3	BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
4	SECTION 1. Subchapter A, Chapter 5, Alcoholic Beverage
5	Code, is amended by adding Section 5.21 to read as follows:
6	Sec. 5.21. DONATION OF ACCRUED COMPENSATORY TIME OR ACCRUED
7	ANNUAL LEAVE FOR LEGISLATIVE PURPOSES. (a) The administrator
8	shall allow a peace officer employed by the commission to
9	voluntarily transfer to a legislative leave pool up to eight hours
10	of compensatory time or annual leave per year earned by the peace
11	officer.
12	(b) The administrator or the administrator's designee shall
13	administer the legislative leave pool.
14	(c) The commission shall adopt rules and prescribe
15	procedures relating to the operation of the legislative leave pool.
16	(d) The administrator or the administrator's designee shall
17	credit the legislative leave pool with the amount of time
18	contributed by a peace officer and deduct a corresponding amount of
19	time from the peace officer's earned compensatory time or annual
20	leave as if the peace officer had used the time for personal
21	purposes.
22	(e) A peace officer is entitled to use time contributed to
23	the legislative leave pool if the peace officer uses the time for
24	legislative leave on behalf of a law enforcement association of at

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1	least 50 active or retired members governed by a board of directors.			
2	(f) The administrator or the administrator's designee shall			
3	transfer time from the pool to the peace officer and credit the time			
4	to the peace officer.			
5	(g) A peace officer may only withdraw time from the			
6	legislative leave pool in coordination with and with the consent of			
7	the president or designee of the law enforcement association			
8	described in Subsection (e). A peace officer may not draw more than			
9	80 hours from the pool in a 160-hour work cycle and may not draw more			
10	than 480 hours from the pool in a fiscal year.			
11	(h) A peace officer shall use time from the legislative			
12	leave pool in accordance with rules adopted by the commission.			
13	SECTION 2. Section 402.009, Government Code, is amended to			
14	read as follows:			
15	Sec. 402.009. AUTHORITY TO EMPLOY AND COMMISSION PEACE			
16	OFFICERS. (a) The attorney general may employ and commission peace			
17	officers as investigators for the limited purpose of assisting the			
18	attorney general in carrying out the duties of that office relating			
19	to prosecution assistance and crime prevention.			
20	(b) The attorney general shall ensure that a commissioned			
21	peace officer employed as authorized under Subsection (a) is			
22	compensated according to Schedule C of the position classification			
23	salary schedule prescribed by the General Appropriations Act.			
24	SECTION 3. Section 659.301(5), Government Code, is amended			
25	to read as follows:			
26	(5) "State employee" means an individual who:			
27	(A) is a commissioned law enforcement officer of

1 the Department of Public Safety, the Texas Facilities Commission, the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission, [or] the Texas Department 2 3 of Criminal Justice, or the attorney general; (B) is a commissioned security officer of the 4 comptroller; 5 (C) is a law enforcement officer commissioned by 6 7 the Parks and Wildlife Commission; 8 (D) is а commissioned peace officer of an institution of higher education; 9 10 (E) is an employee or official of the Board of Pardons and Paroles or the parole division of the Texas Department 11 12 of Criminal Justice if the employee or official has routine direct contact with inmates of any penal or correctional institution or 13 with administratively released prisoners subject to the board's 14 15 jurisdiction; 16 (F) has been certified to the Employees 17 Retirement System of Texas under Section 815.505 as having begun employment as a law enforcement officer or custodial officer, 18 19 unless the individual has been certified to the system as having 20 ceased employment as a law enforcement officer or custodial officer; or 21

(G) before May 29, 1987, received hazardous duty
pay based on the terms of any state law if the individual holds a

25 SECTION 4. Section 661.918(a), Government Code, is amended 26 to read as follows:

(a) The director 11 12 shall allow a peace officer employed by the department to voluntarily transfer to a legislative leave pool up to eight hours 13 of compensatory time or annual leave per year earned by the peace 14 15 officer. (b) The director or the director's designee 16 shall 17 administer the legislative leave pool. (c) The commission shall adopt rules and prescribe 18 19 procedures relating to the operation of the legislative leave pool. (d) The director or the director's designee shall credit the 20 legislative leave pool with the amount of time contributed by a 21 peace officer and deduct a corresponding amount of time from the 22 peace officer's earned compensatory time or annual leave as if the 23 24 peace officer had used the time for personal purposes. 25 (e) A peace officer is entitled to use time contributed to 26 the legislative leave pool if the peace officer uses the time for

3 (f) The director or the director's designee shall transfer time from the pool to the peace officer and credit the time to the 4 5 peace officer.

