greater entrepreneurship opportunities that will benefit
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   the Hispanic population and Hispanic-owned businesses in high-need
   areas;
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                    (B) creating a better business climate to
   increase job creation, retention, and expansion opportunities for
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   small and Hispanic-owned businesses;
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                    (C) assisting in revitalizing the industrial,
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   manufacturing, and high technology sectors of the state's economy
   to better address the needs of the Hispanic workforce; and
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                    (D) strengthening employment opportunities
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   more effectively increase participation of Hispanics
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   well-paying jobs and lower the unemployment rate within the
   Hispanic population;
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               (8) analyze the employment policies and practices of
   employers in the public and private sectors in order to develop
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   recommendations on improving equal opportunity and treatment for
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   the Hispanic population and other minorities in employment;
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              (9) evaluate the development of methods
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initiatives to assure fuller employment options and greater 1 2 employment opportunities for Hispanics; 3 (10) work with the education community and the private sector to develop appropriate recommendations and initiatives 4 relating to the following goals: 5 6 (A) retaining Hispanic students in public 7 schools by decreasing the dropout rate; (B) closing the education achievement gap; 8 9 (C) furthering the accomplishments of Hispanics enrolled in institutions of higher education; 10 11 (D) increasing work-study, mentorship, and 12 financial assistance for Hispanic students; 13 (E) informing Hispanics about nontraditional 14 education and employment opportunities; and 15 (F) evaluating programs designed to provide 16 equal educational opportunities to the Hispanic population, as 17 mandated by state and federal law; 18 (11) review licensing and regulation requirements in 19 the state in order to: 20 (A) determine the effect of those requirements on the Hispanic population's ability to enter into chosen occupations 21 22 and to compete in the free market; and

(B) develop recommendations to eliminate

(12) work with health and medical experts in the

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constituencies;

- 1 private sector and at institutions of higher education to identify
- 2 pressing fundamental health concerns of the Hispanic population;
- 3 (13) address equal treatment of the Hispanic
- 4 population in the educational, judicial, and health systems by:
- 5 (A) analyzing the application to the Hispanic
- 6 population of the laws of this state that govern those systems;
- 7 (B) monitoring the implementation of laws that
- 8 affect the legal rights and duties of the Hispanic population; and
- 9 (C) educating members of the Hispanic population
- 10 about their legal rights and duties; and
- 11 (14) study and research any other related matter of
- 12 importance to the council or the governor.
- 13 Sec. 470.007. RECOMMENDATIONS. (a) The council shall
- 14 submit a report of the council's recommendations to the governor,
- 15 lieutenant governor, and speaker of the house of representatives
- 16 not later than October 1 of each even-numbered year.
- 17 (b) The council shall include in the report recommendations
- 18 about:
- 19 (1) the status and funding of state programs designed
- 20 to address the needs of the Hispanic population; and
- 21 (2) reforms, policies, and statutory changes to
- 22 <u>further the economic, social, legal, and political contributions of</u>
- 23 <u>Hispanics in the state.</u>
- Sec. 470.008. EXEMPTION. Chapter 2110 does not apply to the
- 25 council.
- Sec. 470.009. ASSISTANCE OF STATE AGENCIES. State agencies
- 27 and political subdivisions of this state shall cooperate with the

- 1 council to the greatest extent practicable to fully implement the
- 2 council's statutory duties.
- 3 SECTION 2. Not later than October 1, 2015, the speaker of
- 4 the house of representatives, the lieutenant governor, and the
- 5 governor shall appoint the members of the Advisory Council on
- 6 Cultural Affairs established by Chapter 470, Government Code, as
- 7 added by this Act. In appointing the initial members of the
- 8 council, the governor shall appoint three persons to terms expiring
- 9 February 1, 2017, and four to terms expiring February 1, 2019.
- 10 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 11 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 12 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 13 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 14 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
