The commissioner shall 15 determine a method by which a student's satisfactory performance on the PSAT or the ACT-Plan shall be used to satisfy the requirements 16 17 concerning an end-of-course assessment instrument in an equivalent course as prescribed by Subsection (a). A student who fails to 18 19 perform satisfactorily on a test or other assessment instrument authorized under this subsection, other than the PSAT or the 20 ACT-Plan, may retake that test or other assessment instrument for 21 this subsection or may take the appropriate 22 purposes of end-of-course assessment instrument. A student who fails to 23 24 perform satisfactorily on the PSAT or the ACT-Plan must take the appropriate end-of-course assessment instrument. The commissioner 25 26 shall adopt rules as necessary for the administration of this 27 subsection.