6 (g) A peace officer may only withdraw time from the 7 legislative leave pool in coordination with and with the consent of the president or designee of the law enforcement association 8 described in Subsection (e). A peace officer may not draw more than 9 10 80 hours from the pool in a 160-hour work cycle and may not draw more than 480 hours from the pool in a fiscal year. 11

12 (h) A peace officer shall use time from the legislative leave pool in accordance with rules adopted by the commission. 13

SECTION 6. (a) The classification officer in the office of 14 15 the state auditor shall classify the position of commissioned peace officer employed as an investigator by the Office of the Attorney 16 17 General as a Schedule C position under the Texas Position Classification Plan, 1961. 18

The change made by the classification officer 19 (b) as required by this section applies beginning in the state fiscal 20 biennium beginning September 1, 2015. 21

This section expires September 1, 2017. (c)

SECTION 7. Section 661.918(a), Government Code, as amended 23 by this Act, applies only to an injury that occurs on or after the 24 effective date of this Act. 25

26 SECTION 8. This Act takes effect September 1, 2015.

Estimated Two-year Net Impact to General Revenue Related Funds for HB2037, As Passed 2nd House: a negative impact of (\$3,999,242) through the biennium ending August 31, 2017.

The bill would make no appropriation but could provide the legal basis for an appropriation of funds to implement the provisions of the bill.

Fiscal Analysis

The bill would amend the Government Code directing the Office of the Attorney General (OAG) to compensate commissioned peace officers employed by the agency according to Schedule C prescribed by the General Appropriations Act.

Under the bill provisions, the OAG indicated the fiscal impact related to compensating commissioned peace officers according to Schedule C would be \$3,005,037 in fiscal year 2016, \$3,150,775 in fiscal year 2017, \$3,187,351 in fiscal year 2018, \$3,234,752 in fiscal year 2018, and \$3,355,220 in fiscal year 2020.

The State Auditor's Office indicated the costs associated with implementation of the bill could be absorbed with existing resources. The bill would take effect September 1, 2015.

Methodology

Currently, the OAG employs 167 commissioned peace officers in the Law Enforcement Division (96) and the Medicaid Fraud Control Unit (71) that are compensated under Schedule B of the General Appropriations Act and are classified as Investigators III-VII, Managers III-IV, and Directors I-II. Under the bill provisions, the commissioned peace officers employed by the OAG would be classified as Sergeants, Lieutenants, Captains, and Majors under Schedule C.

According to the OAG, the classification to Sergeants, Lieutenants, Captains, and Majors would be based on years of service and demonstrated ability. However, generally speaking Investigators III-V would be classified as Sergeants, Investigators VI-VII as Lieutenants, Managers III-IV as Captains, and Directors I-II as Majors. It is assumed the salaries will be based on 12 months of service at constant levels of employment.

Local Government Impact

No significant fiscal implication to units of local government is anticipated.

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Fiscal Analysis

The bill would amend the Alcoholic Beverage Code, the Government Code, and the Parks and Wildlife Code to allow certain commissioned peace officers to transfer portions of compensatory and annual leave to a legislative leave pool and directing the Office of the Attorney General

(OAG) to compensate commissioned peace officers employed by the agency according to Schedule C prescribed by the General Appropriations Act.

Under the bill provisions, the OAG indicated the fiscal impact related to compensating commissioned peace officers according to Schedule C would be \$3,005,037 in fiscal year 2016, \$3,150,775 in fiscal year 2017, \$3,187,351 in fiscal year 2018, \$3,234,752 in fiscal year 2018, and \$3,355,220 in fiscal year 2020. Based on LBB analysis, it is assumed the OAG's duties and responsibilities associated with the legislative leave pool could be accomplished by utilizing existing resources.

The State Auditor's Office, Employee Retirement System, Alcoholic Beverage Commission, and Parks and Wildlife Department indicated the costs associated with implementation of the bill could be absorbed with existing resources.

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Local Government Impact

No significant fiscal implication to units of local government is anticipated.
