A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT
2	relating to the border commerce coordinator.
3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Section 772.010, Government Code, as added by
5	Chapter 1339 (H.B. 564), Acts of the 76th Legislature, Regular
6	Session, 1999, is reenacted and amended to read as follows:
7	Sec. 772.010. BORDER COMMERCE COORDINATOR. (a) The
8	governor shall designate a border commerce coordinator in the
9	governor's office or the office of the secretary of state as
10	determined by the governor. The coordinator shall:
11	(1) examine trade issues between the United States,

12 Mexico, and Canada;

13 (2) act as an ombudsman for government agencies within 14 the Texas and Mexico border region to help reduce regulations by 15 improving communication and cooperation between federal, state, 16 and local governments;

17 (3) work with federal officials to resolve 18 transportation issues involving infrastructure, including roads 19 and bridges, to allow for the efficient movement of goods and people 20 across the border between Texas and Mexico;

(4) work with federal officials to create a unified
federal agency process to streamline border crossing needs;

(5) work to increase funding for the North AmericanDevelopment Bank to assist in the financing of water and wastewater

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facilities; [and] 1 (6) explore the sale of excess electric power from 2 Texas to Mexico; 3 (7) study the flow of commerce at ports of entry 4 between this state and Mexico, including the movement of commercial 5 vehicles across the border, and establish a plan to aid that 6 7 commerce and improve the movement of those vehicles; 8 (8) work to identify problems associated with border truck inspections and related trade and transportation 9 infrastructure and develop recommendations for addressing those 10 11 problems; (9) work with the appropriate state and federal 12 13 agencies to develop initiatives to mitigate congestion at ports of entry; and 14 15 (10) develop recommendations designed to: 16 (A) increase trade by attracting new business 17 ventures; 18 (B) support expansion of existing and new 19 industries; and 20 (C) address workforce training needs. 21 (b) The governor shall appoint a border commerce 22 coordinator to serve at the will of the governor in the governor's office or in the office of the secretary of state and may select the 23 24 secretary of state as the coordinator. 25 (c) The coordinator shall work with the interagency work group established under Section 772.011, with local governments, 26 27 metropolitan planning organizations, and other appropriate

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community organizations adjacent to the border of this state with 1 2 Mexico, and with comparable entities in Mexican states adjacent to 3 that border to address the unique planning and capacity needs of those areas. The coordinator shall assist those governments, 4 organizations, and entities to identify and develop initiatives to 5 address those needs. Before January 1 of each year, the coordinator 6 7 shall submit to the presiding officer of each house of the legislature a report of the coordinator's activities under this 8 9 subsection during the preceding year. 10 (d) The coordinator shall: 11 (1) work with private industry and appropriate 12 entities of Texas and the United States to require that low-sulfur 13 fuel be sold along highways in Texas carrying increased traffic related to activities under the North American Free Trade 14 15 Agreement; and 16 (2) work with representatives of the government of 17 Mexico and the governments of Mexican states bordering Texas to increase the use of low-sulfur fuel. 18 (e) The coordinator shall appoint a border mayor task force, 19 20 to be named the Texas Good Neighbor Committee, consisting of the mayors from every municipality located in this state along the 21 border between Texas and Mexico that has an adjoining sister city in 22 23 Mexico. The task force shall: 24 (1) advise the coordinator on key trade, security, and 25 transportation-related issues important to the municipalities 26 appointed to the task force; 27 (2) hold quarterly meetings with mayors from Mexico

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1 2 to:

(A) increase:

- (i) cooperation; 3 (ii) communication; and 4 (iii) the flow of information; 5 (B) identify problems; and 6 7 (C) recommend solutions; (3) seek assistance and input from private sector 8 stakeholders involved in commerce to identify issues to address; 9 10 and
- 11 (4) provide recommendations to assist the coordinator 12 in carrying out the coordinator's statutory duties.

SECTION 2. (a) Section 772.010, Government Code, as added by Chapter 429 (S.B. 1136), Acts of the 76th Legislature, Regular Session, 1999, is repealed.

(b) Section 3(a), Chapter 1215 (H.B. 925), Acts of the 79th
Legislature, Regular Session, 2005, which reenacted and amended
Section 772.010, Government Code, as added by Chapters 429 (S.B.
1136) and 1339 (H.B. 564), Acts of the 76th Legislature, Regular
Session, 1999, is repealed.

SECTION 3. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2015.

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
