## A BILL TO BE ENTITLED

AN ACT

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3

2 relating to public school accountability.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

4 SECTION 1. Section 11.252(a), Education Code, is amended to 5 read as follows:

6 (a) Each school district shall have a district improvement 7 plan that is developed, evaluated, and revised annually, in accordance with district policy, by the superintendent with the 8 assistance of the district-level committee established under 9 Section 11.251. The purpose of the district improvement plan is to 10 guide district and campus staff in the improvement of student 11 12 performance for all student groups in order to attain state standards in respect to the <u>domain</u> [achievement] indicators adopted 13 14 under Section 39.053(c), other than the indicators that are locally evaluated under Sections 39.053(c)(3)(A)(i) and (ii) [Sections 15 16  $\frac{39.053(c)(1)-(4)}{39.053(c)(1)-(4)}$ ]. The district improvement plan must include provisions for: 17

(1) a 18 comprehensive needs assessment addressing district student performance on the achievement indicators, and 19 other appropriate measures of performance, that are disaggregated 20 by all student groups served by the district, including categories 21 of ethnicity, socioeconomic status, sex, and populations served by 22 23 special programs, including students in special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29; 24

(2) measurable district performance objectives for 1 appropriate achievement indicators for all 2 all student 3 populations, including students in special education programs under Subchapter A, Chapter 29, and other measures of student 4 5 performance that may be identified through the comprehensive needs assessment; 6

7 (3) strategies for improvement of student performance8 that include:

9 (A) instructional methods for addressing the 10 needs of student groups not achieving their full potential;

11 (B) methods for addressing the needs of students 12 for special programs, including:

(i) suicide prevention programs, in
 accordance with Subchapter O-1, Chapter 161, Health and Safety
 Code, which includes a parental or guardian notification procedure;

Section 11.253(c), Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows: Each school year, the principal of each school campus, 27 (c)

1 with the assistance of the campus-level committee, shall develop, review, and revise the campus improvement plan for the purpose of 2 3 improving student performance for all student populations, including students in special education programs under Subchapter 4 A, Chapter 29, with respect to the relevant domain [achievement] 5 under <u>Section 39.053(c)</u> 6 indicators adopted [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(4)] and any other appropriate performance measures 7 8 for special needs populations.

9 SECTION 3. Section 12.1013(c), Education Code, is amended 10 to read as follows:

(c) The report must include the performance of each public school in each class described by Subsection (b) as measured by the domain [achievement] indicators adopted under <u>Section 39.053(c)</u> [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(4)] and student attrition rates.

15 SECTION 4. Section 29.062(a), Education Code, is amended to 16 read as follows:

17 (a) The legislature recognizes that compliance with this subchapter is an imperative public necessity. Therefore, 18 in 19 accordance with the policy of the state, the agency shall evaluate 20 the effectiveness of programs under this subchapter based on the <u>domain</u> [achievement] indicators adopted under <u>Section 39.053(c)</u> 21 [Sections 39.053(c)(1)-(4)], including the results of assessment 22 23 instruments. The agency may combine evaluations under this section 24 with federal accountability measures concerning students of limited English proficiency. 25

26 SECTION 5. Section 29.202(a), Education Code, is amended to 27 read as follows:

1 (a) A student is eligible to receive a public education 2 grant or to attend another public school in the district in which 3 the student resides under this subchapter if the student is 4 assigned to attend a public school campus <u>assigned an unacceptable</u> 5 <u>performance rating that is made publicly available under Section</u> 6 39.054 for:

7 (1) the student achievement domain under Section 8 <u>39.053(c)(1)</u> [at which 50 percent or more of the students did not 9 perform satisfactorily on an assessment instrument administered 10 under Section <u>39.023(a)</u> or (c) in any two of the preceding three 11 <u>years</u>]; <u>and</u> [<del>or</del>]

12 (2) <u>the school progress domain under Section</u> 13 <u>39.053(c)(2)</u> [that, at any time in the preceding three years, 14 <u>failed to satisfy any standard under Section 39.054(e)</u>].

