- 4 SECTION 1. Section 772.010, Government Code, as added by

- 6 Session, 1999, is reenacted and amended to read as follows:
- 7 Sec. 772.010. BORDER COMMERCE COORDINATOR. (a) The
- 8 governor shall designate a border commerce coordinator in the
- 9 governor's office or the office of the secretary of state as
- 10 determined by the governor. The coordinator shall:
- 11 (1) examine trade issues between the United States,
- 12 Mexico, and Canada;
- 13 (2) act as an ombudsman for government agencies within
- 14 the Texas and Mexico border region to help reduce regulations by
- 15 improving communication and cooperation between federal, state,
- 16 and local governments;
- 17 (3) work with federal officials to resolve
- 18 transportation issues involving infrastructure, including roads
- 19 and bridges, to allow for the efficient movement of goods and people
- 20 across the border between Texas and Mexico;
- 21 (4) work with federal officials to create a unified
- 22 federal agency process to streamline border crossing needs;
- 23 (5) work to increase funding for the North American
- 24 Development Bank to assist in the financing of water and wastewater

- 1 facilities; [and]
- 2 (6) explore the sale of excess electric power from
- 3 Texas to Mexico;
- 4 (7) study the flow of commerce at ports of entry
- 5 between this state and Mexico, including the movement of commercial
- 6 vehicles across the border, and establish a plan to aid that
- 7 commerce and improve the movement of those vehicles;
- 8 (8) work to identify problems associated with border
- 9 truck inspections and related trade and transportation
- 10 infrastructure and develop recommendations for addressing those
- 11 problems;
- 12 (9) work with the appropriate state and federal
- 13 agencies to develop initiatives to mitigate congestion at ports of
- 14 entry; and
- 15 (10) develop recommendations designed to:
- 16 (A) increase trade by attracting new business
- 17 <u>ventures;</u>
- 18 (B) support expansion of existing and new
- 19 industries; and
- 20 (C) address workforce training needs.
- 21 (b) The governor shall appoint a border commerce
- 22 coordinator to serve at the will of the governor in the governor's
- 23 office or in the office of the secretary of state and may select the
- 24 secretary of state as the coordinator.
- 25 (c) The coordinator shall work with the interagency work
- 26 group established under Section 772.011, with local governments,
- 27 metropolitan planning organizations, and other appropriate

- (e) The coordinator shall appoint a border mayor task force,
- 20 to be named the Texas Good Neighbor Committee, consisting of the
- 21 mayors from every municipality located in this state along the
- 22 border between Texas and Mexico that has an adjoining sister city in
- 23 Mexico. The task force shall:
- (1) advise the coordinator on key trade, security, and
- 25 transportation-related issues important to the municipalities
- 26 appointed to the task force;
- 27 (2) hold quarterly meetings with mayors from Mexico

19	1136) and 1339 (H.B. 564), Acts of the 76th Legislature, Regular	
20	Session, 1999, is repealed.	
21	SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives	
22	a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as	
23	provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this	
24	Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this	
25	Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
