3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Chapter 2306, Government Code, is amended by
5	adding Subchapter 00 to read as follows:
6	SUBCHAPTER OO. HOMELESS YOUTH
7	Sec. 2306.1101. DEFINITION. In this subchapter, "homeless
8	youth" means a person who is younger than 19 years of age, including
9	a migratory child, as defined by Section 1309, Elementary and
10	Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20 U.S.C. Section 6399), who:
11	(1) lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime
12	residence, including a person who is:
13	(A) temporarily allowed to stay in the house of
14	another person due to loss of housing;
15	(B) temporarily living in a motel or hotel;
16	(C) living in an emergency shelter;
17	(D) abandoned in a hospital; or
18	(E) awaiting foster care placement;
19	(2) has a primary nighttime residence that is a public
20	or private place not designed or ordinarily used as a regular
21	sleeping accommodation for humans; or
22	(3) is living in a car, park, other public space,
23	abandoned building, substandard housing, bus or train station, or
24	similar setting.

- 6 (1) collect data on the number of homeless youth in
- 7 this state;
- 8 (2) examine the needs of homeless youth and the degree
- 9 to which current programs are meeting those needs;
- 10 (3) identify any sources of funding that might be
- 11 available to provide services to homeless youth; and
- 12 (4) develop a strategic plan establishing steps to be
- 13 taken and timelines for reducing youth homelessness in this state.
- 14 (c) The department shall submit a report on the study to the
- 15 <u>legislature not later than December 1, 2016. The report must</u>
- 16 include a summary of the information resulting from the study and
- 17 recommendations for changes in law necessary to provide services to
- 18 or otherwise assist homeless youth.
- 19 (d) This section expires September 1, 2017.
- 20 SECTION 2. This Act takes effect immediately if it receives
- 21 a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each house, as
- 22 provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. If this
- 23 Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate effect, this
- 24 Act takes effect September 1, 2015.