SECTION 6. Subchapter B, Chapter 39, Education Code, is amended by adding Section 39.0211 to read as follows:

Sec. 39.0211. RULES. (a) The commissioner may adopt rules
 as necessary to administer this chapter.

19 (b) In adopting a rule under this chapter, the commissioner 20 shall solicit input statewide from persons who would likely be 21 affected by the proposed rule, including school district boards of 22 trustees, administrators and teachers employed by school 23 districts, parents of students enrolled in school districts, and 24 other interested stakeholders.

25 SECTION 7. Section 39.052(b), Education Code, is amended to 26 read as follows:

(f) Not later than September 30 of each year or as soon 6 7 thereafter as possible [Annually], the commissioner shall define 8 the state standard for the current school year for each domain under Subsection (c). In consultation with educators, parents, and 9 business and industry representatives, as necessary, the 10 commissioner shall establish and modify standards to continuously 11 12 improve student performance to achieve the goals of eliminating achievement gaps based on race, ethnicity, and socioeconomic status 13 and to ensure this state is a national leader in preparing students 14 for postsecondary success [achievement indicator described by 15 Subsections (c)(1)-(4) and shall project the state standards for 16 17 each indicator for the following two school years. The plan must assist the 25 campus in implementing procedures to satisfy the [all] performance 26 standards required under Section 39.054(e) for the school progress domain under Section 39.053(c)(2). 27

1 (b-4) A campus turnaround plan developed under this section 2 must take effect not later than the school year following the third 3 consecutive school year that the campus has received an 4 [academically] unacceptable performance rating <u>for the school</u> 5 progress domain under Section 39.053(c)(2).

6 (b-10) Not later than June 15 of each year, the commissioner 7 shall approve or reject in writing any campus turnaround plan 8 prepared and submitted to the commissioner by a school district. If 9 the commissioner rejects a campus turnaround plan, the commissioner 10 must include in the written rejection to the district a list of the 11 specific concerns regarding the plan that resulted in the 12 rejection.

13 (b-11) If the commissioner rejects a campus turnaround 14 plan, the district must create a modified plan and request 15 assistance from agency staff. The district must submit the 16 modified plan to the commissioner for approval not later than 17 August 15. The commissioner shall notify the district in writing of 18 the commissioner's decision regarding the modified plan not later 19 than September 1.

20 <u>(b-12) If the agency assists or offers assistance to a</u> 21 <u>district in modifying a campus turnaround plan following a</u> 22 <u>rejection under Subsection (b-10), the agency may not recommend or</u> 23 <u>require participation by the district or the district board of</u> 24 <u>trustees in any initiative that does not directly relate to a</u> 25 <u>concern identified by the commissioner in the written rejection</u> 26 <u>under Subsection (b-10).</u>

27

(d) The commissioner may approve a campus turnaround plan<u>,</u>

including a campus turnaround plan modified under Subsection 1 (b-11), only if the commissioner determines that the campus will be 2 assigned at least an acceptable [satisfy all student] performance 3 rating [standards required] under Section 39.054 for the school 4 progress domain under Section 39.053(c)(2) [39.054(e)] not later 5 than the second year [the campus receives a performance rating] 6 following the implementation of the campus turnaround plan. If the 7 8 commissioner does not make this determination after reviewing the school district's modified campus turnaround plan submitted under 9 <u>Subsection (b-11)</u>, the commissioner shall order: 10

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(1) appointment of a board of managers to govern the district as provided by Section 39.112(b);

13 (2) alternative management of the campus under this14 section; or

15

(3) closure of the campus.

(e) If a campus is <u>assigned</u> [considered to have] an unacceptable performance rating <u>under the school progress domain</u> <u>under Section 39.053(c)(2)</u> for three consecutive school years after the campus is ordered to submit a campus turnaround plan under Subsection (a), the commissioner, subject to Subsection (e-2), shall order:

(1) appointment of a board of managers to govern thedistrict as provided by Section 39.112(b); or

(2) closure of the campus.

