A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

1 AN ACT

2 relating to the issuance of 36th Infantry Division specialty  
3 license plates and souvenir license plates.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

5 SECTION 1. Section 504.009, Transportation Code, is amended  
6 by adding Subsection (a-1) to read as follows:

7 (a-1) On request, the department shall issue a souvenir  
8 version of the specialty license plate described by Section  
9 504.320.


10 SECTION 2. Subchapter D, Chapter 504, Transportation Code,  
11 is amended by adding Section 504.320 to read as follows:

12 Sec. 504.320. 36TH INFANTRY DIVISION. The department shall  
13 issue specialty license plates for persons who have served in the  
14 36th Infantry Division of the Texas Army National Guard. The  
15 license plates must include the 36th Infantry Division emblem and  
16 must include the words "36th Infantry Division" at the bottom of  
17 each plate.

18 SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2015.

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5 SECTION 1. Subchapter D, Chapter 504, Transportation Code,  
6 is amended by adding Section 504.320 to read as follows:
