A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1	AN ACT

- 2 relating to the development and alignment by the Texas Higher
- 3 Education Coordinating Board of curricula for certain educational
- 4 programs.
- 5 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
- 6 SECTION 1. Section 61.823, Education Code, is amended by
- 7 adding Subsection (e) to read as follows:
- 8 <u>(e)</u> The board, with the assistance of an appropriate
- 9 advisory committee, shall periodically review each field of study
- 10 curriculum to ensure alignment with student interest and academic
- 11 and industry needs.
- 12 SECTION 2. Subchapter S, Chapter 61, Education Code, is
- 13 amended by adding Section 61.8235 to read as follows:
- 14 Sec. 61.8235. CAREER AND TECHNICAL EDUCATION PROGRAM OF
- 15 STUDY CURRICULA. (a) The board, with the assistance of
- 16 institutions of higher education, career and technical education
- 17 experts, and college and career readiness experts, shall establish
- 18 alignment between the college and career readiness standards and
- 19 the knowledge, skills, and abilities students are expected to
- 20 demonstrate in career and technical education by establishing
- 21 programs of study that:
- 22 (1) incorporate rigorous college and career readiness
- 23 standards, including career and technical education standards that
- 24 address both academic and technical content;

1	(2) support attainment of employability and career
2	readiness skills;
3	(3) progress in content specificity by beginning with
4	all aspects of an industry or career cluster and leading to more
5	occupationally specific instruction or by preparing students for
6	ongoing postsecondary career preparation;
7	(4) incorporate multiple entry and exit points with
8	portable demonstrations of technical or career competency, which
9	may include credit transfer agreements or industry-recognized
10	certifications; and
11	(5) culminate in the attainment of:
12	(A) an industry-recognized certification,
13	<pre>credential, or license;</pre>
14	(B) a registered apprenticeship or
15	<pre>credit-bearing postsecondary certificate; or</pre>
16	(C) an associate or baccalaureate degree.
17	(b) The board, with the assistance of advisory committees
18	composed of representatives of secondary education, postsecondary
19	education, business and industry, other state agencies or licensing
20	bodies, and other career and technical education experts, shall
21	develop career and technical education program of study curricula.
22	Each advisory committee shall have at least one representative from
23	each identified group. The advisory committees shall identify the
24	knowledge, skills, and abilities required to prepare students for
25	high-skill, high-wage jobs in high-demand occupations.
26	(c) In developing program of study curricula under
27	Subsection (b), the board shall pursue a management strategy that

- 1 maximizes efficiency, including a management strategy that
- 2 provides for the decentralization of advisory committees to enable
- 3 concurrent development of curricula for different programs of
- 4 study.
- 5 (d) The board may partner with the Texas Education Agency,
- 6 the Texas Workforce Commission, and other state agencies to develop
- 7 programs of study under this section.
- 8 (e) A program of study established under this section must:
- 9 (1) focus on the current and future needs of employers
- 10 <u>in this state;</u>
- 11 (2) clearly define career pathways with logical entry
- 12 and exit points for students;
- 13 (3) indicate the types of careers and the names of
- 14 certifications or licenses aligned to the program of study;
- 15 (4) provide for students who begin a program of study
- 16 at a public junior college, public state college, or public
- 17 technical institute to transfer to another public junior college,
- 18 public state college, or public technical institute without having
- 19 to repeat classes or incur significant interruption of their
- 20 ability to progress through the program of study;
- 21 (5) be designed to meet the needs of business and
- 22 industry with a high degree of commonality across the state;
- 23 (6) align with the college and career readiness
- 24 standards; and
- 25 (7) be revised on a reoccurring schedule, not to
- 26 exceed once every five years, to ensure the programs of study remain
- 27 current and relevant to the needs of business and industry.

- (f) A student enrolled in a board-established program of 1 study who transfers from a public junior college, public state 2 college, or public technical institute to another public junior 3 college, public state college, or public technical institute that 4 offers a similar program, regardless of whether the institution has 5 adopted the board-established program of study, shall receive 6 academic credit from the institution to which the student 7 transferred for each of the courses that the student has 8 successfully completed in the program of study curriculum. Unless 9 otherwise required by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern 10 Association of Colleges and Schools, the student may complete the 11 program of study at the institution to which the student 12 transferred by completing only the remaining number of semester 13 14 credit hours the student would need to complete the program of study 15 at the institution from which the student transferred.
- 16 <u>(g) The board, the Texas Education Agency, and the Texas</u>
 17 <u>Workforce Commission may adopt rules as necessary for the</u>
 18 administration of this section.
- 19 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