(f) Notwithstanding Section 39.112(e), the commissioner may remove a board of managers appointed to govern a district under this section only if the campus that was the basis for the appointment of

1 the board of managers receives <u>at least</u> an [academically] acceptable performance rating under the school progress domain 2 3 under Section 39.053(c)(2) for two consecutive school years. If a campus that was the basis for the appointment of a board of managers 4 5 receives an [academically] unacceptable performance rating under the school progress domain under Section 39.053(c)(2) for two 6 additional consecutive years following the appointment of the board 7 8 of managers, the commissioner may remove the board of managers and, in consultation with the local community, may appoint a new board of 9 10 managers to govern the district.

(g-1) If the commissioner orders alternative management of 11 12 a campus under Subsection (d)(2), the school district shall execute a contract with a managing entity for a term not to exceed five 13 14 years. The commissioner may require a district to extend the term 15 of the contract if the commissioner determines that extending the contract on expiration of the initial term is in the best interest 16 17 of the students attending the campus. The terms of the contract must be approved by the commissioner. If a campus receives an 18 19 [academically] unacceptable performance rating under the school progress domain under Section 39.053(c)(2) for two consecutive 20 school years after the managing entity assumes management of the 21 campus, the commissioner shall cancel the contract with the 22 23 managing entity.

24 SECTION 22. Section 39.301(b), Education Code, is amended 25 to read as follows:

26 (b) Performance on the indicators adopted under this 27 section shall be evaluated in the same manner provided for

1 evaluation of the <u>domain</u> [achievement] indicators under <u>Section</u>
2 39.053(c) [Sections 39.053(c)(1)=(4)].

Using available data from the 2017-2018 3 SECTION 23. (a) school year, the commissioner of education shall prepare a report 4 5 that, to the greatest extent possible, describes and lists the domain performance ratings that would be assigned to each school 6 district and campus under Section 39.054, Education Code, as 7 8 amended by this Act, if the domain indicators described in Section 39.053(c), Education Code, as amended by this Act, were effective 9 during the 2017-2018 school year. 10

(b) Using available data from the 2018-2019 school year, the 11 12 commissioner of education shall prepare a report that, to the greatest extent possible, describes and lists the 13 domain 14 performance ratings that would be assigned to each school district 15 and campus under Section 39.054, Education Code, as amended by this Act, if the domain indicators described in Section 39.053(c), 16 17 Education Code, as amended by this Act, were effective during the 2018-2019 school year. 18

19 (c) Each report required under this section must include 20 information concerning the extent to which those domain performance 21 ratings correlate with student demographic characteristics, 22 including:

- 23
- (1) economic status;

24 (2) continuously enrolled status;

(3) status as a student of limited English
proficiency, as defined by Section 29.052, Education Code; and
(4) status as a student eligible to participate in a

special education program under Section 29.003(b), Education Code. (d) The commissioner of education shall submit a report prepared as required by this section to the governor, lieutenant governor, speaker of the house, and presiding officer of each standing committee of the senate and house of representatives with primary jurisdiction over primary and secondary education not later than:

8 (1) December 1, 2018, for a report prepared under 9 Subsection (a) of this section; and

10 (2) December 1, 2019, for a report prepared under11 Subsection (b) of this section.

12 (e) This section expires December 31, 2019.

SECTION 24. (a) Except as provided by Subsection (b) of this section, this Act applies beginning with the 2019-2020 school year.

(b) The section of this Act that requires the commissioner of education to prepare a report not later than December 1, 2018, and not later than December 1, 2019, regarding the assignment of school district and campus performance ratings applies beginning with the 2017-2018 school year.

21 SECTION 25. This Act takes effect immediately if it 22 receives a vote of two-thirds of all the members elected to each 23 house, as provided by Section 39, Article III, Texas Constitution. 24 If this Act does not receive the vote necessary for immediate 25 effect, this Act takes effect September 1, 2017.
