CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

1 WHEREAS, Food insecurity and inadequate nutrition are

growing problems among families living in Texas border colonias;

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WHEREAS, In a recent study of Rio Grande Valley families, 80

5 percent of mothers reported household food insecurity, and 64

6 percent of children experienced food insecurity; these rates are

7 higher than national rates, reflecting the region's poverty, lower

8 levels of education, and average household size; and

9 WHEREAS, Children who are not well nourished are at a greater

risk of negative behavioral, social, academic, and health outcomes;

11 although school-based nutrition programs help, they may not be able

12 to completely address children's needs; and

WHEREAS, Poor nutrition is a factor in diabetes and obesity,

14 and these conditions cost the region hundreds of millions of

15 dollars; underlying diabetes is present in over half of area

16 hospital admissions for serious conditions, and the cost in lost

17 wages alone has been calculated at \$227 million a year; and

18 WHEREAS, The Food, Nutrition, and Conservation Act of 2008

authorized \$20 million for the Healthy Incentives Pilot; this

20 project investigates the impact of making fruits and vegetables

21 more affordable for participants in the Supplemental Nutrition

22 Assistance Program; under HIP, beneficiaries earn a bonus of 30

23 cents for every SNAP dollar they spend on healthy fruits and

24 vegetables at participating retailers; interim results indicate

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- 1 that consumption of fruits and vegetables increases significantly
- 2 through the use of these incentives, and participants purchase a
- 3 greater variety of produce items as well; and
- 4 WHEREAS, Federal nutrition assistance programs administered
- 5 by the USDA are powerful tools to promote well-being; many
- 6 residents of the Rio Grande Valley are SNAP recipients, and the
- 7 implementation of HIP could play an important role in improving
- 8 nutrition and reducing obesity, diabetes, and related maladies in
- 9 the region; now, therefore, be it
- 10 RESOLVED, That the 84th Legislature of the State of Texas
- 11 hereby respectfully urge the United States Department of
- 12 Agriculture Food and Nutrition Service to select the Rio Grande
- 13 Valley region as the next expansion site for the Healthy Incentives
- 14 Pilot program; and, be it further
- 15 RESOLVED, That the Texas secretary of state forward an
- 16 official copy of this resolution to the U.S. secretary of
- 17 agriculture.
